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Day 1

Friday 22nd September

A beautiful sunny warm afternoon and evening in Alderney greeted our arriving group. After dropping off everyone's luggage at the hotel and after an hour to freshen up, we headed to Fort Albert in the minibus to enjoy the commanding views across the island and give everyone a perspective of the size of the island and locations we would be visiting. En route we stopped at Braye Bay to observe a roost of 10 Sandwich Terns in the company of an adult Mediterranean Gull. Two further Mediterranean Gulls dropped in along the tideline in front of us offering fine views and a chance to look at the differences between this species and the similar looking Black-headed Gull. Then, from our elevated vantage point at Fort Albert, looking down into Saye Bay we could see a single Curlew and five Sanderlings along with a Wheatear on Bibettes head.

Day 2

Saturday 23rd September

We made our way from the hotel by minibus towards Mannez lighthouse. En route we kept spotting birds so made several short stops. On the football pitch we saw one Pied Wagtail and seven of the continental form of this species, the White Wagtail. Then, by the pig pens at the foot of Fort Albert, we found a mixed finch flock of around 40 birds including Greenfinch, Chaffinch and Linnet. At Whitegates fields there were 50+ Starlings and a dozen Meadow Pipits, and on a nearby telephone wire we saw two Sand Martins alongside several Swallows. Lastly, before reaching the lighthouse, Grey Heron and Little Egret were together on Corbletts Quarry.

We set off along the north-east coast path towards Longis Common and Nature Reserve. Soon rewarded by a superb wildlife experience, we enjoyed lovely close views of two Atlantic Grey Seals in the bay just off Fort Corbletts. We spent a few minutes watching them watching us! Along the footpath Red Admirals were regular fly pasts on the southerly breeze. Along this stretch of coastal path, we saw some very obliging Wall Brown butterflies, also Painted Lady, Common Blue, Speckled Wood, Peacock, and Large White. Two Wheatears kept pace with us moving along the tideline and Ted heard a migrating Grey Wagtail passing overhead. At the high tide wader roost opposite Fort Razz were around 70 Oystercatchers, 30 Curlews, nine Ringed Plovers, five Turnstones and a Dunlin. Several Rock Pipits showed well on the beach. For many, the highlight of this walk was the diversity of flora: even this late in the year there are some wonderful wild flowers still in bloom. We located the sort-after Autumn Squill and endemic Alderney Sea Lavender. Other coastal specialities included Sea Pea, Sea Samphire, Rock Lavender, Sea Beet, Sea Campion, Sea Bindweed, Portland Spurge and Thrift. Other wildflowers along the way included Autumn Lady's Tresses, Wild Carrot, Perennial Rocket, Smooth Sow Thistle, Heather, Bell Heather and Wild Thyme. As we headed closer to Longis common a Raven passed overhead.

On Longis Common were another Wheatear, Stonechat and good numbers of Meadow Pipits. On Longis Pond were Little Grebe, Coots and Mallards. Common Darter and Migrant Hawker dragonflies were also present. Amphibious Bistort, Common Reed and Flag Iris were added to the plant list. A large female Sparrowhawk drifted along the tree line along the back of the pond chastened by Swallows.

Lunch at the old barn has proved popular with groups. The last two trips saw Honey Buzzard and Alpine Swift during lunch so the expectation was that something may come our way. For us, over-lunch viewing came in the

shape of a Firecrest and a female Peregrine Falcon. Migrating Swallows also streamed through accompanied by House Martins.

In the afternoon we headed out on a boat trip to take in the rare opportunity to get extremely close to a Gannet colony. The trip was a great success and a buoyant group then decided on dining together at the Alderney Fish'n'chip shop. It transpired that most were seasoned Naturetrekers and stories of wildlife encounters from around the globe dominated conversation.

Day 3

Sunday 24th September

Given the high winds overnight, we moved the moth trap from its regular home to the shelter of Annabel's garden. Despite it being so late in the season, we still managed several species of moths including a wonderful Beautiful Gothic.

Heading down to Arch Bay, a location where several specialist and unusual seaside wildflowers can be found all in one place, we soon located Sea Pea, Sea-holly, Sea Rocket, Sea Spurge and Sea Beet, together with Whinchat and a flock of six Goldfinches. Swallows streamed in off the sea in their hundreds. Whilst witnessing this migration spectacle we also had brief views of Whinchat near to Chateau Le Toq.

At the nearby Mannez Quarry Nature Reserve we were treated to seeing a Pied Flycatcher ringed by the observatory assistant warden. For most of the group, as it would be for many, this was a species of bird they had never seen before. From the reserve hide was a sea of Lesser Reed Mace, and along the pathway we added Enchanters Nightshade, Fleabane and Broad-leaved Willowherb to our plants list. Ted picked up a calling migrating Yellow Wagtail passing overhead, and along the trail were several Chiffchaffs and Blackcaps. We returned to Annabel's lovely garden for lunch. Upon our arrival a Hobby flew up the valley with several unhappy twittering Swallows in hot pursuit.

With options on the table, some opted for a ride on the Alderney train to the north-east end of the island whilst others set out to see more wildlife. Specifically, we took a walk along Braye Bay to see even more seaside wildflower specialists: Orache, Sea Sand Wort and Prickly Saltwort. We also took in Cambridge Battery adding Petty Spurge, Yellow Horned-poppy, Pellitory-of-the-wall, Sea Kale, Wall Butterfly and Hairy Bird's-foot Trefoil to our wildlife return. On Crabby Beach we spotted our first Lesser Black-backed Gull of the tour; a summer breeding visitor to Alderney, this bird was a very late-staying individual.

We all met up again at the hotel having arranged exclusive use of the hotel cinema for a slide show presentation on the wildlife of Alderney at 4pm. This was followed by our daily log and plans for another exciting day ahead.

Day 4

Monday 25th September

This morning was a slightly earlier start for our bird ringing demonstration at Rose Farm. Amongst migrant and resident species, the highlight for most was to observe the ringing of three tiny Firecrests. Whilst enjoying the ringing, a female Great Spotted Woodpecker showed up in the trees nearby; a rare visitor to Alderney, not seen on the island annually.

Next, we split up for lunch at various locations in town before meeting up to go to the well-kept and much-admired Alderney allotments. Ted saw two Grey Wagtails and a Pied Flycatcher in the churchyard during lunch. At the allotments we managed to see not less than 10 species of butterfly included Wall Brown and Comma. Alderney really is a cracking venue for butterflies, both in variety and numbers. Our attention was, however, drawn to other winged beauties in the shape of two Spotted Flycatchers catching insects.

In the evening we headed out, hoping to see the ever-popular Blonde Hedgehogs; the group led by local expert Suzy Weir. We located two brown and two blonde Hedgehogs. With a wealth of information from Suzy, we were able to see and learn about the differences between the familiar Brown Hedgehogs and their Blonde counterparts. A Barn Owl was heard in the darkness but not seen.

Day 5

Tuesday 26th September

It was a late start and beautiful sunshine on our last day. We headed up to the Hammond memorial, commemorating those who had lost their lives on the island as POWs (Prisoners of War) during the German occupation. There had been a good influx of Meadow Pipits overnight in the surrounding fields and migrating Swallows again streamed through. We carried onwards to our destination of the gorse habitat behind Essex Castle. As we pulled up in the minibus our quarry, a Dartford Warbler, showed briefly on a gorse top before quickly disappearing out of sight, but seen by most of the group. A pair of Stonechats accompanied us around the headland as we took in the views below of the south cliffs and Longis bay.

A fine lunch was had at the Old Barn restaurant. A pair of Common Buzzards patrolled the blue skies above. From here it was goodbyes all round and then off to the airport with most of the group on the early afternoon flight.

The remaining Naturetrekers went over to Longis Nature Reserve, seeing two Spotted Flycatchers and a Redstart. These lucky few ended their stay by stumbling across a Grasshopper Warbler, caught early in afternoon during a bird ringing session at Essex farm.
