Day 1

Monday 20th November

All the people who participated in the previous Bolivia lowlands tour were now ready to discover the highlands! Our plane from Sta Cruz to Cochabamba was at 9 in the morning, so we took advantage of birding at the Viru-Viru airport first (we counted these species as part of the lowland tour). We arrived to Cochabamba at 10 and went to the Alalay Lake where we had a great time watching the water birds. Fulvous Whistling-Ducks, Cinnamon Teal, Rosy-billed Pochard, Andean Ruddy Ducks and many others were seen. The most exciting for some people was the Plumbeous Rail. We met Nancy at the airport who joined us for the highland tour and everyone went together to drop the bags at Casa Campestre and have some lunch. In the afternoon we went to a place called La zona Franca and where we spent the whole afternoon. We had good views of Yellow winged Blackbird, Andean Avocet, Wren-like Rushbird, White-tipped Plantcutter, Many-coloured Rush Tyrant and also Red backed Sierra Finch.

Day 2

Tuesday 21st November

We had to drive to the Highlands and the very first birds that we saw from the bus were Ornate Tinamou. We kept driving in the direction of Chapare which is in cloudforest (Yungas). The idea was to go to the lower part but light was good and birds were very good in the upper Chapare so we started our birding there. We were very lucky indeed; a lot of exciting birds were waiting for us. The first ones to give us a welcome were some of the endemics, Hooded Mountain Toucan, Black throated Thistletail and Rufous naped Brush Finch with great views of these birds near the road. After coffee and tea that Leo prepared for us we kept birding in the same place and everyone got very excited when I said that there was a Barred Fruiteater calling. It could not have been better, this beautiful bird was close and stayed sitting on a branch for long time so we saw him very well. We went lower down until we reached the electrical power station where we walked along the road and saw Crested Quetzal, Yungas Mannakin, Bolivian Tyrannulet, and White eared Solitaire. Some people were very lucky and saw Diademed Tapaculo. The afternoon got very busy with so many Tanagers but the most exciting one was the Blue naped Clorophonia. On the way back we got sightings of Versicolored Barbet and many others. We started our way back to Cochabamba arriving there late in the afternoon. The day ended with a lovely buffet for dinner.

Day 3

Wednesday 22nd November

We went in the same direction as the previous day but we stayed at the higher elevation in the direction of Tablas Monte. Our first stop, at the entrance of the gravel road, is where we saw a Light crowned Spinetail nesting, also Rufous Antpitta, followed by a Slaty Tanager. We had wonderful sightings of hummingbirds such as Collared Inca, which has an orange colour, Violet-throated Starfrontlet, and Tyrian Metaltail. When we started the gravel road, it was superb birding and we saw the incredible Scarlet bellied and Chesnut bellied Mountain Tanagers, within the same flock as Pearled Tree-runner, and many others. Further along this road we saw a Great-bellied Flowerpiercer, Blue-backed Cornbill and the very attractive Rust and yellow Tanager. After lunch when the rain stopped we went lower down but the rain got harder so we started our way back to Cochabamba. The plan was to stop a bit higher up in a place called Corani which is a dam. There we saw some of the water birds but on the road, when Peter announced a sighting of a Red backed Hawk, we stopped and also saw a Rusty vented Canastero which came close to us. We finished this day happy and tired and ready for a nice shower.

Day 4

Thursday 23rd November

We went in the direction of Cerro Tunari and it turned out to be one of the most exiting days of birding in the entire trip, there are such good birds in this area. During the morning we managed to do a lot of good birding and had really good views of Bolivian Blackbird, Bolivian Warbling Finch, Rufous sided Warbling Finch Maquis Canastero and Gray-hooded Parakeet sitting on the cliff. The most beautiful displays of hummingbirds were seen as they fed on mimosa flowers. Giant Hummingbird was present, as was Red-tailed Comet, and Sparkling violet Ears. In addition to all of this we saw Rock Earthcreeper and Brown capped Tit-Spinetail. Just before we crossed the landslide we were amazed to spot a Cochabamba Mountain Finch which was sitting on top of a bush and a few minutes later a Rufous bellied Saltator was showing off near by. We kept driving to the Polyepis to see more highland birds, but an Andean Condor come flying by so we stopped to watch it. That afternoon we spent in the very high antiplano and we manage to see other good birds like Andean Swallow, White winged Diuca Finch, Black winged and Bare faced Ground Doves. But other beautiful birds were waiting for us on the way back and some of them were incredibly good, what a fabulous view of the Wedge tailed Hillstar and Olive crowned Crescent-chest. Some people also saw a White bellied Nothura running away from us. We spent another night in Casa Campestre.

Day 5

Friday 24th November

We had a very long drive from Cochabamba to Oruro, driving along the beautiful antiplano with several stops along the way, where we managed to see good birds for the area, like Common Miner and Streak-fronted Thornbird which was nesting. We had to do a mandatory stop for coca tea at 4000 thousand meters and after went to look for some of the good birds there when suddenly an Aplomado Falcon came flying by with its prey. Then a Cordilleran Canastero and D'Orbigny's Chat Tyrant was sitting on a fence post and we had good sightings of it. We kept driving in the direction to Oruro but after lunch we saw Short billed Pipit and Brith rumped Yellow Finch. The only bad thing was that the bus broke down half on hour away from Oruro and we had to wait for 3 hours until Leo fixed the bus. We arrived in Oruro in the late afternoon, went to the hotel, had a good dinner, and went to sleep early to be ready for the next day.

Day 6

Saturday 25th November

We travelled from Oruro to La Paz, but before we went to visit the Uru Uru lake that we could not visit the day before and it was quite disappointing because the lake was dry and there were not many flamingos, but we did at least manage to see the Chilean and Andean species, and also got great views of Puna Plovers and Andean Negritos. There were many other water birds that we had seen before and we had good views of them very close up. We left Oruro around 10 am to La Paz. The driving was spectacular, the scenery was amazing and we saw a group of Andean Lapwing. We also encountered a group of Vicuñas crossing the road. Along the way we managed to see some birds such as Black Siskin, Band-tailed Sierra Finch, and other birds that we have seen before. We arrived to La Paz in the afternoon and we stayed in the centre of the city.

Day 7

Sunday 26th November

We departed from La Paz very early in the direction of the very famous “road of death” (Carretera de la muerte) towards Coroico. The first bird that we saw at La Cumbre near the lake was the very charismatic Andean Goose, followed by the Fulvous Whistling Duck. Our aim was to get lower down and look for other birds notably the Black hooded Sunbeam. En route we saw Tawny Tit Spine tail and Scribble tailed Canastero.

The birding was very active and I wanted to find the Sunbeam but with no luck. Instead we had lovely views of White browed Conebill and Black throated Flowerpiercer. After this we had lunch at the entrance of Chuspipata and afterwards walked along the road and observed Amethyst throated Sunangel and an incredible view of the Band tailed Fruiteater. We were determined to get to the top of the highlands, to a place called La Cumbre to look for other birds where Moustached Flowerpiercer, Great Sapphirewinged and Andean Gulls were flying above us. At La Cumbre we saw Slender-billed Miner and Spot billed Ground Tyrant. We got back to the hotel in the afternoon.

Day 8

Monday 27th November

We did almost the same route as the previous day but instead of going to Chuspipata we turned to the right in the direction of Chulumani and this was the place for my target Sunbeam. Very close to the main road we had a wonderful view of the Scarlet-bellied Mountain Tanager. We kept driving down and we managed to get a very good flock with several birds that we had seen before. Just on the bridge we did a quick stop and Francis said that he had seen a black and white bird so we thought it would be a duck or a dipper and I said it was worth finding out. I almost fainted when Peter said he was watching a Black hooded Sunbeam! It was in the open good light and good pictures, a real winner for me! Enjoying the scenery and driving down to look for more birds we carried on to the river but no Torrent Ducks. The weather was good and the birding also with Hooded Mountain Tanagers and Collared Jays moving around us. Coming back again we tried for the Gray bellied Seedsnipe and we were lucky when we saw a pair of them very close. We arrived to La Paz late in the afternoon.

Day 9

Tuesday 28th November

We headed towards the famous Titicaca Lake where our big target was the Titicaca Grebe. We succeeded in having very good views of them several times over as well as many other water birds. We also saw Puna Snipe and Grassland Yellow- Finch. The next destination was a dam, where the highlight was Giant Coot nesting. It was decided to drive back to the Titicaca Lake and we did a little bit of culture in the afternoon with some

shopping. The cultural activity we saw was the local weaving of the reeds, which they make boats, sofas and other items out of, and cloth weaving. We arrived back in La Paz fairly early as some people wanted to wander around the town to see the sights.

Summary

We managed to see the vast majority of the birds we were looking for and I would like to thank the entire group for another successful and enjoyable trip!

Species list
