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Day 1

Sunday 18th January

After a long day flying via Houston we arrived in San Jose in the late evening and transferred to our comfortable hotel for some welcome sleep.

Day 2

Monday 19th January

We started the day at first light with an hour-or-so on the hotel's garden terrace with its panoramic view across the central valley and the San Jose conurbation. It was a fine morning and we had a quick-fire introduction to an exciting array of common Costa Rican birds. These included White-crowned Parrot, Red-billed Pigeon, Hoffman's Woodpecker, Baltimore Oriole, Brown Jay and a lovely Rufous-capped Warbler.

After breakfast we boarded our bus and began the drive southwards towards Talamanca Cordillera and Savegre, our venue for the next couple of days. After lunch and a little time to settle in we set off to explore our new surroundings. The action started at the feeders and flower beds around the reception area with wonderful views of Magnificent, Scintillant and Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds, Green Violetear, White-throated Mountaingem, Flame-coloured Tanager, Slaty Flowerpiercer, Acorn Woodpecker and Yellow-thighed Finch. A Red-tailed Hawk soared overhead and as we continued on through the gardens we saw a couple of Ruddy-capped Nightingale-Thrushes, several Sulphur-winged Parakeets, four Spotted Woodquail, a female Quetzal and a lone male White-faced Capuchin – not bad for starters!

Day 3

Tuesday 20th January

Out at dawn, we began the day with lovely views of a pair of Black Guans by the reception building and then, a short way up the road, a superb male Quetzal, a Bat Falcon and a pair of Long-tailed Silky Flycatchers. After breakfast we got into the bus and drove up to the Mirador del Quetzal at the top of the ridge. Here, in persistent drizzle, we explored some really glorious forest and found a range of the local high altitude specialities including

Fiery-throated Hummingbird, Black-and-yellow Silky Flycatcher, Black-capped Flycatcher, Sooty Thrush, Sooty-capped Bush Tanager and Yellow-thighed Finch.

During the afternoon back at Savegre we walked through the evergreen oakwoods on the slopes above the lodge. Wonderful forest this too; the trees festooned with mosses, lichens and bromeliads. The weather had improved since the morning and in some fine spells of sunshine we enjoyed fabulous views of six Swallow-tailed Kites zooming around over the valley plus some more Spotted Woodquail, a couple of Spot-crowned Woodcreepers, Yellowish and Tufted Flycatchers, Yellow-winged Vireo and several Large-footed Finches.

Day 4

Wednesday 21st January

We left Savegre after breakfast and began the journey through the mountains and down to the Pacific coast. Our first stop was in an area of high altitude paramo where we admired the panoramic views, gasped a little with 11,000 feet plus breathlessness, and enjoyed close encounters with a pair of Peg-billed Finches and several neat little Volcano Hummingbirds. Continuing onwards through the late morning we noted a soaring Short-tailed Hawk and at an enforced road-works stop, a nice male Spot-crowned Euphonia and a Philadelphia Vireo.

We reached the coast road just north of Dominical a little after noon and then made fast progress north towards Tarcoles. Flat, open country now, with Cattle Egrets in the fields, Turkey Vultures in the sky, occasional Roadside Hawks on posts watching the traffic go by, and Greater Kiskadees, Tropical Kingbirds and Grey-breasted Martins on the roadside wires. We passed through extensive oil palm plantations and past the towns of Quipos and Jaco and made it to Vila Lapas in time for a late lunch.

In the late afternoon we explored around the grounds at Vila Lapas and concluded the day with a satisfying range of birds that included Crested Guan, Scarlet Macaw, Streaked Flycatcher, Buff-rumped Warbler and Golden-hooded Tanager.

Day 5

Thursday 22nd January

An early morning session around the grounds at Vila Lapas proved very productive with good sightings of male Slaty-tailed Trogon, Grey Hawk, Scaly-breasted Hummingbird, two Green Kingfishers and a pair of very smart Riverside Wrens. A pale-billed Woodpecker drumming in the distance and the strident calling of a Bright-rumped Atilla added further atmosphere.

After breakfast we spent a little time admiring a Bare-throated Tiger-Heron at its nest high in a tree by the reception building then headed off to the nearby Carrera National Park. We spent the morning walking one of the trails through an area of old growth forest and saw a wonderful range of birds including Scarlet Macaws at a nest hole in a large riverside tree, Baird's and Black-throated Trogons, White-whiskered Puffbird, Blue-crowned Motmot, Squirrel Cuckoo, Buff-throated Foliage-gleaner, Rufous Piha and lots more. Early on in the proceedings we found an army ant swarm and had fantastic views of the attendant birds that included Chestnut-backed and Bi-coloured Antbirds, Barred and Tawny-winged Woodcreepers and Grey-headed Tanager. The whole morning was rounded off nicely with sightings of Central American Agoutis, Common Basilisk, Black-Spiny-tailed Iguana and good numbers of Leafcutter Ants.

After lunch back at Vila Lapas which was interrupted by a pair of Fiery-billed Aracaris that dropped into a fruiting fig tree on the lawn, we returned to Carrera. This time we walked a trail through an area of secondary forest and once again had a fairly lively time with good sightings of Chestnut-mandibled Toucan, Blue-throated Goldentail, Royal Flycatcher, Turquoise-browed Motmot, Barred and Black-hooded Antshrikes, Dusky Antbird, Rufous-breasted Wren and some more Scarlet Macaws. One lucky member of the group stumbled upon a Nine-banded Armadillo that made a very hasty getaway, but all of us enjoyed fabulous views of a troop of White-faced Capuchins who allowed a very close approach from us as they got on with their business. They were amazingly agile, using their prehensile tails to great advantage and it was lovely to watch them as they ate the fruit of some wild bananas and shredded the flowers for nectar and poked around among the branches peeling off areas of bark looking for insects.

Day 6

Friday 23rd January

Dawn at Vila Lapas today again produced good views of the Slaty-tailed Trogon plus Rose-throated Becard, a superb male Painted Bunting and a pair of Yellow-throated Euphonias. After breakfast we set out on a boat trip along the Tarcoles River and had a wonderful couple of hours during which we saw a full range of herons and egrets, White Ibis, Wood Stork, Roseate Spoonbill, Anhinga, Brown Pelican, Magnificent Frigatebird, various waders, Peregrine, Osprey, Mangrove Black Hawk, and Ringed and Amazon Kingfishers. In a narrow mangrove fringed creek we added Prothonotary and Mangrove Warblers, Mangrove Cuckoo, a surprise Raccoon and everything was rounded off nicely by lots of Crocodiles loafing on the mudflats and a number of good sized Spiny-tailed Iguanas.

From Tarcoles we headed north along the coast and made it to la Ensenada in time for lunch. In the mid-afternoon we set off for a stroll. White-throated Magpie-Jays and a couple of Black-headed Trogons got things off to a nice start, and a pair of Pacific Screech Owls roosting in a thicket down by the shore were a lovely sight. Down at the Salinas we found good numbers of birds pushed off the nearby mudflats by the high tide. These included several hundred each of Western and Semi-palmated Sandpipers; lots of Royal Terns and Laughing Gulls; dozens of Black-necked Stilts and Short-billed Dowitchers; a scattering of Least Sandpipers, Lesser Yellowlegs and Grey Plovers; a few Semi-palmated Plovers and Stilt Sandpipers, and at least one Wilson's Plover. A Peregrine zooming around and causing general alarm among the masses added some extra spice to the scene.

From the salinas we walked through scrub and grassland to a little lagoon a short way inland. Two Northern Scrub Flycatchers were a nice little bonus and at the lagoon there were Wood Stork, Roseate Spoonbill, Black-bellied Whistling Duck, Blue-winged Teal and a nice close Solitary Sandpiper. Best of all though was a Mexican Hairy Porcupine 12 feet up in a small tree happily munching on seed pods. What an amazing creature; sparse spines poking through dense fur, prehensile tail, a massive, moist, spongy pad of a nose, myopic little eyes, prominent black whiskers and huge yellow incisors – wow!

Finally, after negotiating a section of track flooded by the new moon spring tide, we made it back to the bus and finished an excellent day with a tree full of Mantled Howler Monkeys complete with a number of playful and very engaging youngsters.

Day 7

Saturday 24th January

We were out at dawn again and into a beautiful, still, sunny morning. A little pre-breakfast birding, principally by a flowering tree in the parking lot produced lovely views of Black-headed Trogon, Orange-fronted Parakeet and both Spot-breasted and Streak-backed Orioles. A Ferruginous Pygmy Owl in the trees behind our cabins just after breakfast was a good find and a couple of Double-striped Thick-Knees a little way down the road were an excellent start to the hour or so's drive across to Hacienda Solimar where we were to spend the morning. We met up with local guide Demetrio and then set off to explore this celebrated area. An exciting few hours ensued during which we saw a Jabiru Stork with two downy young on their nest high in a massive tree, two Spectacled Owls roosting in the depths of a wonderful tract of dry forest, a Laughing Falcon perched atop a distant tree and bracing itself against the keen breeze and at a small drying wetland, a throng of Black-bellied Whistling Ducks, some Northern Jacanas, a couple of Limpkins, a Snail Kite and a flyover Harris Hawk.

After lunch back at La Ensenada we went out on a late afternoon boat trip into the mangroves along the shores of the Gulf of Nicoya. Highlights here included several Black Skimmers roosting with a large group of Royal Terns, at least 15 Ospreys!, a Zone-tailed Hawk, lots of Whimbrel, several Willets, both Ringed and Belted Kingfishers and lovely views of Mangrove and Prothonotary Warblers. We arrived back at sunset to the sight of gangs of White-fronted Parrots assembling to roost in the trees by the cabins; a fine end to an enjoyable day.

Day 8

Sunday 25th January

An early morning walk around the lodge and along a track across pasture and along the edge of some woodland proved very productive. We saw many of yesterday morning's birds plus Lineated Woodpecker, Violaceous Trogon, Ruby-throated, Cinnamon and Steely-vented Hummingbirds, White-necked Puffbird, Masked Tityra, White-lored Gnatcatcher and Scrub Euphonia.

We left La Ensenada after a leisurely breakfast, noted a Grey Hawk and some Scissor-tailed Flycatchers as we drove along the exit tracks and then headed up into the mountains through a picturesque patchwork of forest, scrub, pasture and small, neat, farmsteads. After lunch in Santa Elena and then a little time to settle into our very comfortable accommodation we proceeded the short distance up to the so-called Hummingbird Gallery by the entrance to Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve.

Here we sat in comfort only feet away from a range of feeders that were positively buzzing with hummingbirds. Green-crowned Brilliants and Violet Sabrewings were the dominant species both in numbers, size and aggression but there were also good numbers of Purple-throated Mountain-gems and a scattering of Green Violet-ears, Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds and diminutive Copper-headed Emeralds, a Costa Rican endemic. A lone Green Hermit also put in an a few appearances and a superb male Magenta-throated Woodstar wowed everyone as it zapped around flashing its dazzling iridescent throat patch. A brief Emerald Toucanet in the trees around us added to the interest but a superb Olingo that descended from the roof and proceeded to empty a nectar feeder or two was a bonus indeed! Back at the hotel at the end of the afternoon the diehards finished the day with a short stroll during which we saw a Hoffman's Woodpecker peeking out of a nest hole, a Blue-crowned Motmot, a Grey-crowned Yellowthroat and some Yellow-faced Grassquits.

Day 9

Monday 26th January

An overcast, cool, windy and drizzly day - welcome to the cloud forest! Morning and afternoon walks in Monteverde gave us a good opportunity to appreciate this lovely forest and despite the inclement weather we saw a satisfying range of quality birds which included a female Quetzal, a couple of Orange-bellied Trogons, two Black Guans, a troop of Azure-hooded Jays and a Prong-billed Barbet, plus Spotted Woodcreeper, Lineated Foliage-gleaner, Spotted Barbtail, Streak-breasted Tree-hunter, Three-striped Warbler, Slate-throated Whitestart and Chestnut-capped Brushfinch.

Day 10

Tuesday 27th January

We awoke to another windy, wet dawn and after breakfast set off through the mountains towards Arenal. We enjoyed some good views of a pair of roadside Keel-billed Toucans en route and stopped for coffee at Nuevo Arenal where we saw a Grey Hawk upsetting a group of noisy Grey-headed Chachalacas. We arrived at Arenal observatory Lodge in time for lunch and after settling in, spent the afternoon dodging the rain showers and birding from the restaurant deck area and around the gardens. We had a good time of it too with lovely views of White-nosed Coatis with babies, a superb Tamandua and a couple of Spider Monkeys plus an exciting range of birds that included Great Curassow, Violaceous Trogon, Montezuma's Oropendola, Chestnut-mandibled Toucan, Collared Aracari, Red-lored Parrot, Brown Violetear, Violet-headed Hummingbird, Black-faced Solitaire, Black-cowled Oriole, Emerald, Golden-hooded and Bay-headed Tanagers and Black-striped Sparrow – not bad!

Day 11

Wednesday 28th January

More heavy rain saw us restricted to a covered viewing deck by the restaurant for our early morning birding where we saw a good number of familiars plus a very nice little male Green Thorntail feeding at some verbena flowers. A Broad-billed Motmot along the lodge's entrance track concluded our time at Arenal before we continued our journey down onto the Caribbean slope. We made a roadside stop in some fields between La Fortuna and Muelle to look at a rather bedraggled Laughing Falcon in a roadside tree and this in turn led us to a lovely Olive-throated Parakeet perched close by and a large flock of Bronzed Cowbirds, Red-winged Blackbirds and Dickcissels feeding out in the fields.

We stopped for coffee in Muelle where we admired a number of large Green Iguanas and enjoyed eyelevel views of a smart Streak-headed Woodcreeper and then continued on through more-or-less continuous rain to Puerto Viejo de Sarapiquí and so to Sueno Azul. After a lunch interrupted by a lovely Long-billed Hermit investigating the spiders webs among the rafters of the open air restaurant we settled into our rooms then set out to explore. A productive afternoon ensued. Highlights included a couple of Green Ibis roosting in the lakeside trees by our rooms, Green and Ringed Kingfishers, Mealy and Red-lored Parrots, Collared Aracari, Lineated and Black-cheeked Woodpeckers, Cinnamon Becard, White-ringed Flycatcher and Bay Wren.

Day 12

Thursday 29th January

After an early breakfast which was enlivened by an Orange-billed Sparrow and a Barred Woodcreeper by the restaurant we drove the short distance to the La Selva reserve. Here we spent the morning walking the trails in the company of Rodolfo the chief guide. The weather was to some extent against us but in between the bouts of

rain we enjoyed a range of excellent sightings and a very interesting introduction to this fabulous forest. Bird highlights included Rufous Motmot, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Chestnut-coloured Woodpecker, Violaceous, Black-throated and Slaty-tailed Trogons, Fasciated Antshrike, Black-throated Wren and Olive-backed Euphonia. Other goodies included a fine Hoffman's Two-toed Sloth in full view preening its dense fur and then clambering around eating leaves – excellent! In the late morning the rain set in with some vigour so after looking at a roosting Vermiculated Screech Owl we retreated back to Sueno Azul for an early lunch.

In the afternoon we returned to La Selva but after a short time in the clearing during which we had excellent views of some Collared Aracaris, two male White-collared Manakins and a female Snowy Cotinga, the rain set in again. We persisted for a while, saw a roosting Crested Owl and enjoyed close encounters with groups of White-faced Capuchins and Mantled Howlers but it really was very wet and so, a little earlier than planned, we called it a day and returned to Sueno Azul to dry out.

Day 13

Friday 30th January

After another early breakfast we boarded the bus and headed out of Sueno Azul. A pair of White-whiskered Puffbirds and a Stripe-breasted Wren by the river bridge on the way out were good starters and a little over an hour later we arrived at the mid-altitude valley of La Virgen de Socorro. It was overcast, warm and dry but for a few brief spells of drizzle; perfect conditions for birding at this site and we weren't to be disappointed. A couple of hours wandering slowly down the track towards the river admiring the forest and the views brought us a superb range of birds. Highlights included male Collared Trogon, White Hawk, Smoky-brown Woodpecker, Olivaceous and Spotted Woodcreepers, a couple of Red-faced Spinetails, Tufted Flycatcher, Crimson-collared and Olive Tanagers, Tropical Parula, a couple of Blackburnian Warblers and outstandingly, a male Red-headed Barbet – a real “wow!” bird.

We finished the morning at a rustic café at Cinchona, a little further up the road. Here, over coffee and empanadas we savoured close up views of Emerald Toucanets, Prong-billed Barbets and a range of hummingbirds including a couple of the endemic Coppery-headed Emeralds. Not a bad morning really!

After lunch and a short siesta back at Sueno Azul we explored along the entrance track again and had an excellent last birding session. We saw Rufous-winged and Black-cheeked Woodpeckers, Scarlet-thighed and Blue Dacnis, Shining Honeycreeper, Mealy Parrot, Olive-throated Parakeet, five distant Great Green Macaws, Long-tailed Tyrant, a surprise Bay-breasted Warbler, Laughing Falcon and to finish, a Short-tailed Nighthawk zooming around over the river at sunset – lovely!

Day 14

Saturday 31st January

With breakfast completed and a last few birds seen, we boarded the bus for the drive back through the mountains to the Central Valley and San Jose. We broke the journey for coffee and arrived at San Jose in good time. The check-in went smoothly, our early afternoon flight was on time and soon we were all UK bound with our heads full of images and memories of our Costa Rican adventure.

Day 15

Sunday 1st February

Our flight landed back in the UK and another Naturetrek adventure came to an end.
