

Colombia - Santa Marta Endemics

Naturetrek Tour Report

21 - 30 October 2016

Day 1

Friday 21st October

Overnight flight from the UK to Bogota

Day 2

Saturday 22nd October

After flying in from the UK or staying overnight in Bogota, the two components of the group met up and left our Bogota hotel at dawn. With Oswaldo our guide for the day and Freddy our driver we headed out across the waking city. We ate breakfast in a café and started the birding in some trees nearby with sightings of Speckled Parrotlet, Fork-tailed Flycatcher, Tennessee Warbler, Rusty Flowerpiercer and Summer Tanager.

An hour or so later we were at Florida Lake where we spent the rest of the morning exploring the marshy areas and parkland around the lakeshore. We saw a wide range of birds in a short time including a number of local specialities. Highlights included Bogota Rail, Spot-flanked Gallinule, Silvery-throated Spinetail, Sub-tropical Doradito and Rusty-browed Conebill.

After a delicious roast chicken lunch in a nearby restaurant known to Freddy we returned to the airport for our flight north to the Caribbean coast. Everything went smoothly and at the end of the afternoon we touched down in hot and humid Riohacha and met up with Gabo, our guide for the week and our two drivers. After noting Carib Grackles, Grey Kingbirds and a Yellow Oriole in the bushes around the airport carpark we drove the short distance to our hotel in the town centre.

Day 3

Sunday 23rd October

We left our Riohacha hotel just before dawn and by 6am we were out and birding around the dry forest, scrub and lagoons of the Los Flamencos National Park. An initial pre-breakfast session in the relative cool of the early morning started at an electric pace with a parade of outstanding birds that included Vermilion Cardinal, Chestnut Piculet, Black-crested Antshrike, Orinoco Saltator, Ruby-Topaz Hummingbird, White-whiskered Spinetail and Bare-eyed Pigeon.

After all this excitement we retired to a beachside restaurant run by the local Wayuu people for a much needed breakfast. Green-rumped Parrotlets sat about in the adjacent trees whilst Brown Pelicans and Greater Frigatebirds cruised around offshore. Breakfast completed we explored further. First at an intertidal area where we found a pair of Double-striped Thick-knees, a Reddish Egret and a big roost of Royal Terns and Black Skimmers, then in another scrubby area where we had great views of a couple of Bicoloured Wrens and four Russet-throated Puffbirds. In Camarones town we added Glaucous Tanager to the list and back at our beachside restaurant at lunchtime we found a Lesser Nighthawk roosting in the trees. A pretty good morning all in all!

In the afternoon we drove west along the coast towards Santa Marta. We made one principal stop at a roadside café overlooking a river flanked with humid forest where we saw Orange-chinned Parakeets, Blue-headed Parrots, Collared Aracaris and Green Kingfishers and then we pushed on to Santa Marta itself. From here we turned inland and up and finally arrived at our hotel in Minca at dusk, in good time to settle in before dinner.

Day 4

Monday 24th October

We started the day on the hotel veranda enjoying the lively activity of the hummingbirds coming in to the feeders. Most numerous were White-necked Jacobins and Steely-vented Hummingbirds but there were also several Rufous-tailed Hummingbirds and a couple of White-vented Plumeleeters. A smart Golden-winged Sparrow hopping around on the bird table added a touch of class to the proceedings and this was augmented by the thrilling sight of a group of Military Macaws flying over in the distance.

After breakfast we took to the vehicles and headed up the mountain to see what we could find. We made a series of stops during the course of the morning at fruiting trees and along forest trails and saw a very satisfying range of birds. Among the highlights were a trio of Black-and-white Owls, a soaring Grey-lined Hawk, a pair of Santa Marta Foliage-Gleaners, a perched Pale-bellied Hermit, a neat little Pale-eyed Pygmy-Tyrant, a Rufous-and-white Wren and a diminutive Scaled Piculet.

We returned to the hotel for lunch and then after a siesta during which it rained we headed out on foot along a trail into the forest on the edge of town. This proved to be very productive and in a short space of time we had fabulous views of a pair of Keel-billed Toucans, a troop of noisy Black-chested Jays, a trio of smart Swallow Tanagers and another superb little Scaled Piculet. Other goodies included Blue-headed Parrot, Olivaceous Flatbill, Coopman's Tyrannulet, Yellow-fronted Greenlet and Chestnut-collared Swift.

Day 5

Tuesday 25th October

We left Minca after breakfast and began the journey up to El Dorado Lodge. A series of stops through the course of the morning as we slithered and bumped our way up produced a good range of birds including Bat Falcon, Squirrel Cuckoo, Santa Marta Antbird, Venezuelan Tyrannulet, Rufous-breasted Wren, White-lored Warbler and Black-headed Tanager. We arrived at the beautifully positioned El Dorado Lodge at noon and then, after lunch and a siesta, set out on foot to explore around the lodge and up the track through the surrounding forest. Despite the showery weather we encountered an interesting range of birds and enjoyed good views of Band-tailed Guans, Santa Marta Woodstar, Orange-breasted Fruiteater, Black-capped Tanager, Blue-naped Chlorophonia and Santa Marta Brush-Finch.

Day 6

Wednesday 26th October

We were up and away well before dawn and by first light we were at the top of the San Lorenzo Ridge at an altitude of over 9000 feet looking across to the snow-capped peak of the mighty Pico Cristobal Colon. We were in an area of scrubby, open cloud forest and on the trail of some very special and localized birds. Diversity was low but quality was high and in an exciting couple of hours we saw Scaly-naped Parrot, Strong-billed Woodcreeper, Rusty-headed Spinetail, Santa Marta Bush-Tyrant, Santa Marta and Buff-breasted Mountain-Tanagers, Santa Marta Warbler, Golden-crowned Whitestart and Golden-bellied Grosbeak. Dropping down a little we added Yellow-breasted Chat-Tyrant, Santa Marta Wood-Wren and Paramo Seed-eater and then further down again in taller forest we finished the morning with good views of a couple of White-tipped Quetzals, a male Masked Trogon, two Streak-capped Spinetails and a Sierra Nevada Brushfinch.

We arrived back at El Dorado for lunch just as part of a mixed flock was passing through and we enjoyed some lovely views of Montane Woodcreeper, Montane Foliage-Gleaner, Slate-throated Whitestart and Golden-crowned Flycatcher in rapid succession. After lunch and a siesta during which it rained heavily we headed out again on foot down the track. Two Santa Marta (Emerald) Toucanets and both Band-tailed and Sickle-winged Guans were in the trees just outside the lodge and a big mixed flock came through which included Golden-breasted Fruiteater, Black-capped and Bay-headed Tanagers, Blue-naped Chlorophonia and Brown-capped Vireo.

A little later back at the viewing deck outside the lodge we had lovely views of a couple of smart Lazuline Sabrewings and then, at the end of the afternoon, some of us headed up the track in the fading light and finished a very satisfying day with a brief Barred Forest-Falcon and a close encounter with a Slaty-backed Nightingale-Thrush.

Day 7

Thursday 27th October

Today we dropped down to lower altitudes to see what we could find and in a morning that involved various short walks along the track we saw a satisfying range of interesting species which included Black-faced Woodquail, Groove-billed Toucanet, Blossomcrown, Long-billed Hermit, Moustached Puffbird, Black-hooded Thrush and an wonderful little Rusty-breasted Antpitta.

We returned to El Dorado for lunch and then, after another rainy siesta, we headed out for a local walk. The weather cleared for a while and the views down to the coast far below were spectacular but the birding was slow, with the chief highlights being a male White-tipped Quetzal and another Santa Marta Toucanet.

Day 8

Friday 28th October

Back up the track this morning we had a last bash at the mid-altitude Santa Marta birds and enjoyed good views of Masked Trogon, Tyrian Metaltail, Black-throated Tody-Tyrant, White-necked Thrush and Golden-breasted Fruiteater. We returned to El Dorado for lunch and then began the journey back down to Minca. A stop at a rustic trackside café produced fantastic encounters with a Long-billed Hermit and a White-tailed Starfrontlet; whilst a last late stop not far short of Minca brought our only monkeys of the trip in the form of some Red Howlers and a rush of birds which included Keel-billed Toucan, Collared Aracari, Pale-breasted Spinetail, Barred Antshrike and Golden-winged Warbler.

Thus we slithered and bumped our way back down to Minca on one of the worst roads in the world and arrived back at our familiar hotel in good time to settle in and enjoy a beer or two before dinner.

Day 9

Saturday 29th October

Early morning on the hotel veranda and in the garden brought us good views of a Squirrel Cuckoo, a Whooping Motmot, a trio of Bicoloured Wrens, a Boat-billed Flycatcher and a pair of Masked Tityras. After breakfast we drove down below Minca and walked along a forest track with extensive views over the rolling, forested hill country around us. The birding in the warm sunshine was productive and we saw a wide range of exciting species

including Black Hawk-Eagle, Scaled Pigeon, Black-backed Antshrike, Yellow-breasted Flycatcher, Lance-tailed Manakin and Orange-crowned Oriole.

We ate lunch back at the hotel and then in the mid-afternoon made our way down to Santa Marta city. After a brief supermarket stop to buy some local goodies we proceeded through heavy rain and arrived at the airport just as a seriously ferocious storm broke. The weather brought a certain degree of chaos to proceedings (at the airport) but we all eventually got airborne and escaped and after a mad-cap dash through Bogota airport, connected with our overnight flight back to the UK by the skin of our teeth. Phew! Naturetrek's inaugural Santa Marta tour had been successfully completed!

Day 10

Sunday 30th October
