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Day 1

Thursday 15th March

After a long day flying we arrived on time at San Jose airport in the early evening. Clearing immigration and customs we met up with Santiago our driver and Simon our local agent and transferred the short distance to the Rodeo County Inn. Once checked in everyone, very sensibly, went more or less straight to bed.

Day 2

Friday 16th March

A mixture of sunshine, cloud, mist and showers; breezy at times; warm in the sun, cool in the mist.

After an early start we drove south-east of the capital into the mountains of the Cerro de la Muerte. We spent the morning at Paraiso Del Quetzal where we enjoyed fantastic views of a pair of much anticipated Resplendent Quetzals attending their nest in a hole in a dead tree and found a host of other highland specialities including Ruddy Treerunner, Spot-crowned Woodcreeper, Black-capped Flycatcher, Black-billed Nightingale Thrush, Collared Whitestart, Black-cheeked Warbler, Large-footed Finch and Slaty Flowerpiercer. At the lodge itself, where we ate breakfast and lunch, the hummingbird feeders on the balcony were buzzing with Fiery-throated and Magnificent Hummingbirds, and in the trees and bushes around we found Black-and-yellow Phainoptilas, a Mountain Elaenia and several Sooty-capped Bush Tanagers.

The morning had provided a sensational introduction to the wonders of birding in Costa Rica but we weren't done yet. A short drive after lunch through some superb forested highland scenery took us down a couple of hundred metres to the beautifully positioned Savegre Lodge. The drop in altitude brought a different range of birds. Hummers here included White-throated Mountain-gems and diminutive Volcano Hummingbirds and a short stroll through the gardens and streamside woods produced Acorn Woodpeckers, a Black-faced Solitaire, a Ruddy-capped Nightingale Thrush, a Flame-throated Warbler, a pair of lovely Flame-coloured Tanagers and the first of many Emerald Toucanets. A large pack of White-collared Swifts overhead were joined by some smaller Vaux's Swifts, and a flock of wonderfully graceful Swallow-tailed Kites drifted into view at the top of the valley and put the final touches on a hugely satisfying first day.

Day 3

Saturday 17th March

Sunny, warm and humid with some scattered cloud. Breezy in San Jose in the early morning; one brief heavy shower at Villa Lapas in the early afternoon

A spot of pre-breakfast birding around the Rodeo Inn produced a reasonable range of common birds. Most notable were a flock of handsome Crimson-fronted Parakeets, a Cinnamon Hummingbird, two confiding Rufous-naped Wrens and a pair of Melodious Blackbirds. With breakfast completed we set off towards the Pacific coast. Our first stop was at the Galita Reservoir where we took a short stroll and found several Least Grebes out on the water, a handful of Boat-billed Herons roosting unobtrusively in the shoreline trees, a trio of Grey-headed Chachalacas, a pair of Brown-crested Flycatchers and a soaring Broad-winged Hawk. An impressive Green Iguana draped over a sunlit branch provided the first of many photo-opportunities with this species and a mixed flock of small birds moving through the trees and scrub tested everyone's observational skills.

Our next stop was at the Tarcoles River Bridge where we dodged the traffic, admired the many large American Crocodiles loafing in the shallows and notched up a good number of birds including a Roadside Hawk, several Northern Jacanas and dozens of Mangrove Swallows. Driving just a little further brought us to Villa Lapas where we checked in, ate lunch and then set about exploring. The river and wooded grounds proved productive and between us in our short siesta time we found Rufous-tailed Hummingbird, Hoffman's Woodpecker, Common Tody Flycatcher, Riverside Wren, Northern Waterthrush and Blue Dacnis.

In the late afternoon we set off on a boat trip along the Tarcoles River. A sensational couple of hours brought some fantastic views of a wide variety of birds. Along the main channel we saw a host of herons and egrets, White Ibis, Roseate Spoonbill, Anhinga, Mangrove Black Hawk, Yellow-headed Caracara, Purple Gallinule and lots of waders. Scarlet Macaws flew overhead, Turquoise-browed Motmots perched along the banks and Amazon, Green, Ringed and Belted Kingfishers all put in appearances.

We finished with a little pottering along a narrow mangrove-fringed creek and enjoyed lovely views of three Pygmy Kingfishers and a stunning male Prothonotary Warbler plus a couple of Mangrove Yellow Warblers and a Mangrove Vireo. This superb afternoon was rounded off nicely by a pair of perched Scarlet Macaws back at the landing stage and dozens of Least Nighthawks flitting across the twilight sky.

Day 4

Sunday 18th March

Sunny, hot and humid with some scattered cloud. Breezy in the afternoon

A pre-breakfast stroll around the grounds produced excellent views of a pair of Scarlet Macaws, our first Streak-headed Woodcreeper and a dazzling male Painted Bunting. After breakfast we spent a little time admiring a pair of Slaty-tailed Trogons that posed nicely in a tree by reception and then set off on the short drive to the nearby Carera National Park. We spent the bulk of the morning walking the so-called Oxbow Trail which led through some fine transitional forest and ended up at the lake that gave the trail the name. Bird highlights included a pair of Pale-billed Woodpeckers, several Orange-collared Manakins, a male Violaceous Trogon, a Black-hooded Antshrike and two Royal Flycatchers; whilst other goodies included a Mantled Howler Monkey, a Hoffman's Two-toed Sloth, several Iguanas and lots of Leaf-cutter Ants. Late on in the morning we came across a disturbance on the forest floor and found several Bicoloured and Chestnut-backed Antbirds chasing insects disturbed by an army ant column; an illustration of how antbirds got their name.

After lunch and a siesta back at Villa Lapas we returned to the national park and walked a different trail through another area of superb forest with lots of huge buttress-rooted trees. It was quieter than in the morning but we still managed good views of three Great Tinamous, a pair of Baird's Trogons, a Collared Peccary and a neat little group of Greater White-lined Bats roosting unobtrusively on a trailside tree trunk.

Day 5

Monday 19th March

Sunny with scattered cloud and a moderate breeze. Very warm on the coast, cooler higher up

Another early birder's session at Villa Lapas proved very productive and in a short space of time we enjoyed good views of a couple of Grey-chested Doves, a Buff-throated Foliage-gleaner, a Plain Xenops, singing Buff-rumped Warblers, an Orange-billed Sparrow and a wonderful Black-faced Ant-Thrush. After breakfast we left Villa Lapas and began the journey up into the mountains. We stopped some little way along the road by the beach at Caldera where we found good numbers of Laughing Gulls, Royal Terns and Magnificent Frigatebirds, and then again at a petrol station a little further on where a Plumbeous Kite perched obligingly in a nearby tree.

We reached our hotel near Monteverde at the end of the morning and after lunch and a siesta we drove up to the Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve and spent a couple of hours at the wonderful Hummingbird Gallery. Here we sat in comfort only feet away from a range of feeders that were positively buzzing with hummingbirds. Green-crowned Brilliants and Violet Sabrewings were the dominant species both in numbers, size and aggression but there were also good numbers of Purple-throated Mountain-gems and a scattering of Green Violet-ears, Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds and diminutive Copper-headed Emeralds, a Costa Rican endemic. Two Magenta-Throated Woodstars also put in an appearance and a lone Green Hermit wowed everyone as it perched for some minutes in full view in the shrubbery. Good sightings of Black Guans, Emerald Toucanets and Brown Jays added the final touches to an excellent afternoon and we returned to the hotel in high spirits.

Day 6

Tuesday 20th March

Sunny, warm and still, with a little cloud building up in the afternoon

After an early breakfast we drove the short distance up to the Monteverde Cloud Forest entrance and set off on the trails with our local guide Bernal. This famous and beautiful forest lived up to its reputation and in an action-packed morning we saw a superb range of birds including Black-breasted Wood-Quail, Prong-billed Barbet, Spotted Barbtail, Streak-breasted Treehunter, Plain Antvireo, Yellowish Flycatcher, Golden-browed Chlorophonia, Silver-throated Tanager, Three-striped and Golden-crowned Warblers, the wonderfully named Paltry Tyrannulet and many more.

We returned to the hotel for lunch and a siesta and then headed back onto the trails in the mid-afternoon. The forest was inevitably quieter than in the morning but what we missed in diversity we more than made up for in quality, with excellent views of a pair of Resplendent Quetzals, a Black-faced Solitaire on its nest, a superb male Orange-bellied Trogon and a Grey-throated Leaf-tosser feeding downy young in its trailside burrow. We even succeeded, after considerable effort and having been taunted by its evocative call throughout the day, to see a Wattled Bellbird in full voice out on a dead snag; an amazing sight as he threw his head back, wobbled his wattles and yelled! Mammals were good too; in the course of the day we encountered Mantled Howler Monkeys, a Red-tailed Squirrel, a White-nosed Coati, several Central American Agoutis and a lovely Red Brocket Deer. Pretty Good!

Day 7

Wednesday 21st March

Sunny with scattered cloud. Hot and humid with a fresh breeze in the morning and some light rain in the afternoon

During a pre-breakfast stroll around the grounds of the hotel we found a satisfying range of new birds including Steely-vented Hummingbird, Plain Wren, Grey-crowned Yellowthroat, Rufous-capped Warbler, White-eared Ground Sparrow and White-naped Brush-Finch. After breakfast the sight of a pair of Swallow-tailed Kites soaring gracefully low over the hotel provided a good last bird before we set off down towards the coastal plain. The journey took us through a scenic mosaic of farmland and relict forest patches and we made a number of impromptu roadside stops; first for a troop of Mantled Howler Monkeys, next for a Squirrel Cuckoo and a Rose-breasted Grosbeak and finally for a trio of dazzling Keel-billed Toucans. We passed through the town of Las Juntas, drank coffee at the Macaw Cafe on the Pan-American Highway and made it comfortably to the welcoming Hacienda Solimar in good time for lunch.

In the mid-afternoon, after enjoying good views of Pacific Screech Owls and Stripe-headed Sparrows in the garden, we set off on the short drive to the Colorado Salinas. These traditional working salt pans surrounded by mangrove forest provided some great birding and in a short space of time, as dark, brooding clouds bubbled up inland, we saw an excellent range of waders including Black-necked Stilt, Short-billed Dowitcher, Marbled Godwit, Stilt Sandpiper, Wilson's Plover and Willet.

Day 8

Thursday 22nd March

Sunny and hot with some scattered cloud and a light breeze

Our morning started at dawn in the garden with Streak-backed and Spot-breasted Orioles, Turquoise-browed Motmots, Groove-billed Anis, Masked Tityras, Scrub Euphonias and noisy White-fronted and Yellow-naped Amazons.

After breakfast we drove a short distance to an area of evergreen gallery forest where we took a lengthy stroll and found an excellent variety of birds including Grey-headed and Hook-billed Kites, Collared Forest Falcon, Ferruginous Pygmy Owl, White-necked Puffbird, Northern Barred Woodcreeper, Greenish Elaenia and Banded Wren. The Forest was full of Mantled Howler Monkeys and repeated sightings of these plus a lively little troop of White-nosed Coatis belting through the leaf litter completed a memorable morning.

We headed back to the hacienda for lunch and a lengthy siesta which was enlivened by a pair of White-lored Gnatcatchers and a trio of Black-headed Trogons in the garden. In the late afternoon we drove out to the wide-open marshes of Estero Madrigal and enjoyed a fantastic couple of hours surrounded by throngs of waterbirds. Chief highlights included a pair of mighty Jabirus, several Limpkins, dozens of Bare-throated Tiger Herons and the thrilling sight of thousands of Black-bellied Whistling Ducks erupting out of the shallow water amid clouds of spray. Other notables included a smart Laughing Falcon, a few Crested Caracaras, a Zone-tailed Hawk, a pair of handsome little Orange-chinned Parakeets and a tree full of hundreds of Cattle Egrets. Back at the hacienda a Tamandua pottering across the moonlit lawn as we ate dinner provided a fitting finale to an excellent day.

Day 9

Friday 23rd March

Sunny and hot with a breeze in the afternoon

After breakfast we drove out across another section of the ranch towards an area of evergreen dry forest. En-route we noted two large coveys of Crested Bobwhites, a couple of White-tailed Kites, a close Ringed Kingfisher, a ditch full of Wood Storks and yesterday's Jabiru's at their nest with their well-grown chick. At the forest itself we strolled along a wide trail and encountered an interesting range of birds that included Plain-crowned Starthroat, Barred Antshrike, Northern Bentbill, Great-crested Flycatcher, Long-tailed Manakin, Bright-rumped Attila and both Indigo and Painted Buntings. Exploring along the edge of another patch of woodland nearby we heard the distinctive call of a Lesser Ground Cuckoo and after much patience eventually succeeded in seeing the bird as it crept across a gap in the undergrowth. Continuing into the wood itself we had sticks thrown at us by agitated White-faced Capuchins and enjoyed fabulous views of a pair of mighty Spectacled Owls.

Lunch and a siesta back at the hacienda was followed by a local walk that produced excellent views of Hoffman's Woodpeckers, Black-crowned Tityras, Grey-crowned Yellowthroats, Olive Sparrows and a smart male Blue Grosbeak.

Day 10

Saturday 24th March

Sunny, hot and humid

We left Hacienda Solimar after breakfast and made our way up through the town of Las Canas to the pleasant green hill country around Arenal Lake. We stopped in Arenal town for coffee and cakes and then proceeded to the south-eastern end of the lake, crossed the dam and took a pre-lunch walk along a trail that ran through some secondary forest above the lake shore. It was hot and bird activity was subdued but nevertheless we encountered an interesting range of species including Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Golden-winged Warbler, Crimson-collared and Passerini's Tanagers, Red-legged and Green Honeycreepers and Scarlet-thighed Dacnis. After a picnic lunch at the trailside, during which a Short-tailed hawk soared overhead, we drove on to Arenal Observatory Lodge.

After settling in to our very comfortable rooms we took a stroll through the grounds and enjoyed good views of Grey-headed Chachalacas, Crested Guans, nesting Montezuma's Oropendolas, Violet-headed Hummingbirds, a pair of Black-throated Trogons, three Black-cheeked Woodpeckers, a male Long-tailed Tyrant and a couple of Black-cowled Orioles.

Day 11

Sunday 25th March

Sunny, humid and very warm with a light breeze and some scattered cloud

We awoke to a sunny, clear dawn and spectacular views of Arenal Volcano. In the clearing outside our rooms the dawn bird activity was outstanding and in a short space of time we saw a wide range of new species including Brown Violet-ear, Violet-crowned Woodnymph, White-throated Thrush, Cinnamon Becard, Yellow-throated Euphonia, Tropical Parula, Golden-hooded Tanager and Black-striped Sparrow. Highlights however came in the form of a pair of Great Curassows strutting majestically across the lawn and into the forest, the male uttering his deep bass call, and then another Tamandua, this time in full daylight, climbing slowly up a nearby tree, flicking his tongue out and peering myopically at us. Wonderful!

After breakfast we returned to our rooms to pack up. Both Keel-billed and Black-mandibled Toucans passed through the trees below our balconies, a White Hawk soared overhead and then, just as we were about to leave, a large Mussurana Snake emerged from beneath the building and made its way across the garden and up into a tree. This formidable beast eats other snakes, killing them by combinations of venom and constriction but is considered harmless to man. Leastways it provided an excellent finale to a short but very rich sojourn at Arenal.

From Arenal we drove eastwards towards the Caribbean coast through Fortuna, Muelle and La Virgen and arrived at the famous Selva Verde Lodge in time for lunch and a siesta. In the late afternoon we explored some of the trails through the grounds and found a few birds despite the afternoon heat, including a Bronze-tailed Plumeleater, a Slaty-tailed Trogon, a Wedge-billed Woodcreeper, a trio of noisy Red-throated Ant Tanagers, a pair of White-ringed Flycatchers and an Olive-backed Euphonia. Mammals included a neat little Red-tailed Squirrel, and in one of the streams we found several Black Wood Turtles. We finished the day at the lodge's riverside bar enjoying a well-earned beer.

Day 12

Monday 26th March

Sunny, humid and very warm with a gentle breeze and some scattered cloud

We spent the morning exploring more of the trails at Selva Verde and encountered a wide range of wildlife. Among the highlights were Strawberry and Black-and-green Poison-dart Frogs, Green Basilisks, a Spectacled Caiman, several Variegated Squirrels, a Central American Agouti and a range of birds that included Purple-crowned Fairy, Cocoa Woodcreeper, Stripe-breasted Wren, Blue-black Grosbeak and a superb Sunbittern which we watched at length as it foraged along the river bank.

In the afternoon we drove the short distance to La Selva Reserve and walked along the perimeter track. This interface between the forest itself and the adjacent agricultural land with its scattering of tall trees proved very productive.

Along the forest edge we enjoyed excellent views of a pair of Rufous-winged Woodpeckers and another Cocoa Woodcreeper and then out in the clearing we found a flock of handsome White-crowned Parrots feeding unobtrusively in the tops of some trees and a smart Black-headed Saltator. Shortly after this we heard the unmistakable sound of large macaws approaching and turned to see a pair of Great Green Macaws flying across the clearing towards us. These marvellous birds presented a thrilling spectacle as they flew to their nest hole high in the tallest tree in the clearing and then perched together in full view for us to enjoy at our leisure.

Elated from this wonderful episode our attention was drawn first to a mixed flock of Montezuma's and Chestnut-headed Oropendolas flying to their distant roost and then to a Toucan party that appeared in some nearby trees. We could hardly believe our eyes as we registered half a dozen Collared Aracaris, five Black-mandibled Toucans and at least a dozen Keel-billed Toucans all hopping around and posturing to each other as they moved through the tree tops. What a wonderful sight! The light was fading by this stage and as the trees around us filled with roosting Red-lore Amazons and Olive-throated Parakeets we reluctantly took our leave and headed back to Selva Verde.

Day 13

Tuesday 27th March

Sunny, humid and very warm; scattered cloud in the morning becoming more heavily overcast in the afternoon

We headed into La Selva at dawn and spent a fabulous couple of hours birding around the main clearings. Exciting birds came thick and fast and included a Sungrebe on the river, a Bronzy Hermit searching spider's webs around the veranda of the research centre, a White-whiskered Puffbird, a superb male Chestnut-coloured Woodpecker, four Broad-billed Motmots displaying to each other, Band-backed and Bay Wrens and two stunning male Snowy Cotingas.

Over lunch and a siesta back at Selva Verde we added Wood Thrush and Scarlet Tanager to our list before heading back into La Selva for our last proper bit of Costa Rican birding. The going was inevitably slower than the morning but nevertheless we managed good views of two Rufous Motmots, a Squirrel Cuckoo, a Lineated Woodpecker, several White-collared Manakins, a male Fasciated Antshrike and Three-toed Sloth with a well-grown juvenile. Satisfied we returned to Selva Verde for a last dinner together.

Day 14

Wednesday 28th March

Overcast, warm, humid and drizzly at Selva Verde after overnight rain; sunny with scattered cloud and a fresh breeze in San Jose

A wet dawn found the pathways at Selva Verde peppered with Black-and-green Poison-dart Frogs – a nice final touch before we departed for San Jose. The journey took us through some fine highland scenery and we made stops at a rustic café at Cinchona, where a neat little Green Thorntail visited the hummingbird feeder, and then at some waterfalls where we found a pair of Torrent Tyrannulets and a couple of Slate-throated Redstarts. A little further on Santiago spotted a superb male Wattled Bellbird perched in the top of a roadside tree, a very notable sighting and a wonderful bird to finish with.

Shortly after this we crossed the mountain ridge and descended into San Jose. We reached the airport in good time. Our check-in went smoothly, our flights departed on time and we all arrived safely at our destinations some hours later.
