Day 1

Friday 9th September

Outbound to Kuala Lumpur

Apart from Manda and Steve who were travelling from Australia and joining the group in Kuala Lumpur, everyone caught a midday Malaysian Airlines flight from London Heathrow to Kuala Lumpur, a journey of about 12 hours.

Day 2

Saturday 10th September

Outbound to Sandakan via Kuala Lumpur and Kota Kinabalu

Weather: fine, hot and sticky at Sepilok

After arrival in Kuala Lumpur there was a short wait before boarding an onward connection to Kota Kinabalu, the capital of Sabah, where, after another short wait, the final flight of the long journey delivered everyone to Sandakan on time at 1440 (local). Local guide Hazwan and I met the group as they exited the arrivals area and we soon set off on the 40 minutes drive to Sepilok Nature Resort, a comfortable lodge adjacent to the famous Sepilok Orang-utan Rehabilitation Centre, for a two night stay. On arrival at the lodge there was a little time to freshen up before an optional stroll around the grounds for an hour or so before dusk to see any birds or mammals that were about.

Highlights this evening included some fine views of Red Giant Flying Squirrels behind our rooms, a Plantain Squirrel and birds including Black and Oriental Pied Hornbills, Copper-throated Sunbird, White-breasted Waterhens and Green Imperial Pigeons. After a buffet dinner nobody kept late hours after the long journey.

Day 3

Sunday 11th September

Sepilok

Weather: mostly fine with a short light shower mid-afternoon, hot and sticky

Early risers gathered at the lodge veranda at 0600 and were treated to fine views of a Rhinoceros Hornbill eating figs in a tree right above us as both Stork-billed and Blue-eared Kingfishers performed on the lodge pond. A short walk nearby produced a variety of Sunbirds and Flowerpeckers and our first Prevost's Squirrel while a White-bellied Woodpecker put on a good show just before we returned for breakfast at 0730.

At 0900 we walked the short distance to Sepilok Orang-utan Rehabilitation Centre where the stroll to the feeding platform was enlivened by the sight of a slumbering Wagler's Pit Viper. At the platform we had a lengthy wait but eventually an Orang-utan appeared and those who lingered longest saw two more. Back at the visitor centre one of the Orang-utans put on a good show as it clambered about in a large bamboo and did roll-overs along the roof!

Back at the lodge there was time to freshen up before lunch and at 14.00 we returned to the Rehabilitation Centre for the afternoon feeding via a stop to photograph some showy Pig-tailed Macaques and a single Long-tailed Macaque in the car park and a surprise Red Giant Flying Squirrel en route to the feeding platform. At the platform two Orang-utans showed up for a handout of bananas and lingered for ages. Most of the group opted to do a dusk walk back at the feeding platform area where Red Giant Flying Squirrels put on a good show.

Day 4

Monday 12th September

Sepilok, en route to Sukau via Sandakan

Weather: fine, hot and sticky

Almost everyone joined a 06.00 excursion to the nearby Rainforest Discovery Centre where we took up positions on the sturdy canopy walkway there and watched the forest wake up. Birds seen during our 90 minute stay included Black-and-yellow Broadbill, White-bellied Erpornis, Velvet-fronted Nuthatches, Green Ioras and Fiery Minivets while mammal highlights were several Prevost's Squirrels and a spectacularly diminutive Plain Pygmy Squirrel.

Back at the resort there was time for a leisurely breakfast and packing while Jean opted for a return visit to the Orang-utans and succeeded in seeing five individuals including a mature male and a mother and baby. Others spent some time exploring the hotel grounds before we loaded the bus and set off to nearby Sandakan at 11.00. Forty minutes later we were settling down for an early buffet lunch at the Sandakan Hotel and some took the opportunity to briefly explore the town before we made our way to a nearby jetty at 13.00. Two powerful motorboats were waiting to transport us to our next base at Sukau Rainforest Lodge and as we had them to ourselves the decision was made to travel at a leisurely pace and stop to look at anything of interest en route.

Highlights before we arrived at our character-full riverside lodge at 14.45 included a few troops of Proboscis Monkeys, White-bellied Sea Eagles and Oriental Darters plus several other birds. Once at the lodge we had time to settle in before darkness fell. Dinner at 19.00 preceded an hour-long night cruise at 20.15 which produced excellent views of several roosting birds such as Blue-eared and Stork-billed Kingfishers, several large Water Monitors and a brief saltwater crocodile. As we returned to the lodge jetty a Buffy Fish Owl showed well in the spotlight.

Day 5

Tuesday 13th September

Sukau; Gomantong Caves

Weather: fine, hot and sticky

Our day began with a knock on the door at 05.30 and tea or coffee and toast before we set off in three motorised canoes at shortly after 06.00. Travelling a short distance downstream we then turned in to the quiet Menangol Tributary where we switched to electric motors and spent the next couple of hours slowly and quietly exploring this pleasant backwater. Several troops of Proboscis Monkeys marked our progress along with a few Long-tailed Macaques while birds included Lesser Fish Eagle, Malaysian Blue Flycatchers, a brief Blue-headed Pitta and several Long-tailed Parakeets.

Back at the lodge we ate a hearty breakfast overlooking the river. The rest of the morning was free to relax or to explore the short boardwalk through the forest behind the lodge where birds of interest included Buff-necked Woodpeckers, Black-and-red Broadbills and Chestnut-winged Babblers and some saw a couple of Plain Pygmy Squirrels.

After lunch we set off at 14.30 on the short river journey to Sukau Village where our bus was waiting to transport us to Gomantong Caves, 40 minutes away. Stopping about one kilometre short of the visitor centre we took a slow stroll along the road through rich rainforest and were rewarded with views of Long-billed Spiderhunter, Bronzed Drongo, Dark-hooded Oriole and a few more bit and pieces. Everyone opted to join Hazwan on an exploration of the cave made famous by David Attenborough and our visit coincided with Swiftlet nest collection so that we were able to observe this rather perilous activity. Back near the bus, where a troop of Maroon Langurs put on a good show, we waited for the sun to drop behind the large limestone outcrop and shortly afterward countless Wrinkle-lipped Bats began to emerge from a high exit point in a long ribbon before forming into tight balls as a defence against avian predators that tonight included three Bat Hawks, a couple of Brahminy Kites and a brief Peregrine. We were back at our lodge in time to shower and change before dinner.

Day 6

Wednesday 14th September

Sukau, en route to Danum Valley

Weather: fine, hot and sticky

A final dawn cruise began at 06.00 and we headed upstream along the main channel of the Sungai Kinabatangan where once again we enjoyed several views of troops of Proboscis Monkeys and a few Long-tailed and Pig-tailed Macaques.

The chief highlight this morning however was three encounters with the rare Storm's Stork while other birds included a Lesser Adjutant Stork, Wrinkled, Black, Rhinoceros and, for one boat, White-crowned Hornbills.

Back at the lodge we finished packing and sat down for breakfast before making our way back to Sukau Village and the waiting bus at 09.30. A couple of hours later we arrived in Lahad Datu and ate a buffet lunch at the Executive Hotel before transferring the short distance to the offices of Borneo Rainforest Lodge where we completed a few formalities before transferring into four waiting vehicles that were to transfer us to the lodge in the remote Danum Valley. As the logging track to Danum Valley had recently been improved we made good progress and even with a 15 minute comfort break we arrived at the excellent lodge by 16.00 for a four night stay. After a short briefing we made our way to our comfortable rooms to settle in, most of the group later gathered on the lodge veranda for sundowners or to watch a delightful Whiskered Treeswift that posed for the scope. After dinner at 19.00 an hour long night drive in the lodge truck produced Thomas's and Red Giant Flying Squirrels plus a Pentail Treeshrew and a Sambar Deer.

Day 7

Thursday 15th September

Danum Valley

Weather: fine apart from a short light shower mid-afternoon, hot and sticky

A pre-breakfast stroll along the lodge Access Road gave those who wanted to the chance to have a look at the impressive canopy walkway where three Bornean Bristleheads and other birds were seen while nearby a Crested Jay and a couple of Raffle's Malkohas showed well.

After breakfast most of the group accompanied local guides Vivian and Lyster on a quest for Orang-utans on the Jacuzzi Pool and Segama Trails and returned tired but happy at lunch having seen three Orang-utans and couple of Bornean Gibbons. Those of a birdier disposition concentrated on the Hornbill Trail and Jacuzzi Pool area where Asian Paradise Flycatcher, various Babblers and Bulbuls and showy pair of Diard's Trogons were the highlights along with an uncharacteristically obliging Chestnut-naped Forktail. During lunch we watched a small troop of Maroon Langurs in a nearby tree.

Evening walks took us to the Segama or Jacuzzi Pool Trails but apart from a brief Orang-utan at the latter and a few Hornbills in a fruiting tree it was rather quiet. At 18.45 an hour long dusk drive commenced and by the time we returned for dinner an hour later we'd seen a Colugo and a Malay Civet, a Brown Wood Owl plus a few other bits and pieces.

Day 8

Friday 16th September

Danum Valley

Weather: fine apart from a short sharp shower mid-afternoon, hot and sticky

Our day began once again with a walk along the Access Road and once more produced a small group of Bornean Bristleheads near the canopy walkway plus Fluffy-backed Tit Babblers, a Banded Kingfisher, a Banded Broadbill and others including some showy Red-throated Sunbirds in a flowering tree.

After breakfast we explored various trails and the canopy walkway seeing three Bornean Gibbons, four Orang-utans and a couple of Giant Squirrels while birds included Asian Fairy Bluebirds, a Wallace's Hawk-eagle, two roosting Brown Wood Owls and a good selection of Babblers and others.

Our evening walk took us either to the Hornbill Trail, where it was rather quiet apart from a couple of Giant Squirrels, or to the Jacuzzi Pool where a male Orang-utan put on a good show and the Chestnut-naped Forktail continued to perform well. An hour long night walk after dinner produced a host of invertebrates and arachnids, Bornean Horned Frogs and a Common Palm Civet

Day 9

Saturday 17th September

Danum Valley

Weather: fine in the morning with steady rain in the afternoon until early evening, hot and sticky

Once again most of us concentrated on the Access Road before breakfast with rewards in the shape of several Raffles's Malkohas and a couple of Chestnut-breasted Malkohas. Four people opted for a more strenuous morning jaunt that took them up to the viewpoint high above the lodge with packed breakfast and were rewarded with fine views and a couple of Bornean Gibbons.

After breakfast most opted to relax, especially as we had been upgraded to deluxe rooms complete with river views and hot tubs, but the appearance of a very obliging adult male Orang-utan on the Nature Trail tempted some out and fantastic views were enjoyed with Short-tailed and Black-capped Babblers as a bonus.

Rain curtailed plans for an evening excursion but it was dry by the time of our night drive which produced highlights in the shape of three Malay Civets, a Common Palm Civet and a Common Porcupine

Day 10

Sunday 18th September

Danum Valley; inbound to Kuala Lumpur via Kota Kinabalu

Weather: fine, hot and sticky

After a leisurely breakfast and some final packing we set off back to Lahad Datu, a journey of a little under three hours. On arrival at the airport we checked-in and ate our packed lunches. The flight to Kota Kinabalu left on time and arrived 40 minutes later. Apart from Brian and Corinne who were staying on in Sabah for a few days and Colin and Helen who were off to Singapore the next day everyone had a short wait before the onward connection to Kuala Lumpur and the final leg of the return journey to London.

Day 11

Monday 19th September

Inbound continued

The Malaysian Airlines flight from Kuala Lumpur to London arrived around 06.00 and everyone made their way home.
