Day 1

Saturday 14th January

Outbound to San Jose via Miami

Apart from Linda who was travelling from Seattle, and Roy and Loraine who were meeting us in Miami, everyone gathered at London Heathrow for a 09.40 BA flight that left just a few minutes late. Arriving on time early in the afternoon we negotiated immigration and settled down to wait for our mid-evening American Airlines flight to San Jose where we arrived on schedule at 21.55. After collecting our bags we met Simon and Santiago from the ground agents just outside the arrivals area. A short bus journey delivered us to the El Rodeo Country Inn where we quickly retired in anticipation of an early start and busy day ahead.

Day 2

Sunday 15th January

Paraiso del Quetzales, Savegre Mountain Lodge

Weather: overcast with light drizzle and occasional heavier rain at Paraiso Quetzal, bright, sunny and dry at Savegre. A little breezy at times, warm after a chilly start

Hot drinks and cake fortified us for the just over 90 minute journey high into the mountains south of San Jose. On arrival at Paraiso del Quetzales we immediately made our way to the veranda where numerous Magnificent and Fiery-throated Hummingbirds kept us entertained at the feeders while Rufous-collared Sparrows shuffled around the car park and a couple of Spangle-cheeked Tanagers appeared in a nearby tree.

After a hearty breakfast we joined Jorge on a two-and-a-half hour exploration of the nearby open forested slopes. After a few false starts and some toing and froing up and down a quite steep track we finally had excellent and prolonged views of a male Resplendent Quetzal in the scope. With our primary target secured we could begin to fully appreciate some of the other upland specialities of the area such as gorgeous Collared Whitestarts and Flame-throated Warblers, Sooty-capped Bush Tanagers, Yellow-winged Vireo, Black-and-yellow Silky Phainoptila, Black-capped Flycatchers, Slaty Flowerpiercers, Large-footed and Yellow-thighed Finches and wintering Wilson's and Black-throated Green Warblers. Satisfied with this excellent haul we returned to the hummingbird feeders for a short while before lunch.

Departing at 12.30, a 40 minute drive delivered us to Savegre Mountain Lodge where the hummingbird feeders attracted a new cast of characters such as Green Violetears, Grey-tailed Mountaingems, tiny Volcano Hummingbirds (and for some a single Scintillant Hummingbird) while a Flame-coloured Tanager perched nearby and Acorn Woodpeckers put on a good show. A short walk took us to a small glade overlooking the river where we enjoyed views of Spot-crowned Woodcreeper, Dark Pewees, Common Bush Tanagers and others as Sulphur-winged Parakeets hurtled overhead. At 15.00 we began the return journey to San Jose where we arrived at 17.30 and met for an al fresco dinner at 18.30.

Day 3

Monday 16th January

En route to Villa Lapas; Tarcoles Estuary

Weather: sunny and warm/hot, quite humid on the Pacific coast, a little breezy at times.

Early risers enjoyed a few new species in the hotel grounds before breakfast with Crimson-fronted Parakeets overhead, Great Kiskadees, Hoffman's Woodpeckers and Rufous-backed Wrens conspicuous while Inca and White-winged Doves and Red-billed Pigeons posed for the scope and a Cinnamon Hummingbird put in a few appearances.

By 08.00 the bus was loaded up and we were on our way west towards the Pacific coast. We stopped after 40 minutes to stretch our legs overlooking Rio Garita Reservoir where Least Grebes and Blue-winged Teals were on the water, a Squirrel Cuckoo was in the bushes and a Red-tailed Hawk overhead. Pressing on we made a brief visit to the town square park at Orotina; sadly the pair of Black-and-white Owls that used to be a regular feature there have now moved on though we enjoyed some reasonable views of a slumbering Hoffman's Two-toed Sloth and a few common or garden birds. A 30 minute coffee stop nearby preceded our arrival at the Tarcoles River Bridge where we walked slowly across seeing various herons and egrets and a few waders plus many large American Crocodiles. Back on the bus it was now just a short journey to our next base at Villa Lapas where we quickly checked-in and dropped our bags off at our rooms before a buffet lunch.

Prior to setting off at 14.45 to the Tarcoles Estuary some explored the hotel ground and nearby trails where Buff-throated Foliage-gleaner, Dusky Antbird and Russet Antshrike were highlights amongst a group of wintering American Yellow and Chestnut-sided Warblers. A couple of Gray-breasted Martins posed on roadside wires as we made our way towards the coast and on arrival at the estuary we watched Melodious Blackbirds and a Ringed Kingfisher before boarding a boat for an action-packed three hour exploration of the estuary and nearby mangroves.

New birds came thick and fast; plenty of herons, including our first Tricoloured, and egrets vied for our attention with Roseate Spoonbills and White Ibises, Magnificent Frigatebirds and Brown Pelicans, Anhingas and Neotropic Cormorants. Several Ospreys patrolled up and down or perched prominently. Green and Belted Kingfishers sat nicely while Mangrove Swallows accompanied us throughout by virtue of having a nestbox on the boat's roof! Entering a mangrove-lined channel we soon came across our first Common Black Hawk, quickly followed by a Prothonotry Warbler and some good views of a diminutive and rather secretive American Pygmy Kingfisher. Occasional Mangrove Warblers marked our progress and some had brief views of a Mangrove Hummingbird.

Heading back towards the estuary we watched the first of several Bare-throated Tiger Herons and were soon seeing many Yellow-crowned Night Herons lining the riverbank. As dusk approached and we returned towards the jetty, a few Scarlet Macaws flew past distantly before numerous Lesser Nighthawks took to the air all around us.

During the short bus journey back to Villa Lapas a couple of Pauraques appeared briefly in the bus headlights. A Spectacled Owl called from across the river at dinner but refused to be enticed closer though a good selection of frogs were at the ponds opposite the 'free' bar.

Day 4

Tuesday 17th January

Villa Lapas; Carara NP

Weather: fine, mostly sunny, warm/hot and humid

Prior to our 06.30 breakfast several excellent birds were seen near the hotel swimming pool. A fruiting tree attracted a couple of Black-mandibled Toucans and a Slaty-tailed Trogon, a Plain-capped Starthroat perched briefly and a couple of Orange-chinned Parakeets posed for the scope. Most dramatic though was a perched Scarlet Macaw that showed to perfection in the scope.

At 07.15 we set off on the short drive to Carara National Park where the rest of the morning was spent slowly walking back and forth along the River Trail as far as the oxbow lake, a gentle 5km round trip. Our efforts were well rewarded, Black-hooded Antshrikes, Dot-winged Antwrens, Rufous-breasted Wrens, Northern Bentbill, Northern Royal Flycatcher, Short-billed Pigeons, Wedge-billed Woodcreepers and Blue-throated Sapphire were particular highlights but perhaps most memorable was the family group of noisy Pale-billed Woodpeckers that remained in view for ages. At the oxbow lake we had a rest while watching a roost of strange-looking Boat-billed Herons.

During the lunch break back at the hotel those who wandered onto the trails were rewarded with Dusky Antbirds, Black-and-white Warbler and others. At 15.00 we returned to the River Trail where a slow moving feeding flock gave us repeat views of some species seen only quite briefly in the morning plus Plain Xenops, Yellow-green and Philapelpia Vireos and a Wood Thrush while a Central American Agouti to add to our mammal list. Back at Villa Lapas a Scarlet Macaw put on a fine show in trees right next to our rooms as Costa Rican Swifts soared high above.

Day 5

Wednesday 18th January

En route to Monteverde, Monteverde Hummingbird Gallery

Weather: Fine and warm at Villa Lapas, more overcast with sunny spells at Monteverde where there was a stiff breeze.

Birding in the hotel grounds either side of a 07.00 breakfast produced a host of good birds with Crested Guans, Painted Buntings and Fiery-billed Aracaris the pick of the bunch while the supporting cast included Streaked Flycatchers and several Streak-headed Woodcreepers. Overhead a King Vulture was a surprise find and a Short-tailed Hawk was seen briefly.

The journey to Monteverde commenced at 09.00 but we stopped after 40 minutes for coffee at Caldera where a wide coastal lagoon is fed by the Pacific Ocean just across the road. A large flock of Laughing Gulls and a couple of Royal Terns were roosting on the lagoon while offshore a group of Cabot's Terns were feeding as numerous Magnificent Frigatebirds and several Brown Pelicans glided overhead. Two hours later, half of which was along a somewhat bumpy unmade road, we arrived at the Hotel Montana in Monteverde and settled in to our rooms for 30 minutes before lunch.

A quick look from the restaurant balcony after lunch revealed a Blue-diademed Motmot in the garden below so we set off in pursuit and were rewarded with some fine views and also saw several Yellow-faced Grassquits and others. Soon after 15.00 we were on our way to the famous Monteverde Hummingbird Gallery, a journey of 20 minutes. On arrival we were immediately surrounded by hummers with Green-crowned Brilliants, Purple-throated Mountaingems and Violet Sabrewings all common and endemic Coppery-headed Emeralds, Green Violetears and Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds present in smaller numbers; scarcer still, but still seen regularly were Magenta-throated Woodstars and just before we left at 16.45 a single Green Hermit put in an appearance. We also saw our first Bananaquits at the feeders and some took advantage of the shopping or coffee and cake opportunities here. Back at the hotel a pre-roost gathering of Bronzed Cowbirds was noted.

Day 6

Thursday 19th January

Monteverde

Weather: mostly overcast with some light drizzle in the morning, sunnier and dry by late morning, warm after a chilly start

A rather blustery pre-breakfast session in the hotel garden was enlivened by the appearance of our first Buff-throated Saltators and a confiding Central American Agouti. By 07.15 we were on our way to the Monteverde Cloudforest Reserve in the company of local guide Alvin. While the blustery wind didn't aid our attempts to find birds in the beautiful mossy forest we were, nevertheless, soon watching a male Resplendent Quetzal and a Black Guan in the scope while a small feeding flock near the suspension bridge contained a couple of Collared Whitestarts plus our first Ochraceous Wrens and Ruddy Treerunners and a few other bits and pieces. Further highlights before we returned to the Hummingbird Gallery at 11.30 were a Black-faced Solitaire, several Three-striped Warblers, Yellowish Flycatchers, Red-faced Spinetails and a very smart pair of Azure-hooded Jays; some also got glimpses of noisy but furtive Grey-breasted Wood Wrens.

After lunch at the hotel we returned to the Cloudforest Reserve at 14.30 where Lineated Foliage-gleaner, Slate-throated Whitestarts and an Olive-striped Flycatcher joined several previously seen species in a feeding flock near to the entrance. A couple of Slaty-backed Nightingale-thrushes showed well along the trails and as Roy and Lorraine returned towards the car park they were fortunate to see a Highland Tinamou cross the path right in front of them.

Day 7

Friday 20th January

En route to Hacienda Solimar

Weather: sunny but breezy at Monteverde where a little chilly first thing; sunny and hot at Hacienda Solimar with a light but refreshing breeze

Highlights in the hotel grounds either side of breakfast at 07.00 included more Central American Agoutis, Steely-vented Hummingbird, Masked Tityra, Mountain Elaenia and Buff-throated Saltators plus an excellent Blue-throated Toucanet. The journey to Hacienda Solimar commenced at 09.15 and after collecting provisions at a supermarket we set off downhill towards arid Guanacaste Province. After a couple of hours we stretched our legs while Santiago filled the bus and thirty minutes later we arrived at the comfortable hacienda at 12.15, a pleasant breeze keeping the midday temperature at bay.

At 15.00 we were off on a tour of the wetter parts of the ranch in the company of local guide Demetrio. Our first stop was at the lagoon area where Grasshopper and Stripe-headed Sparrows and Plain-breasted and Common Ground Doves were seen as we walked towards the open water. A large colony of Wood Storks was in full swing and we watched several Bare-throated Tiger-herons and other wetland species including our first Snail Kite. Returning towards the bus we stopped to view a distant Jabiru nest while a Harris's Hawk perched in a bare tree top. Pressing on we reached areas of inundated meadows where hundreds of Black-bellied Whistling-ducks and Blue-winged Teals thronged and our first Limpkin was seen. As we drove along clouds of duck and, at one point, Northern Jacanas marked our way and we stopped to admire Killdeers and others. As we returned towards the hacienda our first White-nosed Coati showed well as it crossed a nearby field.

Day 8

Saturday 21st January

Hacienda Solimar

Early risers gathered on the road below the hacienda at 05.45 and enjoyed excellent views of Yellow-naped Parrots and White-throated Magpie-jays as the sun came up. As we returned for breakfast at 06.30 a Ferruginous Pygmy Owl and a pair of Spot-breasted Orioles showed very well and a fine pair of Turquoise-browed Motmots posed on wires below the veranda. Just after breakfast, during which a pair of Streak-backed Orioles put in an appearance, Santiago and Demetrio called us over to view a roosting Pacific Screech Owl.

By 07.30 we were on our way to explore an area of forest 30 minutes from the hacienda with several Amazon and Ringed Kingfishers plus a flying Jabiru seen en route. On arrival an Olive Sparrow perched briefly and our first Dusky-capped Flycatcher and Northern Barred Woodcreeper showed well along with a variety of warblers, including an American Redstart, our first Green-breasted Mangos and a couple of Greenish Elaenias.

A calling Long-tailed Manakin refused to cooperate so we followed a narrow trail into the forest where a fine male was soon found and gave some nice but rather brief views. A calling Collared Forest-falcon remained hidden but Tropical Gnatcatchers and Blue-black Grassquits showed well and our first White-collared Seedeater was with a group of Variable Seedeaters. As we returned towards the hacienda for lunch a Double-striped Thick-knee showed well in a roadside field and after lunch a Black-headed Trogon performed well next to our rooms.

At 15.00 we set off to an area of dry forest where some time was spent crunching through leaf litter until everyone had had at least a brief view of a Pauraque, though the hoped-for Spectacled Owls were nowhere to be found. Back at the bus we had a view over an extensive shallow wetland where we watched Limpkins and a Purple Gallinule in the scope and a small group of American Coots were a surprise find. A Grey Hawk soared overhead, Ruddy Ground Doves and White-collared Seedeaters fed along the track and a superb Laughing Falcon flew in and landed in a nearby bare tree.

Day 9

Sunday 22nd January

Hacienda Solimar incl. Colorado Salinas

Weather: fine, hot

A pre-breakfast walk near the hacienda gave some excellent views of various previously seen species but breakfast itself was interrupted by the discovery of a northern Tamandua clambering about in a tree near our rooms that gave exceptional views, the first time this scarce Anteater has been seen on our tours to Costa Rica. Our morning excursion took us to an area of gallery forest where we were soon watching a Ferruginous Pygmy Owl along with its attendant group of angry warblers, flycatchers and others as our first Montezuma Oropendolas came and went from a small nesting colony. Along the trail we managed to coax Slaty-headed Tody Flycatcher and Long-billed Gnatwren into view, Banded Wrens showed well and most had looks at another Long-tailed Manakin plus various flycatchers and warblers, Squirrel Cuckoos and others. Back at the hacienda a couple of Black-crowned Tityras moved through the trees though a calling Lesser Ground Cuckoo remained resolutely hidden.

At 13.30 we set off on the 30 minute drive to Colorado Salinas to see what had assembled at the high tide roost there. On arrival it was immediately obvious that a large and varied selection of species was present and we spent the next couple of hours sifting through them. Black Skimmers were a particular highlight, this species is erratic in appearances here, but rarer still were six Caspian Terns mixed in with hundreds of Gull-billed Terns, numerous Royal Terns and a handful of Cabot's Terns. Plovers were represented by several Grey Plovers, hundreds of Semipalmated Plovers and a large count of about 100 Wilson's Plovers. Hundred's of Semipalmated and Western Sandpipers lined the banks of the saltings while several Least Sandpipers crept about; Stilt Sandpipers and Short-billed Dowitchers plus a few Lesser Yellowlegs were sprinkled about and a more distant pool held a large roost of Whimbrels, Willets and Marbled Godwits. At the mangrove edge a Mangrove Vireo put in a brief appearance but several Mangrove Warblers, a couple of Prothonotory Warblers and a Brown-crested Flycatcher gave prolonged views as Magnificent Frigatebirds drifted overhead. As we returned towards the bus a small group of Red Knot were a surprise find.

Day 10

Monday 23rd January

En route to Arenal; Arenal Observatory Lodge

Weather: rather overcast during the morning drive but clearer later on though with rain after dark, warm

After saying goodbye to the friendly staff at Hacienda Solimar we set off inland towards Lake Arenal, stopping after 90 minutes for refreshments at the German bakery in Nuevo Arenal. Continuing eastwards we reached a point where Arenal Volcano was partly visible and stopped for photos in case it disappeared later on. A short while later we stopped on the quiet old Tabacon Road for a walk there and to eat our packed lunches and had brief views of another Tamandua as we arrived. Bird activity was a little slow here though we watched our first Violaceous Trogon and a few other bits and pieces before driving for 40 minutes to our overnight base at Arenal Observatory Lodge.

On arrival we immediately made our way to the platform overlooking the feeding station where, over the next hour or so, we enjoyed excellent views of several new species such as Passerini's, Double-toothed and Golden-hooded Tanagers and Black-cheeked Woodpeckers, Stars of the show though were some exquisite Red-legged Honeycreepers and a pair of Green Honeycreepers while numerous spectacular Montezuma Oropendolas were ever present. During this time the clouds obscuring the top of Arenal Volcano drifted away for a while giving us a clear view against a blue sky, though volcanic activity was very muted as it has been for over a year. Dragging ourselves away we were soon settling into our comfortable rooms before exploring the grounds where new hummingbirds at the flowering hedges included Violet-headed, Rufous-tailed, Green Thorntail, Stripe-throated Hermit and Bronze-tailed Plumeleeter.

Day 11

Tuesday 24th January

Arenal; en route to Selve Verde; Selve Verde

Weather: overcast with occasional drizzle first thing, sunnier, warmer and quite humid at Selve Verde

Dawn at the feeding station revealed a similar cast of characters to yesterday, including several Coatis, plus our first Band-backed and Stripe-throated Wrens and a superb Emerald Tanager. Exploration of the attractive lodge gardens after breakfast revealed several Crested Guans, an obliging Lineated Woodpecker, Buff-rumped Warbler, various hummingbirds, including our first White-necked Jacobin, and a pair of Keel-billed Toucans that put in a couple of brief appearances. By 09.30 we were on our way to the Caribbean lowlands but stopped to watch a Fasciated Tiger-heron on a small river as we were leaving. A further stop after 40 minutes at Muelle offered coffee and the chance to admire the Green Iguanas in the trees next to the cafe.

By 12.30 we were settling into our rooms at Selve Verde Lodge. After lunch and a short rest the remainder of the afternoon was spent exploring the lodge gardens where Shining Honeycreepers put on a good show, a pair of noisy White-ringed Flycatchers finally settled for the scope and most saw Orange-billed Sparrows, Grey-headed Chachalacas, Keel-billed and Black-mandibled Toucans and Red-throated Ant Tanagers. The mammal highlight this afternoon was a small troop of White-faced Capuchins. After dinner and the checklist some admired the Red-eyed Treefrogs at the pool below the restaurant.

Day 12

Wednesday 25th January

Virgen de Socorro, El Tapir, near La Selva

Weather: mostly sunny, dry and hot but more overcast at cooler El Tapir

After breakfast at 05.30 we were on our way to Virgen de Socorro in the Caribbean foothills by 06.00 and arrived after 40 minutes. Walking slowly down the road there towards the river we came across several new species including a perched Purple-crowned Fairy, Blackburnian Warblers, White-crowned Parrots, Silver-throated and Crimson-collared Tanagers. At the river a Torrent Tyrannulet gave some distant views from the bridge, a couple of Collared Peccaries wandered into view and a pair of Barred Hawks were overhead with the vultures. At nearby Chinchona a small feeding station at a roadside cafe provided views of several hummingbirds and a few commoner Tanagers but the undoubted highlight was a Blue-throated Toucanet that posed very nicely. We were back at Selve Verde by 11.30 where a Black-and-green Poison Arrow Frog was a good find near the restaurant. Lunch was punctuated by the comings and goings of Summer Tanagers and Olive-backed Euphonias at the feeders and everyone downed cutlery to come and admire some fine Collared Aracaris there.

We set off at 13.30 for an unscheduled visit to the abandoned butterfly garden at El Tapir. We found hummingbird activity at the flowers there a little subdued today and no Snowcaps appeared amongst the Rufous-tailed and Violet-headed Hummingbirds buzzing about. By 16.00 though, we were making our way along a quiet farm track adjacent to the La Selva Reserve. Just as we reached one particular tree our target came winging in from behind us, a magnificent Great Green Macaw. Both members of the Macaw pair then put on a superb show of synchronised flying for us and they remained in view on and off for the next hour. Other species seen here included a mixed flock of Rough-winged Swallows and a Tropical Pewee, a couple of Long-tailed Tyrants were admired in the scope and after a short wait several Red-lored Parrots began to appear in the trees.

Day 13

Thursday 26th January

La Selva

Weather: fine and dry after a misty dawn, then warm and quite humid with a brief shower after lunch

After an early breakfast we were on our way to nearby La Selva by 06.30 and arrived there just as the early morning mist cleared. We spent nearly two hours slowly making our way along the 1km long entrance road, though early distractions even before we set off came in the shape of a pair of Fasciated Anthsrikes and Chestnut-coloured Woodpeckers while Masked Tityras, Short-billed Pigeons and Red-lored Parrots perched prominently. A little way along the road a Scarlet-rumped Cacique put on a good show and we were soon watching a large feeding flock consisting mostly of Passerini's and other tanagers but also a pair of Black-headed Saltators. Reaching a more open area a Great Antshrike was a surprise find and a succession of species came and went from some bare treetops, Great Green Macaws performed a fly-past and a group of Gray-rumped Swifts overhead briefly contained a couple of striking Lesser Swallow-tailed Swifts.

After a coffee stop at the research station, where a pair of Double-toothed Kites was displaying, we divided into two groups. Some accompanied Rodolpho on a general tour of the mature forest across the Sarapiquí River bridge, where they succeeded in finding several roosting bats, bullet ants and others plus a Snowy Cotinga.

Others concentrated on the younger forest north of the river where we found Slaty-tailed Trogon, brief Dusky-faced Tanagers and a Cocoa Woodcreeper in a large feeding flock, White-collared Manakin, Mourning Warbler and a rare Hooded Warbler. By 11.30 we had finished our ice creams and returned to Selva Verde for lunch where a couple of Gartered Trogons showed well to some.

A 15.00 return to La Selva saw us retrace our steps on the north of the river with highlights after watching Rufous-winged Woodpeckers and Chestnut-headed Oropendolas at the research station including both Two-toed and Three-toed Sloths, Collared Peccaries, White-collared Manakins, Grey-chested Dove, Cinnamon Woodpecker, Gray Catbird and a Blue-chested Hummingbird.

Day 14

Friday 27th January

En route to San Jose; inbound to London via Miami

Weather: overcast and occasionally drizzly in the foothills, sunny and warm in the Central Valley

Departing after breakfast, and a final new bird in the shape of a Bright-rumped Attila, we set off towards San Jose at 07.15, our route taking us through the Caribbean foothills before we dropped into the Central Valley. Arriving at the airport at 09.30, we were in ample time for the 12.30 departure to Miami from where a London bound flight departed at 20.45

Day 15

Saturday 28th January

Arrival in UK

After a night in the air the inbound flight to London Heathrow arrived at 10.05.
