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Day 1

Wednesday 10th April

After a long day flying we arrived on time at San Jose airport in the evening. Clearing immigration and customs we met up with Santiago our driver and Simon our local agent and transferred the short distance to the Rodeo County Inn. Once checked in everyone, very sensibly, went more or less straight to bed.

Day 2

Thursday 11th April

Sunny and warm with scattered cloud and a light breeze

After an early start we drove south-east of the capital into the mountains of the Cerro de la Muerte. We spent the morning at Paraiso Del Quetzal where we enjoyed the fine scenery and lovely forests and found a host of highland bird specialities including Ruddy Treerunner, Buffy Tuftedcheek, Black-capped Flycatcher, Ochraceous Pewee, Yellow-winged Vireo, Black-billed Nightingale-Thrush, Black-cheeked Warbler, Peg-billed and Large-footed Finches and Long-tailed Silky Flycatcher.

At the lodge itself, where we ate breakfast and lunch, the hummingbird feeders and flowers by the balcony were buzzing with Fiery-throated, Magnificent and Volcano Hummingbirds, and in the trees and bushes around we found Black-and-yellow Phainoptila, Collared Redstart, Sooty Thrush, Hairy Woodpecker and Sooty-capped Bush Tanager.

The morning had provided a sensational introduction to the wonders of birding in Costa Rica but we weren't done yet. A short drive after lunch through some superb forested highland scenery took us down a couple of hundred metres to the beautifully positioned Savegre Lodge. The drop in altitude brought a different range of birds.

Hummers here included White-throated Mountain-gems, and both Stripe-tailed and Scintillant Hummingbirds whilst a short stroll through the gardens and streamside woods produced a couple of Acorn Woodpeckers, a pair of Flame-coloured Tanagers, two Spot-crowned Woodcreepers, a neat little Ruddy-capped Nightingale Thrush and a Slaty Flowerpiercer. Happy with our success we began the journey back to San Jose.

Day 3

Friday 12th April

Sunny with some scattered cloud. Very warm in the morning; hot and humid at Tarcoles in the afternoon

A spot of pre-breakfast birding around the Rodeo Inn presented us with great views of a number of common birds including Great Kiskadees, Inca Doves, Clay-coloured Thrushes, Melodious Blackbird, Rufous-naped Wrens and Blue-grey Tanagers. The trees were full of Red-eyed Vireos and both Tennessee and Yellow Warblers and overhead we noted Vaux's and White-collared Swifts and a noisy flock of Crimson-fronted Parakeets. With breakfast completed we set off towards the Pacific coast.

Our first stop was at the Garita Reservoir where we found some Least Grebes, a pair of Brown-crested Flycatchers, two Northern Beardless Tyrannulets and the first of many impressive Black Spiny-tailed Iguanas. Continuing on we made an impromptu stop for a Hoffman's Two-toed Sloth hanging from some roadside telephone wires and then called in at the busy park in Orotina town where we were rewarded with fantastic views of a pair of Black-and-white Owls roosting high in a tree above the lively human scene beneath.

Our next stop was at the Tarcoles River Bridge where we dodged the traffic, admired the many large American Crocodiles loafing in the shallows and notched up a good number of birds including several Northern Jacanas, a flock of Groove-billed Anis, dozens of Mangrove Swallows and a pair of Masked Tityras. Driving just a little further brought us to Villa Lapas where we checked in, ate lunch and enjoyed a brief siesta enlivened by a Chestnut-mandibled Toucan and a Slaty-tailed Trogon feeding in a large fig tree and a superb Nine-banded Armadillo rooting around in the shrubbery.

In the late afternoon we set off on a boat trip along the Tarcoles River. An exciting couple of hours brought some fantastic views of a wide variety of birds including Black-bellied Whistling Duck, Wood Stork, Bare-throated Tiger Heron, Tricoloured and Little Blue Herons, Yellow-crowned Night-Heron, Roseate Spoonbill and Osprey. Turquoise-browed Motmots perched along the banks, both Green and Ringed and Kingfishers put in appearances and along a narrow mangrove-fringed creek we enjoyed lovely views of a couple of Mangrove Yellow Warblers, a subtly distinctive Panama Flycatcher and a large group of roosting White Ibis. The afternoon was rounded off nicely by a group of Scarlet Macaws in the trees back at the landing stage and a dozen or more Least Nighthawks flitting across the twilight sky as we drove the short distance back to Villa Lapas.

Day 4

Saturday 13th April

Sunny with some scattered cloud. Hot and humid throughout

A pre-breakfast stroll around the grounds produced excellent views of a Fiery-billed Aracari, three Slaty-tailed Trogons, a nest-building Common Tody-Flycatcher and outstandingly, a Northern Tamandua that spent over half an hour foraging in one of the big trees by the river and allowed us all a close approach.

After a breakfast we set off on the short drive to the nearby Carrera National Park and spent the bulk of the morning walking the so-called Ox-bow Trail which led through some fine transitional forest and ended up at the almost dried up lake that gives the trail its name. Highlights seen in the forest included Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Blue-crowned Motmot, Ruddy Quail-Dove, Black-hooded Antshrike, Royal Flycatcher and Orange-collared Manakin. At the oxbow itself we found a roosting Boat-billed Heron, a trio of stunning Cherrie's Tanagers, and an engaging troop of White-throated Capuchins.

After lunch and a siesta back at Villa Lapas a reduced group of us returned to the national park and walked a different trail through another area of superb forest with lots of huge buttress-rooted trees. We had a great time of it, enjoying exciting encounters with a Great Tinamou, bathing Red-capped Manakins, a stunning Streak-chested Antpitta and a Chestnut-bellied Antbird. On the way back we met an army ant swarm crossing the trail and finished up with fantastic views of various attendant birds including a Barred Woodcreeper, a couple of Black-faced Antthrushes, a Bicoloured Antbird and a Grey-headed Tanager -lovely!

After dinner back at Villa Lapas some of us went on a short night walk only to have our progress curtailed at a narrow stream crossing by a Fer-de-lance snake that steadfastly held its ground. We were reminded that "discretion is the better part of valour" and retreated accordingly.

Day 5

Sunday 14th April

Sunny with scattered cloud. Hot and humid at Tarcoles; cooler and breezier at Monte Verde

Another early birder's session at Villa Lapas proved very productive and in a short space of time we enjoyed good views of a pair of Black-throated Trogons, a White-whiskered Puffbird, two Pale-billed Woodpeckers, a Buff-throated Foliage-gleaner, singing Buff-rumped Warblers and several smart Orange-billed Sparrows.

After breakfast we left Villa Lapas and began the journey up into the mountains. We stopped some little way along the road by the beach at Caldera, where we found good numbers of Laughing Gulls, Royal Terns and Magnificent Frigatebirds, and then again at a petrol station a little further on where a Plumbeous Kite perched obligingly in a nearby tree.

We reached our hotel near Monteverde at the end of the morning and after lunch and a siesta we drove up to the Monteverde cloud forest reserve and spent a couple of hours at the wonderful Hummingbird Gallery. Here we sat in comfort only feet away from a range of feeders that were positively buzzing with hummingbirds. Green-crowned Brilliants and Violet Sabrewings were the dominant species both in numbers, size and aggression but there were also good numbers of Purple-throated Mountain-gems and a scattering of Green Violet-ears, Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds and diminutive Copper-headed Emeralds, a Costa Rican endemic. A lone Green Hermit also put in a few brief appearances and a superb male Magenta-throated Woodstar wowed everyone as it zapped around flashing its dazzling iridescent throat patch. Some great views of a pair of Emerald Toucanets excavating a nest hole in a roadside tree on the way back to the hotel concluded a very enjoyable afternoon.

Day 6

Monday 15th April

Sunny and warm with some scattered cloud and a breeze in the afternoon

After an early breakfast we drove the short distance up to the Monteverde Cloud Forest entrance and set off on the trails with our local guide Bernal. This famous and beautiful forest lived up to its reputation and in an action-packed morning we saw a superb range of birds including Black Guan, Orange-bellied Trogon, Prong-billed Barbet, Streak-breasted Treehunter, Grey-throated Leaf-tosser, Yellowish Flycatcher, Rufous Mourner, Slaty-backed Nightingale-Thrush, Black-faced Solitaire, Silver-throated Tanager and the wonderfully named Paltry Tyrannulet. Overall highlight for most however was probably the dazzling pair of Resplendent Quetzals that we finally saw after considerable effort as they came in to feed at a large fruiting avocado tree.

We returned to the hotel for lunch and a siesta and then headed back up to Monte Verde in the mid-afternoon, interrupting the short drive for sightings of a Sunbittern at a small river crossing and a male Wattled Bellbird calling from a distant tree-top. The forest was quieter than in the morning but we still had good views of a group of Black-breasted Woodquails scuttling across the trail, a singing White-throated Thrush, a couple of Agoutis and a confiding White-nosed Coati. We finished the afternoon back at the Hummingbird Gallery where an Olingo was a surprise and welcome visitor to the nectar feeders and rounded off a very satisfying day.

Day 7

Tuesday 16th April

Sunny with scattered cloud and a cool wind at Monte Verde in the morning; hot and humid at Hacienda Solimar in the afternoon

The fresh windy conditions meant that our pre-breakfast birding around the hotel was quite slow but we nevertheless enjoyed good views of two Emerald Toucanets, a pair of Hoffman's Woodpeckers at their nest cavity in a dead tree, several Plain Wrens, a couple of Wilson's Warblers, the local Yellow-bellied Elaenias and a brief White-eared Ground Sparrow.

After breakfast some Yellow-faced Grassquits on the lawn and a Canivet's Emerald around the verbena bushes provided a couple of last good birds before we set off down towards the coastal plain. The journey took us through a scenic mosaic of farmland and relict forest patches and we made a number of impromptu roadside photo stops, one of which brought some fabulous views of Swallow-tailed Kites hawking low overhead. We passed through the town of Las Juntas, drank coffee at the Macaw Cafe on the Pan-American Highway and after a lengthy session with a roadside troop of Mantled Howler Monkeys, made it to the welcoming Hacienda Solimar in good time for lunch.

In the mid-afternoon, after enjoying good views White-throated Magpie-Jays, Black-headed Trogons and Stripe-headed Sparrows in the garden, we set off on the short drive to the Colorado Salinas. These traditional working saltpans surrounded by mangrove forest offered some great birding and in a short space of time we saw an excellent range of waders including Western, Semi-palmated and Least Sandpipers side by side, some smart breeding plumage Wilson's Plovers, lots of Whimbrel and Grey Plovers, several Black-necked Stilts and a few Willets.

In the mangroves we added Cinnamon and Scaly-breasted Hummingbirds, Mangrove Yellow Warblers and a brief Scrub Flycatcher and then rounded things off nicely with a Rufous-necked Wood-Rail that made a couple of surreptitious appearances.

Day 8

Wednesday 17th April

Sunny with scattered cloud. Hot and humid with a fresh breeze and some thundery rain in the afternoon

Our morning started at dawn in the garden with Yellow-naped and White-fronted Parrots, Lineated and Hoffman's Woodpeckers, Turquoise Browed Motmot, Streak-backed and Spot-breasted Orioles, Rose-throated Becard and a pair of roosting Pacific Screech Owls – not bad!

After breakfast we drove out across the ranch towards a distant area of evergreen dry forest. Birds noted en-route included Double-striped Thick-knee, Harris Hawk, White-tailed Kite, Crested Caracara, Eastern Meadowlark and Grasshopper Sparrow, whilst at a small pond we enjoyed some lovely views of a Green Heron, a pair of Black-bellied Whistling Ducks and a Solitary Sandpiper. At the forest itself we strolled along a wide trail and encountered an interesting range of birds that included a Zone-tailed Hawk jinking across the sky, a pair of Streak-headed Woodcreepers, a Northern Bentbill, a typically vocal Bright-rumped Attila, a White-winged Becard and a couple of dazzling Long-tailed Manakins. Some White-nosed Coatis scuttling through the forest added further interest and we finished the morning with a foray into another area of woodland where we enjoyed wonderful views of a roosting Spectacled Owl.

After lunch and a siesta back at the hacienda we took to the bus again and drove out to the wide-open marshes of Estero Madrigal where we had great views of a pair of mighty Jabiru Storks, several Bare-throated Tiger Herons, lots of Northern Jacanas, a Peregrine Falcon, some diminutive Plain-breasted Ground Doves and a flock of elegant Scissor-tailed Flycatchers hawking for insects over the dried out grassland. We concluded the afternoon either side of a thunderstorm in a patch of riverine forest and plantation where we found a Laughing Falcon, three roosting Lesser Nighthawks, Green and Ringed Kingfishers, some White-faced Capuchins and a troop of 7 or 8 Mantled Howler Monkeys that provided great entertainment as they crossed the river. They approached through the forest canopy and one-by-one, following the same route and each taking its turn, they paused at the chosen launching point to briefly assess the jump and then leapt dramatically across to the nearest tree on the other side. They all made the jump successfully, each landing at more or less the same spot on the same branch, even a mother carrying a sizeable infant.

Day 9

Thursday 18th April

Sunny with scattered cloud in the morning, overcast with some thundery rain in the afternoon. Hot and humid throughout

Orange-chinned Parakeets and a Ferruginous Pygmy Owl in the garden started the day well and then, with breakfast completed, we drove the short distance to an area of evergreen gallery forest where we took a lengthy stroll and enjoyed good views of a wide range of birds. Highlights included a Grey Hawk, two Mangrove Cuckoos, a pair of White-necked Puffbirds, a singing Banded Wren, several Stripe-headed Sparrows and a smart male Blue Grosbeak. Another Spectacled Owl roosting unobtrusively deep in some thick foliage was a considerable bonus as was a Little Ground Cuckoo that appeared right at the end of our walk at the edge of the forest and uncharacteristically hopped around in full view for some minutes – very nice!

Lunch and a siesta back at the hacienda was followed by a local walk that produced a brief Coyote plus good views of a plain-capped Starthroat, a pair of Scrub Euphonias, a lovely male White-lored Gnatcatcher, a pair of Brown-crested Flycatchers feeding young in a nest in a rotted out stump and a Pauraque which we accidentally flushed off its two eggs in their bare scrape on the ground.

Day 10

Friday 19th April

Sunny with scattered cloud, hot and humid. Some thundery rain in the late afternoon

We left Hacienda Solimar after breakfast and made our way up through the town of Las Canas to the pleasant green hill country around Arenal Lake. We stopped in Arenal town for coffee and cakes and then proceeded to the south-eastern end of the lake, crossed the dam and took a pre-lunch walk along the old Tabacon road that runs through some secondary forest above the lake shore. It was hot and bird activity was subdued but nevertheless we encountered an interesting range of species including a few Passerini's Tanagers, a Tropical Pewee, a Cinnamon Becard and a trio of splendid Broad-billed Motmots.

After a picnic lunch at the trailside we drove on to Arenal Observatory Lodge and spent a good while on the lodge's observation deck overlooking its busy feeding station. Exciting birds came thick and fast and in a short time we enjoyed fantastic views of Montezuma's Oropendola, Black-cheeked Woodpecker, Red-legged and Green Honeycreepers, Scarlet-thighed Dacnis, Passerini's and Golden-hooded Tanagers and Black-striped Sparrow, plus a confiding White-nosed Coati for good measure.

After settling in to our very comfortable rooms we went for a stroll through the grounds and finished the afternoon with good views of a Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer and a Brown Violet-ear feeding around the verbena bushes, a pair of Streak-backed Wrens mobbing a large Mussurana Snake and a Laughing Falcon calling loudly from its tree top perch.

Day 11

Saturday 20th April

Overcast with some rain showers in the morning. Warm and humid

We awoke to a cool, overcast dawn but bird activity in the clearing outside our rooms was nevertheless lively and by the time we made it to breakfast we had enjoyed good views of Keel-billed Toucans, Crested Guans, Grey-headed Chachalacas, Pale-billed and Smoky-brown Woodpeckers, White-necked Jacobins and a stunning little Black-crested Coquette. The birding continued from the observation deck over breakfast and alongside most of yesterday's familiars we added Orange-bellied Trogon, Barred Woodcreeper and Hepatic, Bay-headed and Emerald Tanagers to our already impressive list

A little later we left Arenal and continued our journey eastwards towards the Caribbean coast. We passed through Fortuna, Muelle, Aguas Zarcas and La Virgen and arrived at the famous Selva Verde Lodge in time for lunch. Crested Aracaris, Summer Tanagers and Shining Honeycreepers visiting a fruiting tree outside the restaurant kept the birding interest going and in the late afternoon we took a stroll along the riverside trail and found Chestnut-mandibled Toucans, Brown-hooded and Red-lored Parrots, Ringed and Amazon Kingfishers and Red-throated Ant-Tanagers. Non-avian interest included Mantled Howler Monkeys, Green Basilisks, a Black River Turtle and lots of Green-and-black and Strawberry Poison Dart Frogs.

Day 12

Sunday 21st April

Overcast and showery in the morning; sunny with scattered cloud in the afternoon. Warm and humid

After an early breakfast we drove up to El Virgen del Socorro and an area of mid-altitude forest in a beautiful valley with a tumbling mountain river. A roosting Great Potoo in a roadside tree on the journey up was a great start and our walk down the valley proved productive too. By the time we reached the bridge at the bottom and a brisk rain shower sent us scuttling to the bus we had seen various notable birds including White Hawk, Collared Trogon, Spotted Woodcreeper, Tufted Flycatcher, Yellow Tyrannulet, Tropical Parula and Crimson-collared Tanager.

From here we drove a little further up to a rustic café at Cinchona where we drank coffee, ate enchiladas, admired the view through the shifting clouds and watched birds. Hummingbirds at the feeders included Violet Sabrewings, White-breasted Mountain-Gems, Green-crowned Brilliants and Green Thorntails, whilst other goodies included a perched White-crowned Parrot, a pair of stunning Silver-throated Tanagers, a Red-eyed Vireo and a sensational male Blackburnian Warbler. Pleased with our success we retraced our steps to Selva Verde and lunch.

In the afternoon we drove the short distance to La Selva reserve and walked along the perimeter track. This interface between the forest and the adjacent agricultural land with its scattering of tall trees proved very productive. Along the forest edge we enjoyed excellent views of a Broad-billed Motmot and found Black-cheeked Woodpecker, Plain-brown, Streak-headed and Cocoa Woodcreepers and Western Wood Pewee. Out in the clearing we saw Chestnut-headed Oropendolas, Red-lored Parrots, Keel-billed and Chestnut-mandibled Toucans, Collared Aracaris and best of all, a pair of mighty Great Green Macaws that gave us a colourful and majestic fly-past and provided a fitting finale to a very satisfying day.

Day 13

Monday 22nd April

Overcast, warm and humid with some heavy rain in the morning

We headed into the famous La Selva reserve shortly after dawn and spent a fabulous morning birding around the main clearings and nearby trails. Exciting birds came thick and fast and started in the clearing with Great Curassows wandering around the lawns, a pair of Crested Guans feeding in a low fruiting tree, a Short-billed Pigeon sitting quietly in a tree top, a Cinnamon Becard, some noisy Black-headed Saltators and a smart Long-tailed Tyrant. A first foray out on the trails produced Buff-rumped Warblers flitting along the path ahead of us, nest-building Fasciated Antshrikes, a Wood Thrush and a couple of Rufous Motmots. The onset of some heavy rain forced a hasty retreat to the shelter of the cafeteria where, fortified by coffee, we looked out at the deluge and enjoyed a mass of bird activity in the clearing around us. The rain continued for an hour and a half but the avian action never stopped. During our enforced respite we enjoyed great views of White-collared Manakin, Black-faced Grosbeak, Black-crowned Tityra, Blue Dacnis, Dusky-cheeked and Plain-coloured Tanagers, Snowy Cotinga and lots more. Finally the rain abated and we took to the trails again and finished this superb morning with Collared Peccaries, Spider Monkeys, more Curassows, Collared Aracaris and Keel-billed Toucans, a Ringed Kingfisher, an Olive-sided Flycatcher, a White-breasted Wood-Wren and a Laughing Falcon – phew!

After lunch and a siesta back at Selva Verde during which we noted a Fasciated Tiger-Heron on the river and a Pale-billed Woodpecker at the feeding station, we headed back into La Selva for our last proper bit of Costa Rican birding. The going was inevitably slower than in the morning but we nevertheless managed lovely sightings of Violaceous and Slaty-tailed Trogons, Squirrel Cuckoo, Chestnut-coloured Woodpecker, Ochre-bellied Flycatcher, Olive-backed Euphonia and a wonderful Three-toed Sloth with a well-grown juvenile. Thoroughly satisfied we returned to Selva Verde for a last dinner together.

Day 14

Tuesday 23rd April

Sunny and warm

We woke to a lovely sunny dawn and after an early breakfast at Selva Verde we began the drive back to San Jose. The journey took us through some fine highland scenery and we made a brief stop at a waterfall where we found a Torrent Tyrannulet and an American Dipper. We stopped for coffee a little short of San Jose itself and we made the airport in good time for our mid-morning check-in. Everything went smoothly, our flight departed on time, we negotiated the challenges of Miami airport without mishap and we all arrived safely back in the UK on time the following morning.
