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Day 1

Sunday 9th March

After a long day flying we arrived on time at San Jose airport in the evening. Clearing immigration and customs we met up with Erik and our driver Alberto and transferred the short distance to our comfortable hotel. Once checked in everyone, very sensibly, went more or less straight to bed.

Day 2

Monday 10th March

Sunny and warm with scattered cloud and a light breeze

After an early start we drove south-east of the capital into the mountains of the Cerro de la Muerte. We spent most of the morning in the beautiful cool forests at Paraiso Del Quetzal where we saw an exciting range of highland birds including Black Guan, Black-capped Flycatcher, Ochraceous Pewee, Black-billed Nightingale-Thrush, Yellow-thighed and Large-footed Finches, Golden-browed Chlorophonia and a couple of brief Resplendent Quetzals. At the lodge itself, where we ate breakfast, the hummingbird feeders and flowers by the balcony were buzzing with Fiery-throated, Magnificent and Volcano Hummingbirds, and in the trees and bushes around we found Black-and-yellow Phainoptila, Collared Redstart, Sooty Thrush, Hairy Woodpecker, Mountain Elaenia and Sooty-capped Bush-Tanager. A short drive higher up to some decidedly breathless paramo at 11,000 feet brought the hoped for Timberline Wren (very smart!) and a couple of furtive Volcano Juncos.

The morning had provided a sensational introduction to the wonders of birding in Costa Rica but we weren't done yet. A further short drive through some superb forested highland scenery where we found a pair of roadside Long-tailed Silky Flycatchers, took us down a couple of hundred metres to the beautifully positioned Savegre Lodge.

The drop in altitude brought a different range of birds. Hummers here included White-throated Mountain-gems, and both Stripe-tailed and Scintillant Hummingbirds whilst a short stroll through the gardens and streamside woods produced a couple of Acorn Woodpeckers, a pair of Flame-coloured Tanagers, a few Ruddy-capped Nightingale Thrushes, two delightful Tufted Flycatchers and a superb Emerald Toucanet. Happy with our success we returned to the bus and began the journey back to San Jose.

Day 3

Tuesday 11th March

Sunny with some scattered cloud, breezy, warm, occasional light showers

We started the day with a pre-breakfast walk around the grounds of our hotel. Birds seen included Squirrel Cuckoo, Blue-crowned Motmot, Ferruginous Pygmy Owl, Hoffmann's Woodpecker, a smart male Orchard Oriole and masses of Tennessee Warblers and Baltimore Orioles.

Post breakfast we set off for Arenal. Occasional Grey Hawks and a White-tailed Kite were seen en route and by 10am we were at a café at San Luis where the hummingbird feeders were attracting Green-crowned Brilliants, a Green Hermit, Violet-crowned Woodnymphs, Rufous-tailed Hummingbirds and Green Thorntails. A Purple-crowned Fairy whizzed around the trees outside and a Black Hawk-Eagle soared over a distant ridge. We made another stop at an Oropendola nesting tree where both species were present along with their brood parasite, a Giant Cowbird, whose presence when noticed by the Oropendola caused a noisy panic. Just past La Fortuna we made another impromptu stop for a troop of White-nosed Coatis who were happily holding up the traffic and noticed a Crested Guan who sat in a tree above watching proceedings in a detached sort of manner. Green and Amazon Kingfishers and White-throated Magpie-Jays added further travelling spice before we reached Arenal Observatory in time for lunch.

Post lunch we explored the gardens and found further hummers in the forms of White-necked Jacobins, Steely-vented and Violet-headed Hummers and Black-crested Coquettes. Other goodies included Chestnut-mandibled Toucan, Red-lore Parrot, Plain Chachalaca, Green and Red-legged Honeycreepers, Bay-headed Tanager and Grey-capped and Piratic Flycatchers.

Day 4

Wednesday 12th March

Sunny, breezy and warm

It was a lovely clear dawn at Arenal with perfect views of the volcano peacefully steaming away above us accompanied by an atmospheric roaring noise from the local Howler Monkeys. A pre-breakfast watch from the viewing deck produced good views of Pale-billed and Lineated Woodpeckers, Violaceous Trogon and Golden-headed Tanager and just post breakfast we all enjoyed superb views of a pair of stunning Orange-bellied Trogons perched at eye-level just 20 feet from the balcony outside our rooms.

Walking the waterfall trail later in the morning we found a good range of exciting birds including Keel-billed Toucan, Black-cheeked Woodpecker, Song Wren, Masked Tityra, Golden-crowned and Buff-rumped Warblers and Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant. In the afternoon we explored down towards the distant lakeshore and added sightings of Fasciated Tiger-Heron, Collared Aracari, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Long-tailed Tyrant, Crimson-collared Tanager and Thick-billed Seedfinch to conclude a very satisfying day.

Day 5

Thursday 13th March

Sunny and very warm with some scattered cloud

A pre-breakfast walk for some proved very productive with great views of Semi-plumbeous Hawk, Spotted Antbird, Olive Tanager, White-browed Wood-Wren, Streak-breasted Wren, Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer and Brown Violet-ear. Lovely views of a Black Striped Sparrow at the feeding station below the restaurant at breakfast time concluded our time at Arenal and a little later we began the drive to the Sarapiquí. With breaks for coffee and then a roosting Great Potoo we reached Sueno Azul Lodge in good time for lunch.

In the late afternoon we walked out along the entrance road through an area of riverine woodland, paddocks and scrub. So rich was the birding that we covered only about 300 yards in two hours! An astonishing range of birds included King Vulture, Slaty-tailed Trogon, Ringed Kingfisher, Rufous-winged Woodpecker, Rufous Mourner, Cocoa and Streak-headed Woodcreepers, Bay Wren, Dusky-faced and Plain-coloured Tanagers, Shining Honeycreeper and lots more!

Day 6

Friday 14th March

Sunny, scattered cloud, warm, humid and breezy

Early morning birds around the marshy lake that lay behind our rooms included two Green Ibis perched up in a Cecropia tree, several Anhingas, a few Boat-billed Herons and both species of Toucans, whilst our breakfast was interrupted by a dashing Long-billed Hermit that came into the dining area to raid the spider's webs.

A long morning in the wonderful La Selva forest reserve produced a wonderful range of wildlife sightings. Among the highlights were a sizeable Boa Constrictor wrapped around a trail-side tree at eye-height, two wonderful little Eye-lash Vipers (one yellow, one brown), a startling male Green Basilisk, some approachable Collared Peccaries and a huge range of birds which included Snowy Cotinga, Cinnamon Woodpecker, Rufous and Broad-billed Motmots, Blue-chested Hummingbird, Black-throated Trogon, White-fronted Nunbird, Western Slaty Antshrike, Sungrebe and Great Green Macaw!

Lunch and a siesta back at Sueno Azul followed and then we went back to La Selva and added Great Curassow, Pied Puffbird, Fasciated Antshrike, Black-crowned Tityra, Barred Woodcreeper and Yellow-crowned Euphonia to our already impressive tally. Back at the field centre we finished with fantastic prolonged views of a male Chestnut Woodpecker excavating and eating termites in a low shrub right by the cafeteria – fab!

Day 7

Saturday 15th March

Sunny with scattered cloud, warm, humid and breezy

The early birders were out again today and walked a little further along the entrance track. Top birds were a male Great Antshrike, a Bronzy Hermit, three Plain Wrens, some lovely Olive-throated Parakeets eating guavas and a pair of White-lined Tanagers.

Back in La Selva for the morning, we enjoyed lovely views of Crested Guans, Great Curassows and a Broad-billed Motmot and spent some time admiring a diminutive and fast moving Black-capped Pygmy-Tyrant, one of

the world's very smallest birds. A stunning Orange-billed Sparrow pottering around the restaurant area was a welcome interruption to lunch back at Sueno Azul, and an afternoon stroll around the local area that took us into some very nice forest produced a pair of White-whiskered Puffbirds, two Olive-crowned Yellowthroats, a female Red-capped Manakin, a Wedge-billed Woodcreeper, a Bright-rumped Attila and a few Red-rumped Caciques.

Day 8

Sunday 16th March

Sunny with scattered cloud, hot and humid

Away from Sueno Azul after breakfast we began the drive to Tarcoles. A first stop en-route was at a derelict butterfly farm where a large bed of flowering verbena bushes was attracting a lovely variety of hummingbirds. Our great hope was to see a Snowcap and we were in luck; almost immediately a stunning male appeared and gave us all fantastic views! What a lovely little creature! Other hummers zapping around included Purple-crowned Woodnymph, Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer, Green Thorntail, White-necked Jacobin and Green Hermit.

Our next stop was at the Tarcoles River bridge where we dodged the traffic, admired the many large American Crocodiles loafing in the shallows and saw several Northern Jacanas, some Black-necked Stilts and a few Southern Lapwings. From here we proceeded the last few kilometres to Vila Lapas where we arrived in good time for lunch.

A boat trip along the Tarcoles River in the late afternoon provided us with a very exciting couple of hours full of close views of a wide variety of birds. Highlights included Muscovy Duck, Bare-throated Tiger-Heron, Tricoloured and Little Blue Herons, Purple Gallinule, Roseate Spoonbill, Mangrove Black Hawk, Yellow-headed Caracara and Double-striped Thick-Knee. Turquoise-browed Motmots perched along the banks, Belted and Ringed and Kingfishers put in appearances, a Zone-tailed Hawk drifted across the sky, and along a narrow mangrove-fringed creek we enjoyed lovely views of Mangrove and Prothonotary Warblers, a subtly distinctive Panama Flycatcher and a large group of White Ibis. The afternoon was rounded off nicely by 20 or more Least Nighthawks flitting across the twilight sky as we drove the short distance back to Villa Lapas.

Day 9

Monday 17th March

Sunny with scattered cloud, breezy, hot and humid

The early birders were out at dawn again exploring the grounds and found Violaceous and Black-headed Trogons, Scaly-breasted Hummingbird, Canivet's Emerald, Long-billed Starthroat, Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Streaked Flycatcher and Blue-black Grosbeak.

After breakfast we drove the short distance to the Carrera National Park and spent the morning exploring one of the trails. We enjoyed good views of Central American Spider Monkeys, found a lovely Black-and-green Poison Arrow Frog and encountered some fantastic birds. Highlights included Band-tailed Barbthroat, Black-faced Antthrush, Black-hooded Antshrike, Chestnut-backed Antbird, Riverside Wren, Long-billed Gnat-Wren, Sulphur-rumped Flycatcher, Ovenbird and Rose-throated Becard.

After lunch and a siesta we were out again walking another trail and encountered a couple of Agoutis, a group of White-tailed Deer, a pair of nest building Royal Flycatchers, a bathing Purple-crowned Fairy and a superb Scarlet Macaw perched in a tree-top. Further small birds included Northern Bentbill, Plain Xenops, Slate-headed Tody-Flycatcher and Rufous-breasted Wren. Walking out in the faded light a haunting call alerted us to a Collared Forest-Falcon which with a little searching we managed to locate and see well. Finally, back near the road, a Fer-de-Lance crossing the trail in front of us, assured and menacing, provided significant excitement.

Day 10

Tuesday 18th March

Sunny with scattered cloud, warm and breezy

An early walk along the river at Vila Lapas brought us great views of a Bare-throated Tiger-Heron dispatching a (relatively) enormous fish, a pair of Blue-crowned Motmots, several Grey-chested Doves, a close Black-faced Antthrush, two Long-billed Hermits and a trio of Orange-billed Sparrows. Back at the lodge a Fiery-billed Aracari flashing through the tree tops concluded our time at Vila Lapas in fine style. Away after breakfast our first stop was by the beach and lagoon at Caldera, where we found good numbers of Laughing Gulls, Royal Terns, Magnificent Frigatebirds and Brown Pelicans and with a little closer searching, an Elegant and a Sandwich Tern, a flock of Sanderling and a few Willets. From here we headed inland and up into the mountains. A Plumbeous Kite and a Short-tailed Hawk that held its position beautifully on a powerful up-draught were noted en-route and we arrived at our hotel in Santa Elena at lunchtime.

After a brief siesta we drove up to the Monteverde and spent a couple of hours at the wonderful Hummingbird Gallery. Here we sat in comfort only feet away from a range of feeders that were positively buzzing with hummingbirds. Green-crowned Brilliants and Violet Sabrewings were the dominant species both in numbers, size and aggression but there were also good numbers of Purple-throated Mountain-gems and a scattering of Green Violet-ears, Stripe-tailed Hummingbirds and diminutive Copper-headed Emeralds, a Costa Rican endemic. A lone Green Hermit also put in a few appearances and a superb male Magenta-throated Woodstar wowed everyone as it zapped around flashing its dazzling iridescent throat patch. Great views of a Black Guan in the trees around us added to the interest and we concluded the day with an Emerald Toucanet and a superb little Yellowish Flycatcher as we made our way back to the hotel.

Day 11

Wednesday 19th March

Sunny and warm with some scattered cloud am; overcast cool and breezy pm

After an early breakfast we drove the short distance up to the Monteverde Cloud Forest entrance and set off on the trails. This famous and beautiful forest lived up to its reputation and in an action-packed morning we saw a superb range of birds which included Prong-billed Barbet, Ruddy Treerunner, Ochraceous Wren, Azure-hooded Jay, Slaty-backed Nightingale Thrush, Slate-throated Whitestart, Silver-throated Tanager, Chestnut-capped Brush-Finch, Golden-browed Chlorophonia and an amazing Brown-billed Scythebill. Also notable and much enjoyed by all was a cameo appearance by a superb little Alfaro's Pygmy Squirrel. After lunch and a short break back at the hotel we returned to the forest and explored further trails. A Black Guan and a male Orange-bellied Trogon started things well and a cryptic Lineated Foliage-Gleaner added further excitement for a lucky few but undoubted highlights were a group of Resplendent Quetzals, three males and two females, engaged in a noisy courtship ritual.

The males flashed through the trees in a riot of colour and form and we enjoyed quite wonderful views of these amazing and charismatic creatures as they went about their business apparently unconcerned by our presence!

Day 12

Thursday 20th March

Sunny with scattered cloud and a fresh breeze. Hot in the afternoon down at sea level

We left Santa Elena after breakfast and by late morning we were down in the dry forests and ranchland of the Guanacaste region. Towards the end of the journey we stopped to explore along a dirt track through dry scrubby grassland with roadside trees and in a short space of time, despite the fierce midday heat, we managed to see an exciting range of notable birds. These included Orange-fronted and Orange-chinned Parakeets Common Ground Dove, Lineated and Hoffman's Woodpeckers, Spot-breasted Oriole, White-lored Gnatcatcher, White-throated Magpie-Jay and Stripe-headed Sparrow.

After lunch and a siesta at Ensenada we drove the short distance to some nearby salinas where the rising tide was forcing birds in to roost. In a lovely couple of hours we had great views of a host of waders, with Wilson's Plovers, Stilt Sandpipers, Short-billed Dowitchers and a Wilson's Phalarope being perhaps the most exciting for us European birders. An object lesson in Peeps was useful too, with the opportunity to compare Semi-palmated, Western and Least Sandpipers at close range. This enjoyable session was completed by a sighting of a Peregrine close overhead and flocks of White-fronted Parrots flying in to roost in the mangroves.

Day 13

Friday 21st March

Sunny, breezy, hot and humid. Some cloud in the afternoon

The early birders were out at dawn again, exploring the gardens at Ensenada and in a short space of time saw a Ferruginous Pygmy Owl, four Black-headed Trogons, two Spot-breasted Orioles, a Turquoise-browed Motmot, a Cinnamon Hummingbird and a couple of Yellow-naped Parrots. Post breakfast a Streak-backed Oriole and both species of Tityra appeared in the trees behind our rooms and then, full of anticipation we set off towards Solimar, noting some Double-striped Thick-knees and a Laughing Falcon en-route.

A full morning at Solimar exploring the woodlands and wetlands under the expert guidance of Demetrio brought us a wonderful range of sightings. Highlights included Coatis, Howlers and Capuchins, Limpkins and Wood Storks, Jabirus on the nest, thousands of Black-bellied Whistling Ducks, Snail Kites at arm's reach, a Harris's Hawk, a family of Pacific Screech Owls, two Spectacled Owls and two roosting Lesser Nighthawks – wow! Back at Ensenada we finished the day with a local walk and added good sightings of Roseate Spoonbill, Collared Forest Falcon, Roadside Hawk, Northern Scrub Flycatcher, Rose-throated Becard and American Redstart.

Day 14

Saturday 22nd March

Sunny, warm and still

A dawn boat trip out into the mangrove creeks at Ensenada provided a perfect finale to our time in Costa Rica. In the beautiful, calm, early morning conditions we enjoyed close encounters with Willets, Whimbrels, Dowitchers, Frigatebirds, various Herons and Egrets, White Ibis, Royal Terns, Belted Kingfishers and Yellow Warblers.

We departed after breakfast, noted Blue Grosbeaks and Grey Hawks on the way out to the main road and made San Jose in good time for our flights a little time later...
