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Introduction

Although the week started cool it became hotter and more settled through the week. We focussed our efforts on finding the “key” species before then looking for migrants. Although numbers of migrants were lower than average most of the expected species were found. We visited the west coast twice, the north coast once, had two trips down the east side of Kalloni Bay and several visits to the Kalloni Saltpans and wetlands. We also visited two different valleys around Kalloni. We enjoyed an excellent week on this lovely Greek island.

Day 1

Saturday 20th April

It was a day of travel with departure from Gatwick, arrival at Mytiline and crossing the island to Skalla Kallonis all going to plan. We arrived at the Hotel Pasiphae in Skalla Kallonis around 1645 local time and after checking in and sorting ourselves out we walked past the Kalloni pool (unfortunately very dry and overgrown), had a quick scan of the bay and then headed along the road towards the Christou River. Along the way we had fine views of Crested Lark and Corn Bunting and brief glimpses of an Eastern Olivaceous Warbler. On the partial flooded area adjacent to the river there were small numbers of Kentish Plover and Little Stint, a flock of about 100 Black-headed Wagtails, a fine Gull-billed Tern (flying alongside a Common Tern providing a nice comparison. Although distant a Black Stork and a male Marsh Harrier provided additional interest. We returned to the hotel for our evening meal, a quick log and discussion about the plans for the next day and then all went off for an early night.

Day 2

Sunday 21st April

We were up and out early enough to see the sunrise from Metochi Lake. The lake, like many areas of Lesbos is becoming more overgrown, but there was still enough edge and reed to allow us excellent views of 2 males and a female Little Crake a Squacco Heron and 9 Night Herons, plus nice views of Sedge, Reed and Great Reed Warbler. On the way back a Hobby appeared amongst the Swallow flock.

After breakfast we travelled to the northeast corner of Kalloni Bay to the Mesa wetlands. Here standing on the side of the road our first good views of Black Stork, Great Egret and Ruddy Shelduck, up to 3 Short-toed Eagles and a brief Tawny Pipit were also seen. We moved on to the pine forests at Achladeri. As soon as we disembarked we had 2 Woodlarks, a fine singing Cirl Bunting and a Woodchat Shrike all showing very well. On entering the pines we soon found a pair of superb Masked Shrikes and soon after, on hearing the distinctive calls, a pair of Kruper's Nuthatches at their nest site. The female was spending quite a lot of time inside the nest hole with the male occasionally bringing in feathers.

With midday rapidly approaching we headed further down the coast and had an enjoyable walk along the eastern edge of the Polychnitos salt pans. This provided our first chance to see a few waders well with Wood Sandpipers, Greenshank and Ruff all showing along with a single Marsh Sandpiper and Spotted Redshank. On reaching an area of flooded grassland we found a nice flock of mixed Yellow Wagtails, mainly Black-headed, but with a few Blue-headed and a single Grey-headed. With the wagtails were quite a few Red-throated Pipits, some with brick red throats. Also a single Whiskered Tern flew low over our heads giving excellent views.

After lunch in a taverna in Skalla Polychnitos, we headed back northwards stopping in the forest trying to see a Short-toed Treecreeper – one was located, but kept high in the trees and was a best glimpsed... Our final stop was the Kalloni Salt pans. This produced some good birds – a group of Glossy Ibis, Whinchat, a close immature Pallid Harrier, some very smart Spanish Sparrows and 2 White-winged Black Terns.

Day 3

Monday 22nd April

The early morning before breakfast walk saw us reaching the Christou River and finding a couple of superb Stone Curlew which showed very well. After a slightly earlier than usual breakfast we drove westwards with our first stop being in the Lardia Valley. A proposed 20 minute stop turned into over an hour as a succession of good birds including Rock Sparrow, Blue Rock Thrush, Crag Martin and Eastern Bonelli's Warbler – the last species proving very difficult to see despite singing almost through out the time we were present.

We left the Lardia Valley and our next stop was the Eresos T junction where 3 Isabelline Wheatears were found. Moving on we parked at the bottom of the Ipsilou Monastery road and walked up the road on the more sheltered and sunny south side. Our first good bird here was a fine singing Cinereous Bunting, but several Black-eared Wheatears were also seen well. There were few migrants in evidence, but some of the resident species showed well – 3 Sombre Tits, Peregrine and a fine showy Subalpine Warbler amongst the best. Some walked down the north side and others visited the Monastery itself before being collected at the top car park.

Our next stop was lunch in Sigri and then a walk through the fields and groves at Fanermoni as far as the upper ford. Like Ipsilou there were few migrants, but 4 Red-backed Shrikes, 2 Eastern Orphee Warblers and a smart male Collared Flycatcher were the highlight. We left the fields and as we climbed out of Sigri we found a close Griffon Vulture being mobbed first by Ravens and then by Buzzards. It gave fantastic views as it moved slowly away to the north.

Our final stop was at the Petrified Forest where a White-throated Robin had been in residence for several days. It took quite some time to find it and then even longer to get good views, but all the group saw it well in the end. We arrived back at the Pasiphae Hotel for our dinner, checklist and bed.

Day 4

Tuesday 23rd April

We headed out before breakfast to the Kalloni Saltpans and after looking at the Alykes wetlands by the saltpans entrance, we walked back along the road and along the track near the Pumphouse (“the Pumphouse Moat”). The light was excellent and we had good views of Squacco Heron, Ruddy Shelduck and a fine male Red-footed Falcon and, on the “moat” we had 2 Temminck’s Stints.

We left the hotel after breakfast in search of Scop’s Owls - we failed at the first site, but found a single bird at the second site which showed very well. We then headed north and stopped at the “Bandstand” overlooking Kalloni Plain. Raptors were not much in evidence, but the local Cretzschmar’s Buntings and a Red-backed Shrike did. After crossing the mountains we arrived at the Kavaki headland lay-by and had seen and heard a stunning Ruppell’s Warbler even before getting out of the vehicle. This very showy individual performed for all singing from an overhead wire on several occasions. After this we went on past Molivos to Eftalou and enjoyed some reasonable close Yelkouan Shearwaters, but all but one of the Cory’s we saw remained very distant.

We returned to Skalla Kalloni for lunch and some relaxation before heading back to the Kalloni Saltpans. Here we spend more time looking at the pans themselves before moving onto the sheep fields. At the fields a large flock of Glossy Ibis were on view with a few Wood Sandpipers and single Stone Curlew and a Lapwing. A flock of 35 Short-toed Larks were quite obliging and a single Zitting Cisticola sang around our vehicle. We decided to head back to the hotel, but the usual good birds (including a close Purple Heron) kept us at the pans later than planned, but we still got back to the hotel in good time.

Day 5

Wednesday 24th April

Early morning we returned to Metochi Lake to enjoy more excellent views of Little Crake, our best views of Great Reed Warbler and 2 Little Bitterns, one of which showed extremely well. A Kingfisher was, as usual, nice to see.

After breakfast we headed down the east side of Kalloni Bay to Polychinotos Saltpans and walked along the eastern track. Star birds here were a male and female Citrine Wagtail amongst good numbers of Black-headed and Blue-headed Wagtails. On the pans themselves a flock of Ruff contained c.12 Little Stints and a single Curlew Sandpiper. During our return towards Kalloni we stopped on the edge of the Pine woods to watch a couple of Serins – a new bird for the trip.

After lunch we ventured up into the Napi Valley and eventually found a Rock Nuthatch, but whilst doing so enjoyed a female Cuckoo, a fine male Blue Rock Thrush, a Sombre Tit, a couple of Masked Shrikes and our first views of Hoopoe as well as more of what had become the expected species such as Black-eared Wheatear and Cretzschmar’s Bunting and Short-toed Eagle.

Our final destination was the Tsiknias River where good views of Eastern Olivaceous Warbler were had and the day ended with some nice wader watching in the excellent late afternoon light.

Day 6

Thursday 25th April

Sunrise today was witnessed over the Kalloni Salt pans. The main interest was a fine male Montagu's Harrier, which was accompanied at times by a female Hen Harrier, which provided a good comparison.

After breakfast we headed west and following a quick leg stretch in the Lardia Valley we were on course to get to Fanaormeni before 1030 when a close feeding party of about a 12 Red-footed Falcons and 3 Eleonora's waylaid us. They continued to feed on flying insects close to the road providing excellent views. At Fanaromeni our first stop indicated a few more birds were present than on our previous visit. In the trees were a few Collared Flycatchers and a couple of Golden Oriole while Lesser Kestrels while Lesser Kestrels hunted over recently cut fields. A Short-toed Eagle was overhead and then our first Long-legged Buzzard showed just after the van doors closed resulting in yet another rapid getting out.

We drove further into Fanaromeni and then walked to the upper ford. A male Black-headed Bunting showed on a wire, several Red-backed Shrikes (out numbering Woodchats), Whinchats, but the star birds were probably two close perched Red-rumped Swallows, a nice perched Turtle Dove and on the way out a Roller perched on wires.

After lunch we headed back east and then down to Eresos. Few birds here in the heat of the day which set the scene for the journey back on the south road via Agra. Lovely scenery, but relatively few birds...

Day 7

Friday 26th April

Before breakfast we visited the Kalloni Salt pans and covered the same area as yesterday. The usual wetland birds were enjoyed, but the undoubted highlight was a single Lesser Grey Shrike – closely followed by a fine Long-legged Buzzard sitting on a telegraph pole and 4 Temminck's Stints.

After breakfast we headed a couple of miles west into the Potamia Valley and walked up to the small reservoir. Here a fine perched Short-toed Eagle, which despite being quite distant was appreciated as were the two much closer perched, and then circling overhead, Long-legged Buzzards. Lower down in the valley we watched a Rock Nuthatch, feeding extremely close to a Large Whip Snake and heard, but could not see, an Olive-tree Warbler.

After the valley we visited the school Papiana where a close and relatively low perched Scop's Owl was seen as was an adult and 2 young Long-eared Owls. Moving on from the owls we went and watched Rock Nuthatches bringing food to a nest and then drove down the Tsiknias River where a very close White Stork provided the best views of the trip for this species. As there were few other birds we made our way into Skalla Kalloni for lunch.

After lunch we returned to the Achladeri pine woods for a walk amongst the shade of the trees – the temperature by this time was 30 degrees. Few birds were noted, but it was a very pleasant place to be in the late afternoon heat. After the pine woods we drove up into the Napi Valley and walked along to watch a Middle Spotted Woodpecker nest site. As we arrived a single bird flew off and over the next 30 minutes birds visited the nest 3 times, providing good views. After this we returned to the hotel.

Day 8

Saturday 26th April

By popular demand it was another visit to Metochi Lake this morning. There were fewer Little Crakes than on the previous visit, but one male showed very well. The lack of crakes was made up for by up to 7 Little Bitterns that were on view continuously.

After breakfast we only had time for a quick look at the Kalloni Saltpans, adding Dunlin to our trip list, but enjoying the egrets, Squacco Herons, Black-winged Stilts and Flamingos for the last time.

After the last minute packing we set off across the island reaching Mytiline in good time for the flight back to Gatwick.
