Day 1

Thursday 17th January

Outbound to San Jose via Miami

Those who were travelling from the UK today left Heathrow on a 09.40 BA flight to Miami. Arriving on time early in the afternoon we negotiated immigration and settled down to wait for our mid-evening American Airlines flight to San Jose where we arrived on schedule at 21.55. After collecting our bags we met Simon and Santiago just outside the arrivals area. A short bus journey delivered us to the El Rodeo Country Inn where we quickly retired in anticipation of an early start and busy day ahead.

Day 2

Friday 18th January

Paraiso del Quetzales, Savegre Mountain Lodge

Weather: overcast with drizzle at Paraiso del Quetzal, bright, sunny and dry at Savegre. A little breezy at times, warm after a chilly start

After hot drinks at the hotel we set off through San Jose and soon began to climb into the highlands to the south. After 90 minutes we arrived at Paraiso del Quetzal where a few minutes on the lodge veranda gave us point-blank views of numerous Fiery-throated and Magnificent Hummingbirds plus a few Green Violetears and a single Volcano Hummingbird around the feeders and Yellow-thighed Finches and a Black-and-yellow Phainoptila in the bushes.

After a hearty breakfast we set off on a walk around the nearby pastures and cloudforest patches with local guide Jorge. After just a few minutes we were watching Resplendent Quetzals sitting quietly for the scope or buzzing about a group of avocado trees. Nearby a small group of Golden-browed Chlorophonias drew admiring comments and a few Wilson's Warblers and Sooty-capped Bush-tanagers came and went. Moving on after 30 minutes of admiring the Quetzals we found a single Hairy Woodpecker and a Black-billed Nightingale Thrush before a group of lovely Long-tailed Silky Flycatchers appeared in treetops as yet more Quetzals performed. Nearby a smart Northern Tufted Flycatcher put on a fine show and very nearby a similar looking, but rather larger and much rarer, Ochraceous Pewee posed nicely. As we slowly made our way back towards the lodge for lunch we stopped to view several Black-capped Flycatchers, Slaty Flowerpiercers, Large-footed Finches and an unusually showy Wrenthrush. At the lodge itself the hummingbird show continued and a couple of Flame-coloured Tanagers also appeared.

After lunch we drove for 45 minutes to Savegre Mountain Lodge where a couple of hours around the gardens there produced a host of new species including Scintillant and Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds and Grey-tailed Mountaingems at the feeders, Dark Pewee and Yellowish Flycatcher in a nearby glade, Sulphur-winged Parakeets overhead along with White-collared Swifts, Red-tailed and Broad-winged Hawks and, for some, a single Swallow-tailed Kite. Further exploration revealed a brief Collared Whitestart and a Yellow-bellied Siskin as Acorn Woodpeckers posed on a nearby dead tree. Traffic in San Jose caused us some delays on our return to the hotel but we arrived in ample time to shower and change before dinner.

Day 3

Saturday 19th January

En route to Villa Lapas; Tarcoles Estuary

Weather: sunny and warm/hot, quite humid on the Pacific coast, a little breezy at times

Early risers saw Great Kiskadees, Clay-colored Thrushes, American Yellow Warblers, White-winged and Inca Doves and Rufous-backed Wrens in the hotel grounds before breakfast, and our first mammal, Variegated Squirrel, was also noted. By 07.50 we were on our westward towards the Pacific Coast.

First stop today was at Rio Garita Reservoir where Blue-winged Teals and Least Grebes were on the water, Boat-billed Herons in the lakeside bushes and Yellow-crowned Euphonias were nesting in a power pole. Next up were three very obliging Gartered Trogons, a brief Squirrel Cuckoo, Yellow-throated and Philadelphia Vireos and a Lesser Greenlet. As the air began to warm raptors became prominent with, among the numerous Black and Turkey Vultures, Red-tailed, Broad-winged and Short-winged Hawks seen plus a Peregrine.

Continuing our journey we reached the Tarcoles Bridge by 10.30am and, after a coffee break at the cafe there, made our way onto the bridge where numerous huge American Crocodiles were on show and we found Northern Jacanas, Double-striped Thick-knees, Southern Lapwing and several other bits and pieces including a smart Yellow-headed Caracara and various Herons and Egrets. A few minutes drive then delivered us to Villa Lapas for a two night stay.

Those who explored the lodge grounds after lunch found Variable Seedeaters, Grey-capped Flycatchers and Golden-hooded Tanagers while the trails beyond held Dot-winged and Slaty Antwrens, Northern Bentbill, Painted Buntings and a Yellow-bellied Flycatcher.

At 14.45 we were on our way to the Tarcoles Estuary for an action-packed three hour cruise. An early surprise here was two male Yellow-billed Cotingas, a very rarely seen endangered species. Masses of Herons and Egrets included several Bare-throated Tiger Herons, Yellow-crowned Night Herons and a single Boat-billed Heron; five species of Kingfisher included, at the opposite ends of the size spectrum, a tiny American Pygmy and a gigantic Ringed Kingfisher. Magnificent Frigatebirds and Brown Pelicans flew over the river mouth while raptors included at least 15 Western Ospreys and several Common Black Hawks. Flying Scarlet Macaws showed to perfection and our first Black-mandibled Toucans performed nicely too. As we returned to shore at dusk numerous Lesser Nighthawks took to the air as a tame Tiger Heron plodded about next to the bus. Back at Villa Lapas some saw a pair of Spectacled Owls near the restaurant.

Day 4

Sunday 20th January

Villa Lapas; Carara NP

Weather: fine, mostly sunny, warm/hot and humid

Those who gathered at dawn for some birding around the grounds before breakfast were rewarded with our first Streaked and Boat-billed Flycatchers, Black-mandibled Toucan and Hoffman's Woodpeckers. By 07.15 we were on our way the short distance to Carara National Park's Oxbow Trail. Birding can be quite slow in the dense forest here but we were in luck today when, after just a few minutes we found a busy feeding flock, presumably associating with an ant swarm, that contained Chestnut-mantled and the much scarcer Bicolored Antbird, Rufous-and-white Wren, Slaty and Dot-winged Antwrens, Northern Barred Woodcreeper and Grey-headed Tanagers. Some saw a Northern Royal Flycatcher before a Black-hooded Antshrike performed for all, as did a perched Scarlet Macaw. We were then distracted for a few minutes by a small troop of White-faced Capuchin Monkeys. Returning to the birds we found Wedge-billed and Streak-headed Woodcreepers, Northern Bentbill, Yellow-margined and Dusky-capped Flycatchers and several others, including obliging Prothonotory Warblers and Common Tody Flycatchers at our turning around point. The return walk to the bus was a little quieter in the rising temperature but in quick succession we found Gartered, Bairds and Black-headed Trogons and some saw a brief Orange-collared Manakin.

Birding around Villa Lapas either side of lunch added Pale-billed and Lineated Woodpeckers and several previously seen species were noted there while those who opted to return to the National Park for an evening walk were rewarded with several Riverside Wrens, Black-throated Trogon, Plain Xenops, three Black-throated Antthrushes, Orange-billed Sparrows and a Great Tinamou.

Day 5

Monday 21st January

En route to Monteverde, Monteverde Hummingbird Gallery

Weather: Fine and warm at Villa Lapas, more overcast with sunny spells at Monteverde where there was a stiff breeze

Birding in the Villa Lapas grounds either side of breakfast produced a host of great birds, pride of place going to Fiery-billed Aracaris, Slaty-tailed Trogon and Long-tailed Manakin with the supporting cast including Pale-billed Woodpecker, Black-bellied Wren, Buff-rumped Warbler, Dusky Antbird and Rufous-tailed Jacamar.

By 09.45 we were on our way to Monteverde but a coffee stop along the Pacific Coast at Caldera produced a large flock of Laughing Gulls with a few Royal Terns and Willets mixed in as Magnificent Frigatebirds glided around. After lunch at the Hotel Montana in Monteverde, a quick look in the garden gave us a pair of Emerald Toucanets in a flowering tree that also held Blue-grey and Palm Tanagers and Several Baltimore Orioles, while nearby a pair of Golden-browed Chlorophonias showed well.

Soon afterwards we were on our way to the famous Monteverde Hummingbird Gallery where we spent a couple of hours enjoying close encounters with eight species of hummer, namely, Coppery-headed Emeralds, Stripe-throated Hummingbirds, Green-crowned Brilliants, Purple-throated Mountaingems, Green Violetears, Violet Sabrewings, Magenta-throated Woodstar and a Green Hermit. Several Bananaquits were also attracted to the feeders as, rather surprisingly, was an Olingo, a supposedly strictly nocturnal mammal!

Back at the hotel a quick look around the garden before the light faded gave us several White-fronted Amazons, Yellow-throated Euphonias and Bronzed Cowbirds among the numerous, and noisy Great-tailed Grackles. In a sheltered corner a Steely-vented Hummingbird showed well and a Central American Agouti trotted past.

Day 6

Tuesday 22nd January

Monteverde

Weather: mostly overcast with some light drizzle in the morning, sunnier and dry by late morning, warm after a chilly start

A rather blustery pre-breakfast session in the hotel garden was enlivened by the appearance of our first Blue-diademed Motmot and a confiding Central American Agouti. By 07.15 we were on our way to the Monteverde Cloudforest Preserve in the company of local guide Bernal. While the going was typically slow at times in the beautiful mossy forest, by the time we returned to the visitors centre around 11.00am we had amassed a very respectable list of species including Brown-hooded Parrots, several Slate-throated Redstarts and Grey-breasted Wood Wrens, Olive-striped and Yellowish Flycatchers, a couple of Ochraceous Wrens, Spotted Barbtail, Ruddy Treerunners, Prong-billed Barbets, Spangle-cheeked Tanagers and a Smoky-brown Woodpecker. Back at the car park a Magenta-throated Woodstar performed well at the feeders.

Those who returned to the cloudforest after lunch found Black-faced Solitaire, numerous Three-striped Warblers and a handful of Gold-crowned Warblers plus some furtive Chestnut-capped Brushfinches, brief Black-breasted Wood Quails, Olivaceous and Spotted Woodcreepers. Our turning around point was at a scenic waterfall where a Green-fronted Lancebill posed for the scope. On our way back to the hotel a quick stop at a roadside fruiting tree produced a surprise Townsend's Warbler while a Canivet's Emerald was in the hotel garden.

Day 7

Wednesday 23rd January

En route to Hacienda Solimar

Weather: sunny but breezy at Monteverde where a little chilly first thing; sunny and hot at Hacienda Solimar with a light but refreshing breeze

Highlights in the hotel grounds, either side of breakfast at 07.00, included stunning Elegant Euphonias, Grey-headed Chachalacas, Greyish Saltators and a scarce Yellow-bellied Sapsucker. By 09.00 we were on our way to the Northwest Pacific lowlands with a supermarket stop en route to pick up vital provisions for a three night stay at Hacienda Solimar. By noon we were settling in to our rooms at the hacienda and a little while later enjoying scope views of a Pacific Screech Owl in a large tree below the veranda.

As the midday heat began to subside we set off with local guide Demetrio to explore some of the wetland habitats of the extensive Solimar ranch. A couple of Double-striped Thick-knees showed well at the roadside before we reached the first wetter areas where birds came thick and fast. Amongst the numerous Herons, including several Bare-throated Tiger Herons, we found a few Limpkins, a distant Jabiru and masses of Wood Storks and Black-bellied Whistling Ducks. Snail Kites showed well and our only Harris's Hawk was found. At a wooded patch a pair of Lesser Nighthawks was watched roosting, a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher was found and we scoped our first Mantled Howler Monkeys in a flowering tree. Back in the open areas a Peregrine was watched upsetting the huge flocks of Whistling Ducks and Blue-winged Teals and a couple of American Coots were noted. Returning towards the lodge we stopped to view a few Killdeers and Least Sandpipers at muddy field margins. After dinner some saw a rather distant Pauraque in the spotlight.

Day 8

Thursday 24th January

Hacienda Solimar

Weather: Sunny and hot

Early risers gathered on the road below the hacienda at 05.45am and enjoyed excellent views of White-fronted Amazons and both Spot-breasted and Streak-backed Orioles while a sumptuous Turquoise-browed Motmot was right next to the lodge as we returned for breakfast.

Our morning excursion took us to an area of dry forest where we found our first Ferruginous Pygmy Owl which was intermittently mobbed by a host of smaller birds including Scrub Greenlets, Green-breasted Mangos and Red-legged Honeycreepers. Mantled Howlers also put on a good show while Dusky Antbirds furtively crept about in the undergrowth. Returning towards the lodge we stopped at a wetland area where we found a good gathering of Muscovy Ducks. A little later we stopped at a drying water hole where, amongst the thronging Wood Stork, we were able to watch four Jabirus at close range along with a few Roseate Spoonbills and collection of Herons. Back at the lodge a Ferruginous Pygmy Owl was visible from the veranda and gave great scope views of its false eyes.

An afternoon return to the ranch's open areas and scattered woodland patches gave us a surprise Northern Harrier and our first Brown-crested Flycatchers and a Northern Beardless Tyrannulet as numerous White-

collared Seedeaters put on a good show. The undoubted highlight this afternoon though was a superb Laughing Falcon that posed in a bare tree next to the bus as we returned towards the hacienda.

Day 9

Friday 25th January

Hacienda Solimar incl. Colorado Salinas

Weather: sunny and hot

A pre-breakfast walk near the hacienda was enlivened by the appearance of our first spectacular White-throated Magpie-jays, also seen were two Lineated Woodpeckers and the usual raucous gathering of White-fronted Amazons plus a few, more melodic, Yellow-naped Amazons. After breakfast we visited a different area of woodland, with a stop en route to watch Stripe-throated Sparrows at the roadside. By far the rarest bird found this morning was an uncharacteristically obliging Lesser Ground Cuckoo that even posed for the scope for a few minutes. Further highlights included a perched Collared Forest Falcon, Olive Sparrow and a Grey-crowned Yellowthroat and we had the opportunity to scrutinise the numerous Ground Doves, finding a couple of scarce Plain-breasted in the process. Blue-black Grassquits showed well and as we returned towards the bus our first Montezuma Oropendolas put on a good show.

After lunch we drove for 40 minutes to Colorado Salinas to watch the high tide gathering of shorebirds driven off the nearby Gulf of Nicoya. Western and Semipalmated Sandpipers were abundant along the edge of the salt pans while the largest pool held a fine collection of birds including Willets and Marbled Godwits, Short-billed Dowitchers, Stilt Sandpiper and a couple of Red Knot. A group of Black Skimmers suddenly appeared overhead and some saw Gull-billed and Royal Terns too as Magnificent Frigatebirds and a Common Black Hawk drifted over. Turning our attention to the mangrove edge we enticed several Mangrove Warblers into view along with several Prothonotory Warblers. A final check of the shorebirds (before we retreated to the air con on the bus) revealed singles of Semipalmated and Wilson's Plovers. An indefatigable few who continued birding after our return to the Hacienda were rewarded with scope views of a pair of White-tailed Kites.

Day 10

Saturday 26th January

En route to Arenal; Arenal Observatory Lodge

Weather: mostly fine though intermittently overcast at Arenal with some short showers in the evening

A final look around the Hacienda area before breakfast gave us further views of several previously seen species plus a couple of Black-crowned Tityras. After saying goodbye to the friendly staff at Hacienda Solimar we set off inland towards Lake Arenal, stopping after two hours for refreshments at a bakery in Nuevo Arenal where our first White-crowned Parrots were seen. A 90 minute stop at Old Tabacon Road at the far end of Lake Arenal produced a fine selection of new birds now that we were on the Caribbean Slope. Pride of place went to a rare Keel-billed Motmot but also seen here were Black Phoebe, Long-tailed Tyrants, Bay-headed and Passerini's Tanagers, a furtive Barred Antshrike and a perched Double-toothed Kite.

Continuing towards Arenal Observatory Lodge, our base for one night, a Broad-billed Motmot was watched on an overhead wire and on arrival at the lodge itself we spent 40 minutes at the viewing platform seeing numerous

Montezuma Oropendolas plus a selection of Tanagers, including our first Tooth-billeds, and both Red-legged and Green Honeycreepers visiting the feeders as a Grey-chested Dove, Black-striped Sparrow and several White-nosed Coatis trotted about picking up scraps below. Arenal Volcano continues to be rather inactive but we had a good view of most of the cone before the cloud descended later in the day. Driving the short distance to our rooms we drew to a sharp halt when a spectacular Great Curassow was seen strolling around the lawns and flowerbeds and remained around for photos after we disembarked.

A walk through the lodge grounds then gave us Violet-headed Hummingbirds, and, for, some White-necked Jacobins and a Stripe-throated Hermit, at the flowering hedges while Black-cowled Oriole, a rare Rufous-winged Tanager, Olive-backed Euphonias and Black-billed and our first Keel-billed Toucans were in the trees.

Day 11

Sunday 27th January

Arenal; en route to Selve Verde; Selve Verde

Weather: overcast at Arenal; sunnier, warmer and quite humid at Selve Verde

Exploration of the Arenal Lodge grounds either side of breakfast gave us our first White-ringed Flycatcher, Crested Guans and Black-cheeked Woodpeckers plus a brief Carmiol's Tanager, Tawny-capped Euphonias, Rose-breasted Grosbeak and great views of several White-necked Jacobins. As we were leaving a pair of Broad-billed Motmots posed on wires. Ninety minutes later we stopped for coffee at Muelle where several very large Green Iguanas took a photocall in the riverside trees.

By 12.30 we were at Selve Verde and soon settling into our rooms for a three night stay. After lunch a stroll around the grounds produced a Fasciated Tiger Heron, and several previously seen wetland species, on the river while careful checking of the vultures overhead gave us a Short-tailed Hawk and, a little later, a single King Vulture. A large flock of White-collared Swifts here was a bit of a surprise, less so the small numbers of Grey-rumped Swifts mixed in with them. Chestnut-backed Antbirds, Red-throated Ant Tanagers and White-breasted Wood Wrens crept furtively through the undergrowth and a few Orange-billed Sparrows and Grey-headed Chachalacas were seen. Those who remained out until dusk were rewarded with a brief view of a flying Short-tailed Nighthawk. Just before dinner a couple of Red-eyed Tree Frogs were seen at the pool below the restaurant.

Day 12

Monday 28th January

Virgen de Socorro, El Tapir, near La Selva

Weather: mostly sunny, dry and hot but more overcast at cooler El Tapir

After breakfast at 05.30 we were on our way to Virgen de Socorro in the Caribbean foothills by 06.00 and arrived there after 45 minutes. Walking slowly down the road towards the river we came across several new species including Blackburnian Warbler, a brief Shining Honeyeater, Long-billed Gnatwren, Bright-rumped Atilla and Paltry Tyrannulet. Down at the river we found a pair of American Dippers and, as the air began to warm, raptors began to appear and we enjoyed some excellent views of a White Hawk, a pair of Barred Hawks and both Short-winged and Broad-winged Hawks. A 15 minute drive took us to a small roadside cafe with feeders that held a

Red-headed Barbet and several Silvery-throated Tanagers while we reacquainted ourselves with a few hummers such as Green-crowned Brilliants and Violet Sabrewings.

Back at Selve Verde we had an early lunch and were on the road again at 13.30pm, a 45 minute drive taking us the abandoned butterfly garden at El Tapir. This site can be a bit hit or miss but during our 45 minute stay today it was very busy as the flowers in the garden attracted several new hummers: three gorgeous male Snowcaps, three Green Thorntails and a splendid Black-crested Coquette that posed for the scope.

Satisfied with this haul we retraced our route towards Selve Verde but turned off to explore the edge of the La Selva Reserve for the remainder of the evening. Fruiting bushes attracted plenty of Tanagers and our first Rufous-winged Woodpecker was found. Our primary objective here though was Great Green Macaw and we eventually spotted a pair in flight that conveniently settled into a bare tree for good scope views. A Three-toed Sloth also gave good scope views here and we noted our first Olive-throated Parakeets as large numbers of Red-ored Parrots appeared. The final action of a busy day came when a pair of Scarlet Macaws winged in and began excavating a nest hole in a large tree right above the bus.

Day 13

Tuesday 29th January

La Selva

Weather: Overcast with occasional showers, drier in the afternoon, rather humid

Another early breakfast saw us arrive at La Selva Biological Station soon after 06.20am. New birds came thick and fast, first up was a Black-thighed Grosbeak in a bare treetop at the car park while just around the corner were saw, in quick succession, Cinnamon Woodpeckers and Black-throated Saltators. A furtive Great Antshrike took a little coaxing into view but eventually most of us had good views. Fruiting bushes near the canteen attracted lots of birds - most unexpected but very welcome was a smart White-ruffed Manakin, then, a few minutes later, a cracking White-collared Manakin. Short-billed Pigeons posed on wires as Olive-throated and Orange-chinned Parakeets joined numerous Montezuma Oropendolas attracted to a large flowering tree. Nearby, a large group of Collared Aracaris appeared in nearby treetops for excellent views and soon afterwards a pair of Great Curassows was wandering around the grounds as Grey-rumped Swifts fluttered overhead.

Eventually we made our way across the suspension bridge to explore the old growth forest beyond. It was predictably a little quieter here but a Three-toed Sloth was seen just before we entered the trail, as was a Scarlet-rumped Cacique, and by the time we returned to the bridge area a little over 90 minutes later we'd seen several Collared Peccary's, a lekking Stripe-throated Hermit, a very fine Crested Owl and a Black-throated Trogon. Back at the canteen the two Manakin species were still showing in the fruiting bushes and a group of Crested Guans wandered across the lawn.

Back at Selve Verde for lunch and a rest those who opted to carry on birding were well rewarded when a pair of Sunbitterns appeared on the river and a mixed feeding flock in the wooded areas held Plain-billed Woodcreeper, Eye-ringed Flatbill and Stripe-breasted Wren amongst others. Some saw a Strawberry Poison Dart Frog near the restaurant before we returned to La Selva for some final birding. This proved a rather productive session as Chestnut-coloured Woodpecker, Bay Wren and Dusky-faced Tanagers were found near the canteen and a Wood Thrush, Slaty-tailed Trogons, Grey-headed Kite and a scarce Blue-chested Hummingbird were found along the

trails. Back at the canteen area some Chestnut-headed Oropendolas joined their relatives in the flowering tree, a Cinnamon Becard put in a brief appearance before the calls of Band-backed Wrens eventually led us to some reasonable views of these surprisingly large birds. Back at Selve Verde we ate a final dinner together before completing the last checklist of the tour.

Day 14

Wednesday 30th January

En route to San Jose; inbound to London via Miami

Weather: fine

Early risers added one further species to our list in the shape of a Long-billed Hermit and the Sunbitterns were again on view at the river. After breakfast we loaded the bus and took the scenic route back to San Jose via a coffee stop in the hills above the Central Valley, arriving at the airport in plenty of time for the 13.50 flight to Miami at the start of the long journey home

Day 15

Thursday 31st January

Arrival in UK
