Day 1

Sunday 9th October

After our long journey from Europe the group arrived on time at Antananarivo International Airport in the late evening. Formalities concluded we transferred to our hotel in central Tana for a few precious hours sleep.

Day 2

Monday 10th October

Unfortunately our early morning flight from Tana to Fort Dauphin was delayed until lunchtime so we spent the morning at lake Alarobia in the Tana suburbs where we saw a host of herons and ducks, including the handsome and endemic Madagascar Pond Heron, and lots of alarmingly large but harmless Golden Web Spiders.

We finally arrived in Fort Dauphin in the mid-afternoon and drove west to Berenty. Two Sickle-billed Vangas hooting from a roadside tree were a notable highlight and the spiny forest set against a fine sunset provided a beautiful and memorable sight. Arriving at Berenty after dark we settled in and then set off on a short night walk during which we notched up White-footed Sportive Lemur and both Torotoroka Scops and White-browed Owls – not bad!

Day 3

Tuesday 11th October

A full morning at Berenty exploring both the gallery forest along the broad Mandrare River and the nearby spiny forest brought us into close and prolonged contact with Verraux's Sifakas, Ring-tailed and Brown Lemurs and a few diminutive Grey Mouse Lemurs. A tree full of Madagascar Flying Foxes squabbling noisily and fanning themselves with their leathery wings were another highlight and wide range of birds included Hook-billed Vanga, Giant and Crested Couas, Madagascar Harrier Hawk, Frances's Sparrowhawk, Madagascar Green Pigeon and Madagascar Hoopoe. Reptiles were represented by a couple of fine Spiny-backed Chameleons and a few neat little Three-eyed Lizards and insects included some bizarre Flattid Leaf-bug nymphs complete with their feathery white waxy excrescences. In the mid/late afternoon we retraced our steps to Fort Dauphin and installed ourselves at the comfortable Miramar Hotel.

Day 4

Wednesday 12th October

In the morning we visited an area of littoral forest (coastal forest on sand dunes) at Mandena and then the Sidi Botanical Gardens. At the former we admired the unique (and dense) vegetation with its large stands of Three-cornered Palms, searched in vain for Woolly Lemurs and found a superb Chabert's Vanga resplendent with its vivid blue eye-ring attending its beautifully crafted nest high in the fork of a tall tree. At the botanical gardens we found bizarre Pachypodiums flowering in a natural rock garden and admired the views over the adjacent marshes, mountains, lagoons and sea. The afternoon was spent at leisure exploring the many and varied delights of Fort Dauphin.

Day 5

Thursday 13th October

Humpback Whales cavorting in the blue waters of the bay below the hotel started the day well before we set off to explore the wonderful Androhehela National Park. During the morning we walked in a superb area of spiny forest where we admired the bizarre vegetation, found a neat Sportive Lemur roosting in the cleft between two of the vertical arms of a spiny Dideraceae (how could it possibly have been comfortable in such a position?). A range of exciting birds including several Crested Couas, a Madagascar Buttonquail, a White-headed Vanga and a superb Banded Kestrel. In the afternoon we visited an area of transitional forest along a beautiful, wide, rocky river valley. Birds were few and far between and mammals non-existent on account of the heat but the vegetation, the many and varied Rock Iguanas and the fine setting were interest enough.

Day 6

Friday 14th October

In the morning we enjoyed a leisurely breakfast and went for a walk around the nearby headland noting some more rather distant Humpback Whales. Then, after an early lunch, we drove the short distance to Fort Dauphin airport. Our twenty seater Twin Otter arrived on time but wouldn't take off with both us and our luggage (despite our possession of valid tickets) on the grounds that we were too heavy. Much wrangling ensued but the pilot was adamant and in the end, an hour or so late, we left Fort Dauphin without Claude our local guide! He eventually caught us up in Ranomafana some 48 hours later. Meanwhile, ever intrepid, we touched down in Manjanara a couple of hours later after an interesting flight up the south-east coast and found our waiting bus and driver. Our journey then took us away from the coast and up into the mountains. We finally arrived at Ranomafana at 9.30pm – not a moment too soon!

Day 7

Saturday 15th October

In the morning we walked a number of the trails in Ranomafana National Park. Our main target, the lemurs, did not disappoint and we enjoyed good views of Red-bellied, Greater Bamboo and Eastern Woolly. Birds included both Velvet and Common Sunbird Asity, Rand's Warbler, Madagascar Brush Warbler, Spectacled Greenbul, Tylas Vanga, Madagascar Starling and Forest Fody. We finished up at the Belle Vue viewpoint overlooking the steamy rainforest canopy where the confiding Green Day Geckos provided good photographic opportunities.

In the late afternoon we returned to Bellevue, noted a Pitta-like Ground Roller en-route, and got close up views of a couple of Striped Civets, three Ring-tailed Mongooses and at least four exquisite Brown Mouse Lemurs as they came in to the feeding station. A bizarre Leaf-tailed gecko finished the day off nicely for us as we made our way back out of the park in the dark.

Day 8

Sunday 16th October

In the morning the group split into two, one contingent continued the quest for lemurs and the other pursued birds. Both met success, with the former finding both Milne Edward's Sifakas and Golden Bamboo Lemurs and the latter a host of notable birds including Madagascar Wood Rail, Blue Coua, Madagascar Pygmy Kingfisher, Forest Rock Thrush, White-throated Oxylabes, Crossley's Babbler, Long-billed Greenbul and both Red-tailed and Pollen's Vangas. As we returned to the village for lunch we noted a pair of Madagascar Tree Boas sunning themselves at the side of the road.

In the late afternoon a trip to Vohipara introduced us to an area of higher altitude forest interspersed with marshy clearings. A range of interesting invertebrates and colourful orchids were noted but the overwhelming highlight was a pair of distinguished Meller's Ducks, a rare and localised endemic, sitting on the river.

Day 9

Monday 17th October

We left Ranomafana after breakfast and stopped a little way up the road to admire the famous Namorona waterfall and do a little birding. A fine immature male Velvet Asity complete with delicate all-over golden scaling was the star find before persistent rain forced us onwards. As we continued westwards towards Fianarantsoa and the main road the weather improved and we enjoyed brief views of a pair of roadside Red-bellied Lemurs. In the early afternoon we stopped at a small marsh backed by an area of primary forest. An exciting hour or so here produced a Madagascar Harrier Hawk, two Madagascar Snipe, a pair of Cuckoo Rollers, a Long-billed Green Sunbird, a few Madagascar Swamp Warblers, a couple of striking Stonechats and a confiding White-throated Rail. Best of all however was a Lowland Streaked Tenrec, whiffing around in the damp grass at the edge of a pool. Looking something like a cross between a mole and a hedgehog, but in a strange, stripy, harlequin costume, it was the first tenrec that any of us had seen and was much appreciated. Ambositra, with its woodcarving tradition provided a late afternoon retail therapy stop and then we proceeded fast north through the prosperous and scenic Merina highlands to Antsirabe. We arrived at our comfortable hotel a little after dark with a fine full moon lighting the sky.

Day 10

Tuesday 18th October

Another travelling day. We left Antsirabe, the rickshaw capital of Madagascar shortly after 7am. and drove north towards Tana through another stretch of typical highland scenery. A roadside craft stall shopping break overlooking a wide grassy valley produced several Madagascar Bush Larks, a Madagascar Cisticola and a distant calling Quail. We arrived in Tana around midday, enjoyed a leisurely lunch at the Plaza Hotel and then continued our journey, now eastwards, through more hill country. As the afternoon progressed we passed patches of remnant rain forest on the steeper slopes. In the late afternoon we passed through prosperous looking Moramanga and then turned off towards Perinet/Andasibe. We arrived at the luxurious Vakona Lodge a little after sunset, in good time to settle in before dinner.

Day 11

Wednesday 19th October

The day dawned wet as we made our first excursion into Perinet/Analamazaotra Special Reserve. Undaunted we enjoyed a productive morning that involved both Parson's and Nose-horned Chameleons; a range of interesting

birds including Blue Pigeon, Madagascar Spinetail Swift and Red-tailed Vanga and, best of all, a group of three magnificent Indri indulging in their spine-tingling and ear shattering chorus.

After lunch and a restful afternoon back at Vakona we returned to Perinet for a night walk. A Collared Nightjar and a Madagascar Long-eared Owl put in brief appearances but once again the lemurs stole the show. In a short space of time we saw four Greater Dwarf Lemurs shinning along a telegraph wire to some bait in a Traveller's Palm, a trio of Common Brown Lemurs and four distant Woolly Lemurs.

Day 12

Thursday 20th October

We spent the morning in the steep rainforested hills of the Mantadia National Park. An initial "birding" walk along the road was very productive as we saw a single Grey Bamboo Lemur, several Common Brown Lemurs and a party of four superb Diademed Sifakas. Bird highlights included Lesser Cuckoo, Madagascar Pygmy Kingfisher, Nuthatch and Blue Vangas and three neat little Ward's Flycatchers. Venturing off the road into the depths of the forest we were treated to some more good views of Diademed Sifakas before it was time to return to Vakona for lunch.

In the late afternoon we retraced our steps up to Mantadia for a night walk. Fireflies flashed through the darkness as we strolled down the track, a Collared Nightjar was discovered sitting along a branch and then two Broad-billed Rollers, which sat blinking into the torch beam. Grey Bamboo, Brown Mouse and Small Toothed Sportive Lemurs completed the picture. All in all a good day!

Day 13

Friday 21st October

A full day in Mantadia. A host of good birds included Madagascar Little Grebe, Henst's Goshawk, Greater Vasa Parrot, Blue Coua, Madagascar Blue Pigeon, Madagascar Spinetail Swift, Cuckoo Roller, Long-billed Greenbul, Tylas Vanga and White-throated Oxylabes. Lemurs included more Common Brown and Grey Bamboo plus a superb trio of much anticipated and much appreciated Black and White Ruffed!

Day 14

Saturday 22nd October

A smart Red-fronted Coua before breakfast at Vakona stated the day well. A full morning at Perinet began with Madagascar Sparrowhawks at the nest, continued with excellent views of Indris and concluded at the nearby Orchid Garden. Some of the group made a late afternoon sortie to Ampasimotsy Marsh and found both Madagascar and White-fronted Rails and a Madagascar Nightjar.

Day 15

Sunday 23rd October

Our last day in Madagascar. Early morning walks at Vakona produced more views of the Red-fronted Coua, a Humblot's Heron by the pond and a Rufous-headed Ground Roller (unfortunately heard only). After breakfast several members of the group visited the nearby Vakona Ranch where they enjoyed encounters with captive Fossas and a tame Cuckoo Roller. After this we made our way back to Tana and in the late afternoon visited the flower and craft markets before preparing ourselves for that long overnight journey back to the UK.
