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Day 1

Sunday 3rd February

Outbound to San Jose via Miami

Everyone gathered at London Heathrow for a 09.40 BA flight to Miami. An onward flight to the Costa Rican capital of San Jose arrived a little ahead of time at 22.05 (local) and after collecting bags we made our way to the nearby El Rodeo Country Inn for some welcome rest.

Day 2

Monday 4th February

Paraiso del Quetzales, Savegre Mountain Lodge

Weather: sunny and warm after a chilly start at Paraiso del Quetzal, overcast with sunny spells and some light drizzle at Savegre; a little breezy at times

Hot drinks and cake at 05.45 preceded a journey of just over 90 minutes into the mountains to the south of San Jose. Arriving at Paraiso del Quetzales we immediately made our way to the small veranda where masses of Fiery-throated and Magnificent Hummingbirds were congregated at the feeders. In the 15 minutes before breakfast was served we also found a few Green Violetears and a Volcano Hummingbird with Yellow-thighed Finches, Sooty-capped Bush tanagers and a few other bits and pieces in the nearby shrubs. After breakfast we set off with local guide Jorge on an exploration of the immediate area. A small feeding flock held Ruddy Treerunner, Hairy Woodpecker, Olive-striped Flycatcher and a couple of exquisite Collared Whitestarts; some also saw Golden-browed Chlorophonia before we pressed on, stopping to admire some splendid Long-tailed Silky-flycatchers and Sooty Thrushes in the lodge gardens.

Resplendent Quetzal is always a major target here and soon enough we were treated to prolonged scope views of two females and a young male, while watching them we also came across a few Wilson's Warblers, Black-capped Flycatchers and others. Further exploration gave us rare Peg-billed Finches, Black-billed Nightingale-thrush, better views of Volcano Hummingbird, Slaty Flowerpiercers, Black-and-yellow Phainoptila, Mountain Thrush, Northern Tufted Flycatcher and others.

After lunch a 40 minute drive took us to Savegre Hotel where the Hummingbird feeders attracted Grey-tailed Mountaingems, Scintillant and Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds. A short walk nearby gave us Acorn Woodpeckers, Spangle-cheeked Tanagers, Dark Pewee, Flame-coloured Tanagers, Sulphur-winged Parakeets and others as Red-tailed Hawk and Swallow-tailed Kite appeared overhead. All too soon it was time to return to San Jose for dinner and a beer or three.

Day 3

Tuesday 5th February

En route to Villa Lapas; Tarcoles Estuary

Weather: sunny and warm/hot, quite humid on the Pacific coast, a little breezy at times.

Early risers enjoyed a few new species in the hotel grounds before breakfast, Great Kiskadees and Rufous-backed Wrens were conspicuous while Inca and White-winged Doves and Red-billed Pigeons posed for the scope and our only Greysih Saltators were seen.

By 07.45 the bus was loaded up and we were on our way west towards the Pacific coast. A stop for 40 minutes at Rio Garita Reservoir produced Least Grebe and Blue-winged Teals on the water, a few Boat-billed Herons along the shore, a fine pair of Blue-diademed Motmots in the trees and a surprise Plain-capped Starthroat. Following news that a pair of Black-and-white Owls had just returned to their former haunt at Orotina after an extended absence we made our way there and soon found these obliging birds roosting in the centre of the busy town square, a slumbering Hoffman's Two-toed Sloth was also present. Soon afterwards we reached Tarcoles where a stop for refreshments preceded an action-packed walk across the road bridge there. Highlights here included a pair of Bat Falcons, Southern Lapwings, Yellow-headed Caracara, fly-by Scarlet Macaws and masses of huge American Crocodiles. Just around the corner was Villa Lapas, our base for the next two nights. After dropping off our bags we were soon sitting down for lunch or seeing our first Social and Grey-capped Flycatchers near the restaurant.

Everyone opted to join the afternoon cruise around the Tarcoles Estuary. New birds came thick and fast and included four species of Kingfisher, including very close views of the diminutive American Pygmy, Common Black Hawks, Anhingas, Bare-throated Tiger Herons, Yellow-crowned Night Herons, Orange-fronted Parakeets and numerous others. Scarlet Macaws put on a good show as Magnificent Frigatebirds patrolled overhead and Ospreys sat on prominent perches. As we returned to shore Macaws were squabbling in the trees above us, a couple of rare Mangrove Hummingbirds were found, as was a Turquoise-browed Motmot and, as the light began to fade, several Lesser Nighthawks appeared overhead. After dinner a noisy pair of Spectacled Owls put on a good show above the restaurant to round off an excellent day.

Day 4

Wednesday 6th February

Villa Lapas; Carara NP

Weather: fine, mostly sunny, warm/hot and humid

Birding in the Villa Lapas grounds before breakfast produced an array of new species with top billing going to a pair of Fiery-billed Aracaris while the supporting cast included Gartered Trogons and Boat-billed and Streaked Flycatchers.

By 07.15 we were on our way to the Oxbow Trail at nearby Carara National Park where the rest of the morning was spent slowly working our way along the trail. A pair of Northern Royal Flycatchers showed briefly early on, as did a slumbering Boa Constrictor. Further along the trail we connected with Black-hooded Antshrikes, Dot-winged Antwrens and Dusky Antbirds and some saw a furtive Black-bellied Wren and a Northern Bentbill. A Plain Xenops put on a good show near our turning around point, where a troop of White-faced Capuchins showed well, while the return trip gave us Barred Antshrikes and several others. During our lunch break back at Villa Lapas the avian highlights included Black-mandibled Toucana and Lineated Woodpecker.

Those who opted to return to the forest in the afternoon found spectacular Red-capped Manakins, a Great Tinamou, Kentucky Warbler and three Black-faced Antthrushes plus a Muscovy Duck and a couple of Central American Agoutis. Back at Villa Lapas Rose-breasted Grosbeaks and both White-collared and Costa Rican Swifts were found as the light began to fade.

Day 5

Thursday 7th February

En route to Monteverde, Monteverde Hummingbird Gallery

Weather: Fine and warm at Villa Lapas, sunny spells at Monteverde where there was a stiff breeze.

Birding in the hotel grounds either side of a 07.00 breakfast produced a host of good birds with Slaty-tailed Trogon, Long-tailed Manakin, Painted Bunting and others found.

The journey to Monteverde commenced at 09.00 but we stopped after 40 minutes for coffee at Caldera where a wide coastal lagoon is fed by the Pacific Ocean just across the road. A large flock of Laughing Gulls, several Royal Terns and a handful of Brown Pelicans were roosting on the lagoon as Magnificent Frigatebirds glided overhead. Ninety minutes later we arrived at the Hotel Montana in Monteverde and settled in to our comfortable rooms before lunch.

Around the hotel we found Yellow-faced Grassquits and others but by 14.45 we were on our way to the famous Monteverde Hummingbird Gallery. On arrival 20 minutes later we were immediately surrounded by hummers with Green-crowned Brilliants, Purple-throated Mountaingems and Violet Sabrewings all common and endemic Coppery-headed Emeralds, Green Violetears and Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds present in smaller numbers; scarcer still, but still seen regularly were Magenta-throated Woodstars and eventually a Green Hermit put in a couple of appearances.

We also saw our first Bananaquits at the feeders while some took advantage of the shopping or coffee and cake opportunities here. Back at the rather windswept hotel a pre-roost gathering of Bronzed Cowbirds was noted and a Canivet's Emerald was feeding along a flowering hedge.

Day 6

Friday 8th February

Monteverde

Weather: fine, a little breezy at times

A quick look around the hotel garden before breakfast gave us Blue-diademed Motmot and a Yellow-bellied Sapsucker but most of the morning was spent at Monteverde Cloudforest Preserve in the company of local guide Bernal. Many excellent birds were found in the attractive mossy forest with Scale-crowned Pygmy Tyrants, Blue-throated Toucanets, Spotted Barbtail, Lineated Foliage-gleaner, Slaty Antwren, Brown-hooded Parrots and Collared Trogon just some of the highlights.

Returning towards the forest after lunch back at the hotel gave us a surprise in the shape of a splendid Sunbittern at a small river crossing. In the forest Black-breasted Wood Quails, Olivaceous Woodcreeper, Green Lancebill and a brief Black Guan were found while back at the car park the feeders held a nice selection of, by now, familiar hummers as Common Bush Tanagers flitted about and a Black-faced Solitaire was found feeding in a fruiting tree above the bus.

Day 7

Saturday 9th February

En route to Hacienda Solimar

Weather: a little overcast and breezy at Monteverde, hot and sunny with a stiff breeze at Hacienda Solimar

The highlight in the grounds of the Hotel Montana either side of breakfast was a superb Elegant Euphonia but also seen were White-fronted Parrots, Orange-chinned Parakeets, Steely-vented Hummingbird and Canivet's Emerald.

After a stop at the nearby supermarket to pick up vital provisions for a three night stay at Hacienda Solimar we were on our way there and arrived soon after noon. Shortly after lunch a quick look around the Hacienda area produced a couple of White-lored Gnatcatcher and a roosting Pacific Screech Owl as Mantled Howler Monkeys slumbered nearby.

As the midday heat began to subside we set off in the bus to explore some of the wetter areas of the huge ranch. Highlights before we returned at sunset included Double-striped Thick-knees, Laughing Falcon, Northern Harrier, Snail Kites, masses of Black-bellied Whistling-ducks being harassed by a Peregrine, Harris's Hawk, Limpkins and Jabirus amongst the masses of Herons and Egrets. A more wooded area gave us roosting Lesser Nighthawks, Scissor-tailed Flycatchers and a very obliging Ferruginous Pygmy Owl. After dinner some saw a Nine-banded Armadillo rummaging about near our rooms!

Day 8

Sunday 10th February

Hacienda Solimar

Weather: fine, a little breezy at times

Early risers were rewarded with White-throated Magpie-jays, White-fronted and Yellow-naped Amazons, Solitary Sandpipers, Turquoise-browed Motmot and Black-headed Trogons in the immediate vicinity of the Hacienda.

After breakfast we made our way to an area of dry forest where a couple of hours of strolling along the shady road produced Orchard Orioles, Banded Wren, Green-breasted Mangos, Long-tailed Manakins, Northern Barred Woodcreeper, more Ferruginous Pygmy Owls, Scrub Euphonia and plenty of Howler Monkeys. Back at the Hacienda, Spot-breasted and Streak-backed Orioles were found.

Our evening excursion took us to another area of dry forest where Nutting's Flycatchers were the highlight before a King Vulture was watched in flight just as we were leaving. Nearby wetlands held a good collection of species, including several Muscovy Ducks, another Northern Harrier was seen and a large gathering of White-nosed Coatis foraged in the open.

Day 9

Monday 11th February

Hacienda Solimar

Weather: fine, hot

Pre-breakfast birding gave us several previously seen species while our main morning excursion took us to an area of Gallery Forest where we found two Lesser Ground Cuckoos, one of which sat in the open at close range for five minutes, White-collared Seedeaters, Orange-fronted Parakeets, Scissor-tailed Flycatchers, all three species of Ground-dove and several other bits and pieces including Brown-crested Flycatchers and Squirrel Cuckoo.

At 14.45 we set off on the 30 minute drive to Colorado Salinas to see what had assembled at the high tide roost there. On arrival it was immediately obvious that a large and varied selection of species was present and we spent the next couple of hours sifting through them. Black Skimmers were a particular highlight and we quickly located several Grey Plovers and a handful of Semipalmated and Wilson's Plovers. Hundred's of Semipalmated and Western Sandpipers lined the banks of the saltings while several Least Sandpipers crept about; Stilt Sandpipers and Short-billed Dowitchers plus a few Lesser Yellowlegs were sprinkled about, and we found up to 15 Surfbirds and a few Red Knot mixed in with them. Larger shorebirds were represented by numerous Willets, 'Hudsonian' Whimbrels and Marbled Godwits. At the mangrove edge a couple of Mangrove Warblers appeared briefly as Magnificent Frigatebirds soared overhead.

Day 10

Tuesday 12th February

En route to Arenal; Arenal Observatory Lodge

Weather: mostly fine but a little overcast during the evening at Arenal, hot then warm.

After saying goodbye to the friendly staff at Hacienda Solimar we set off inland towards Lake Arenal, stopping after 90 minutes for refreshments at the German bakery in Nuevo Arenal.

As we drove along the lakeshore Arenal Volcano was clearly visible in the distance and a group of Crested Guans were watched in a roadside tree. We ate our picnic lunch along the Old Tabacon Road where a Keel-billed Motmot was the undoubted avian highlight. Forty minutes later we reached our overnight base at Arenal Observatory Lodge.

On arrival we made our way to the platform overlooking the feeding station where, over the next hour or so, we enjoyed excellent views of several new species such as Passerini's and Double-toothed Tanagers plus Green Honeycreeper while spectacular Montezuma Oropendolas were ever present and put on a fine show. The clouds cleared to reveal the summit of the volcano again and a nearby fruiting tree was found to contain some exquisite Tawny-capped Euphonias as a pair of Black-mandibled Toucans bounced around in the trees above. After settling into our rooms a stroll around the grounds produced Violet-headed Hummingbird and White-necked Jacobin while another fruiting tree near the feeders held a superb Emerald Tanager and a couple of Bay-headed Tanagers and our first Olive-backed Euphonia was found.

Day 11

Wednesday 13th February

Arenal; en route to Selve Verde; Selve Verde

Weather: overcast at Arenal, sunnier, warmer and quite humid at Selve Verde.

Dawn at the feeding station revealed a similar cast of characters to yesterday plus Black-striped Sparrows and a Grey-chested Dove. The nearby fruiting tree attracted an excellent collection of tanagers including Emerald and Bay-headed again plus a White-throated Thrush and several other choice species such as Red-legged Honeycreepers and Golden-hooded Tanagers.

After breakfast we explored the parkland and forested habitats near our rooms where Band-backed Wrens and a Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer were new but the major highlight was a pair of spectacular Great Curassows that strutted about along the edge of the forest. By 09.00 we were loaded up and on our way eastwards towards the Caribbean lowlands. A 30 minute coffee stop at Muelle gave the opportunity for photos of the many Green Iguanas gathered in the roadside trees. By 12.15 we were at Selve Verde for a three-night stay.

After lunch and, for some, a short rest we explored the area around the lodge where Orange-billed Sparrows and Red-throated Ant-tanagers showed well and Shining Honeycreepers appeared in a distant treetop. Better still was a pair of spectacular Pale-billed Woodpeckers near the swimming pool, a busy group of Collared Aracaris, a scoped Keel-billed Toucan and a Fasciated Tiger-heron that fed along the rapids in the river where Black Phoebes were also found.

Day 12

Thursday 14th February

Virgen de Socorro, El Tapir, near La Selva

Weather: overcast and damp initially at Virgen de Socorro then dry and mostly bright with a few light showers later in the day, hot and humid after a fresh start

By 06.10 we were on our way to the Caribbean foothills at Virgen de Socorro and arrived there in steady light rain at 07.00.

Walking slowly into the valley we found a few commoner species but with perseverance eventually found a few Tropical Parulas, Black-throated Green Warblers, a Blackburnian Warbler and a Scale-crested Pygmy-tyrant. At the river an American Dipper put in a brief appearance while the walk back in drier weather gave us Collared Trogons, Crimson-collared Tanagers and a distantly perched White Hawk. A short drive then delivered us to a small roadside cafe where feeders attracted a few mid-elevation hummers plus several Silver-throated Tanagers and a pair of very obliging Emerald Toucanets.

After lunch and a short rest we drove for 45 minutes to the abandoned butterfly farm at El Tapir where the flowering Porterweed attracted an excellent collection of Hummingbirds including three new species in the shape of a marvellous male Snowcap, a very obliging Black-crested Coquette and a couple of similarly well behaved Green Thorntails. A small flock of Tanager in the trees here contained a couple of Black-faced Grosbeaks and a Blue Morpho butterfly put on a good show.

Returning towards Selve Verde we diverted to explore the open country on the edge of the La Selva reserve. Long-tailed Tyrants performed nicely here, as did a Slaty-tailed Trogon and after a little while three Great Green Macaws flew over. Setting off in pursuit of the Macaws we found White-ringed Flycatchers, a Three-toed Sloth in a distant tree (but showing quite well in the scope), and numerous Red-lore and a few Mealy Parrots plus a couple of Olive-throated Parakeets and a perched Bat Falcon. Eventually the Great Green Macaws reappeared and gave some decent scope views in a fairly distant tree.

Day 13

Friday 15th February

La Selva

Weather: fine and dry after a misty dawn, then warm and quite humid with a brief shower after lunch.

After another early breakfast we were on our way to nearby La Selva by 06.00. Reaching the clearings near the reserve's offices we concentrated on that rich area for over 90 minutes seeing Chestnut-coloured and Cinnamon Woodpeckers, Black-headed Saltators, Plain-coloured and Dusky-faced Tanagers and we also managed better views than previously of White-ringed Flycatchers, Black-faced Grosbeaks and many others. Moving on to the denser woodland nearby we found several more new species with a fine male White-collared Manakin, Rufous Motmot, Rufous-tailed Jacamars and Pied Puffbirds all showing well while a Little Tinamou and both Bay and Black-bellied Wrens more seen more briefly.

During our lunch break at Selve Verde Chestnut-backed Antbirds and a Stripe-throated Wren put on a good show but after a short rest we returned to La Selva where our evening walk gave us a couple of Hoffman's Two-toed Sloths, more Pied Puffbirds, a Blue-chested Hummingbird and a furtive Slaty-breasted Tinamou. Back at the reserve offices we found Chestnut-headed Oropendolas feeding in a large fruiting tree and Collared Aracaris showed well. At Selve Verde a Short-tailed Nighthawk was feeding over the swimming pool at dusk.

Day 14

Saturday 16th February

En route to San Jose; inbound to London via Miami

Weather: fine

Early risers enjoyed some final looks at the birdlife around Selve Verde including our first perched views of Mealy Parrots and a single Green Ibis. By 07.45 we were on our way to San Jose and after a coffee stop in the hills on the edge of the Central Valley we arrived at the airport at 10.30. Our flights to Miami and London were roughly on time and we settled down for a night in the air over the Atlantic...

Day 15

Sunday 17th February

Arrival in UK

We reached Heathrow a few minutes ahead of schedule at 10.15.
