## Summary

This is a trip report for the first Surf & Turf Tour made in Peru for Naturetrek. I would like to thank to all members of the group, who taught me the old British school for birdwatching. Special Thanks to John Oates who will kindly share his pictures with the company. Thanks to Vince Parslow, Paul Goodman, Paul & Anne Morris, Andy & Pauline Rook and John Lumby for making this trip possible. I really hope to see you back in South America sometime soon

### Day 1

Wednesday 30th November

Miraflores for a good night's sleep. Two people arrived later on KLM.

### Day 2

Thursday 1st November

We gathered at the hotel restaurant for breakfast, enjoying a beautiful view of the Pacific Ocean and seeing our first birds of the trip: Long Tailed Mockingbird, Scrub Blackbird, Amazilia Hummingbird, Bananaquit, Southern House Wren and West Peruvian Doves. We boarded our two 4-wheel drive vehicles and were off to Villa Marshes or in Spanish Pantanos de Villa. On the way, we made a stop along the beach and some marine birds were found: Kelp and Belcher's Gulls, Peruvian Pelican, Neotropic & Guanay Cormorants, Gray Gull flying over the ocean, Peruvian Boobies, hundreds of Franklin's Gulls and the beautiful Inca Tern. At the marshes, the birding was really good: Groove-billed Ani, Hudsonian Whimbrel, both Great and Pied Billed Grebes, Yellow-crowned and Black-crowned Night Herons, American Oystercatcher, Spotted Sandpiper, Little Blue Heron, Vermilion Flycatcher (the dark form found only on the coast), Tropical Kingbird, Yellow-hooded Blackbird (a feral population in Lima found at Villa Marshes), Killdeer, thousands of Franklin's Gulls, many Black Skimmers and the fantastic Peruvian Thick-Knees. At another spot we found Snowy and Great Egrets, Striated Heron, Many-colored Rush-Tyrant, (considered the most beautiful flycatcher in the world), Wren-like Rushbird, Least Bittern, Cinnamon Teal, Common Moorhen, Andean (Slate-colored) Coot, Black Vulture, Chestnut-throated Seedeater, Southern Beardless Tyrannulet, Blue-black Grassquit and a small flock of Grassland Yellow Finches.

After excellent birding on the marshes, we continued south on the Pan-American Highway towards Pucusana, a fishing village located 60 km or so south of Lima. Upon arrival, we boarded an artisanal fishing boat and went off shore for an hour, finding Ruddy Turnstones, Surfbirds, Peruvian Surf Cinclodes (our first Peruvian endemic), Blackish Oystercatchers, Red-legged Cormorants, Blue-footed Boobys (rare), and one of the targets of the trip: Humboldt Penguins. We also saw large colonies of Peruvian Boobys, Inca Terns, more Neotropical Cormorants and the very unusual and rare Marine otter (our first mammal of the tour). Southern Sea Lions were also seen on the ride. After the ride, we were delighted with a tasty Peruvian seafood dish: ceviche, and marine jalea, another excellent marine dish only prepared here in Peru.

After lunch we set off to Gambusias Hotel, located at 45 kms east of Lima, at the base of the Santa Eulalia Valley, a strategic accommodation for the next day of the tour - the ascension up the valley. On the way, we stopped along the river and found more egrets, herons, cormorants, and Harris's Hawk.

Before it got dark, we were able to get some few new birds for the trip just by looking around the grounds of the hotel: Chiguanco Thrush, Croaking Ground Dove, Saffron finches, Red-masked Parakeet, Band-tailed Seedeaters, Vermilion Flycatcher (the red form), Blue and yellow Tanagers and at the plaza in Chosica, Cinereous Conebill along with the very common Rufous-collared Sparrow. After dinner at the hotel, we went to sleep in anticipation of many new birds tomorrow.

## Day 3

## Friday 2nd November

After a very early start, we made our way up to Huachupampa, only 33km up the Santa Eulalia road but with a lot of excellent birds to find. On the way to our first birding stop 20 minutes from the hotel, we found a nice Peruvian Pygmy Owl perched on a branch next to the road - an excellent start to the day! Once we arrived at our first stop, we did some birding while our driver Julio made our delicious breakfast. Birds included Pied-crested and Yellow-billed Tit-Tyrants, Peruvian Pygmy Owl (again), Oasis Hummingbird, Purple-collared Woodstar, Eared Dove, Bare-faced Ground Dove, Andean Swift, Streak-Throated Bush Tyrant, Hooded Siskins, Band-tailed Sierra Finch and Golden-bellied Saltator. What an amazing breakfast out there in the field, surrounded by the beautiful mountains and all these fantastic birds. During breakfast we added Drab Seedeater and the Peruvian endemic Black-necked Woodpecker. After breakfast and while waiting for Julio and Ronald to get ready again, we started walking the road and added Dusky-capped Flycatcher, Collared Warbling-Finch and White-collared Swifts.

Julio and Ronald came and picked us up and we continued in the 4WDs for another 45 minutes, to our next birding spot. The western slopes of the central Andes in Peru are very dry, with only a few fertile valleys irrigated by streams. The scenery and attendant birds are constantly changing as you rise in altitude.

Our next stop delivered two great target species: Great Inca Finch and Bronze-tailed Comet - just fantastic!

Another 20 minutes up the road (wonderful scenery all the way) and we were out of the cars again. Here we followed a small river and saw White-capped Dipper, Torrent Ducks, White-tipped Doves and a Variable Hawk (juvenile). Then we drove on and up for another 45 minutes to our lunch spot and more birds of course.

While waiting for lunch to be made, we walked along the road enjoying some great birding, adding Rusty-bellied Brush Finch (Peruvian endemic) and wonderful eye-to-eye views of 4 Andean Condors. We also added Spot-winged Pigeons, Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle, Giant Hummingbird and White-browed Chat Tyrant. Lunch was ready!

We were running a little bit late so jumped in the cars again and headed up the road for our last birding spot before Huachupampa. After another 25 minutes of driving we disembarked and bagged Black-winged Ground Doves, Andean Tinamou, more Rusty-bellied Brush finches, and again Rufous-collared Sparrows. We arrived finally at the small Andean town of Huachupampa at almost 3,000m for the night. The hotel is very basic, but offers adequate shelter for the night.

## Day 4

## Saturday 3rd November

After a very early breakfast in the main plaza of Huachupampa (during which we heard a Great Horned Owl singing - we couldn't find it there, but we saw it later on the trip!) we were off to try to find another Peruvian endemic: Rufous-bellied Warbling Finch. Unfortunately we couldn't find it but the place delivered a selection of new birds for us including Band-winged Nightjar, (only seen by Paul as the bird landed outside his window before breakfast!), Black-throated Flowerpiercer, Rufous capped Tit Spinetail (another Peruvian endemic), Andean Tinamou (much better view than yesterday), Canyon Canastero, D'Orbigny's Chat Tyrant and Mourning Sierra Finches, plus and another beautiful Peruvian endemic Black Metaltail.

We continued our way up the road in the cars, and our next stop just alongside the road produced Black-billed Shrike Tyrant, Greenish Yellow Finches, Plain-colored Seedeater and Peruvian Sierra Finches.

This day in the tour is a long day and very scenic, so birding is mainly focused along the road, with some good target species. During the course of the morning we found Peruvian Sierra Finches, Cream-winged Cinclodes, Andean Goose and Puna Ibis. We stopped about 1 hour from Huachupampa in an area with a lot of threatened, red-barked Polylepis trees, these are native trees that grow in high areas in the Andes. Here we were ready for a little bit of a climbing which is needed for some of the specialties. Here we added Plain-breasted Earthcreeper, Ash-breakfast Sierra Finches, White-winged Cinclodes, more Andean Condors, Brown-bellied and Andean Swallows, Rufous-webbed Tyrant, Rufous-naped Ground Tyrant and inside the Polylepis trees, the always-elusive Striped-headed Antpitta. Back to the main road and lunch was ready, another great lunch prepared by the drivers. After lunch and while waiting for the guys to pack everything, we found a Great Horned Owl sleeping in a little hole on the other side of the valley. Great views through the scope - nobody missed it this time!

Off again after lunch, heading up to the top of the mountain, the weather started changing with clouds and mist covering the view of the valley. However we found a super mega bird for Peru, the fantastic, Peruvian endemic and endangered White-bellied Cinclodes, not at the regular spot but fantastic views of this sought-after bird! Puna Snipe was also seen here, (some people missed it at this point, but later on the trip was seen by everyone), Ornate Tinamou seen only by Paul Goodman, Speckled Teal, Andean Lapwing, Andean Flicker and White-winged Diuca Finch, ah, we also found Peruvian (Northern) Andean Viscacha (a rabbit-like mammal that inhabits the Andes and is able to survive in a very cold and extreme weather conditions).

Next stop, even higher up, we made our first attempt for the fabled 'DSP' (Diademed Sandpiper Plover), one of the main targets species of trip. Unfortunately due to the bad weather conditions (cold rain by this point), we couldn't find it, so we went straight to the Hotel Chez Victor, located on the main central highway in San Mateo, at 3100 meters in elevation.

## Day 5

## Sunday 4th November

Today is one of the most anticipated of the whole tour as we try for some of the most sought-after and mythical birds of South America.

After a very early breakfast we were off and back to the high pass of Ticlio, (4,800m), a drive of about one hour. Birding started as soon as we arrived: Andean Gull flying over, Puna Snipe flying over, White-bellied Cinclodes and both Rufous-bellied and Gray-breasted Seedsnipe, Streak-throated Canastero, Plumbeous Sierra Finches, Andean Geese and Giant Coot were also found.

So, time to find the DSP. We went back to the Marcapomacocha road to get it, and only 1.5 km away from the main road, we stopped and guess what??, 2 of the plovers at this spot, so close to the road, that we couldn't believe it, those birds were so tame that the views were just amazing. We spend about 1 hour with these birds, unbelievable.

After the plover, we went 8km up the road for lunch and more birds of course. At this spot and while waiting for lunch, we found Slender-billed, Thick billed and Dark-winged Miners, White-fronted, Taczanowsky and Puna Ground-tyrants, Bright-rumped Yellow finches, Black Faced Ibis (race *branicki*), and more condors.

We all enjoyed another great meal in the field. After lunch and having found almost all of the targets, we went to a nice valley lower in elevation called Rio Branco. Here is an area with a lot of bunch grasses, we found another Peruvian endemic: Junin Canastero. Rain had started so we decided to move lower and bird the valley. We got here: Torrent Ducks, Black-throated Flowerpiercers, Peruvian Sierra Finches, Rusty-bellied Brush Finch again, and Great Thrush, the weather was also getting really bad, so we decided to get back to the hotel content with the great birds that we had seen.

## Day 6

Monday 5th November

Band-winged Nightjar had decided to roost on the stairs of the hotel, what a bird! We had the whole morning to bird before heading back to Lima, so we decided to go back up to the road to Marcapomacocha for DSP again, and to see what else we could find on the way there. We saw the Plovers once again at the same spot, and Puna Snipes were also there taking a bath at the same place, it was just great!! Condors and Mountain Caracara were seen flying over the mountains.

Back to the hotel for lunch, and then back to Lima for dinner. On the way back there were Cattle Egrets, Scrub Blackbirds, Tropical Kingbirds, Blue and White Swallows and Rufous-collared Sparrows.

## Day 7

Tuesday 6th November

Having done the "Turf" today we started the "Surf" part of the trip. After breakfast at the hotel, we boarded the vehicles and began our journey south to the city of Paracas, located in Ica Department approximately 290km south of Lima.

Our first stop was in a place called Puerto Viejo, an area with some marshes and access to the Pacific Ocean. This place has a viewing platform where we found Peruvian Red-Breasted Meadowlark, Least Bittern (nice views), White-cheeked Pintails, Osprey, Coastal Miner (Peruvian endemic), Semi-palmated and Least Sandpiper, Cinereous Conebill (the coastal form), House Sparrow (first one for the trip), Shiny Cowbirds, and by the ocean we encountered Peruvian Thick-Knees, Guanay and Neotropic Cormorants, Inca Terns, Peruvian Boobies, Kelp, Gray-hooded and Belcher's Gulls and the beautiful Black Skimmers. We left Puerto Viejo and continued

heading south to another bird spot before lunch in a place called Mala. Here we got some great coastal birds: Croaking Ground Doves (excellent views) Streaked Saltator, Blue-black Grassquit, Shiny Cowbird, Chestnut-throated Seedeater, Amazilia Hummingbird, Oasis Hummingbird, Purple-collared Woodstar, Short-tailed Field Tyrant and the beautiful Parrot-billed Seedeater.

Lunch was at Paulina Restaurant, 15 minutes after Mala. After lunch, we went straight to Paracas in order to get there before dark and to bird the shore of the hotel.

Hotel Bahia Paracas is a 5-star hotel very close to the boundary of Paracas National Reserve.

Before dinner, we saw Gray-bellied Plover, many Sandwich Terns, Royal and Elegant Terns, Semipalmated Plover, Great Grebe, Chilean Flamingos, Sanderlings, Semipalmated and Western Sandpipers, West Peruvian Doves, Rufous-collared Sparrows, Andean Ruddy Ducks, Black-crowned Night Herons and Black Skimmers, Lesser and Greater Yellowlegs and Black-necked Stilts. The Pacific Ocean with the nutrient-rich Humboldt Current provides a lot of food to many coastal birds, so, birding here is very productive. We had an excellent dinner at the hotel. Great end to the day!

## Day 8

Wednesday 7th November

Very early and before breakfast we went for a short walk along the beach and found very much the same as we found yesterday. However Snowy Plover walking by the beach was new and Bottlenose Dolphin was also new. Breakfast and then off to the Ballestas Islands on our speedboat.

This tour to the Ballestas Islands takes about 2 hours and we saw big colonies of cormorants, boobies, Inca and Common terns, and many fantastic Humboldt Penguins. The islands are just spectacular!! with great photo opportunities, and the sight of big colonies of Southern Sea Lions.

After returning to the hotel and lunch, we went along the coastal beach towards Pisco marshes, 7km north of Paracas. On the way, we saw more Flamingos, Sanderlings, Semipalmated Sandpipers and Least Sandpipers. Once at the marshes, we saw Wilson's Phalaropes, Stilt Sandpipers, Burrowing Owls, Yellowish Pipits and Short-billed Dowitcher and many more of the same birds we had seen before. Back to the hotel for dinner.

## Day 9

Thursday 8th November

Sadly, our last day of the tour, we met again before breakfast to go for another walk along the beach. Today we added Peruvian Tern in flight and saw Sandwich, Royal and Elegant Terns, Sanderlings, Coastal Miner and Snowy Plovers again.

After breakfast, we visited Paracas National Reserve, an area protected since 1975 in Peru, the main reason for this national reserve is to protect mainly the marine ecosystem (60%) but also part of the desert (40%) in this part of the country.

Here we visited Lagunillas, Salinas de Otuma and the rock formation 'catedral'. Amazing scenery and a fascinating ecosystem.

Finally we went back to Paracas for our last Lunch together, then back to Lima airport on time for the international flight back to the UK.

## Day 9

Thursday 8th November

Back in the UK in the late afternoon.

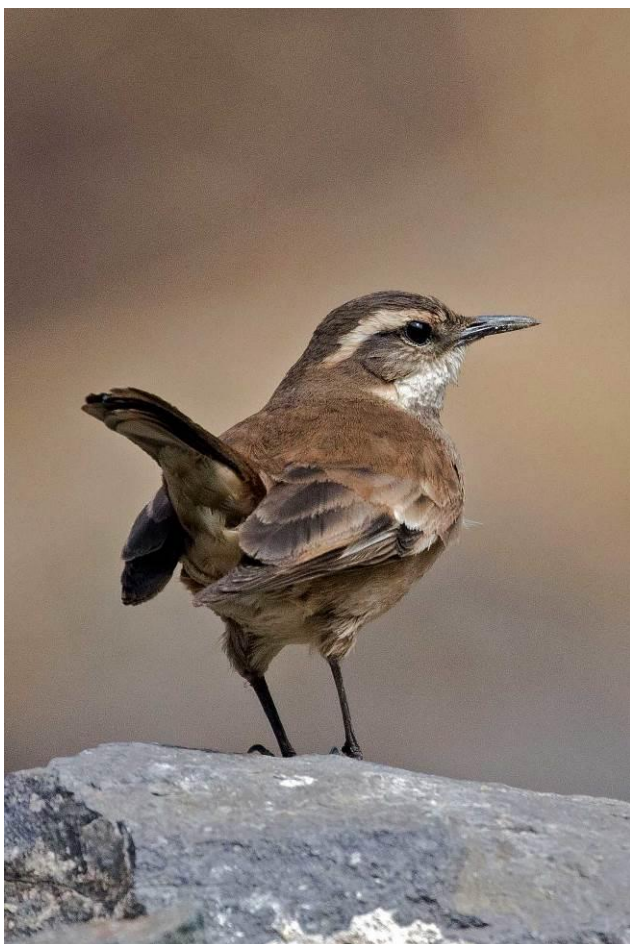
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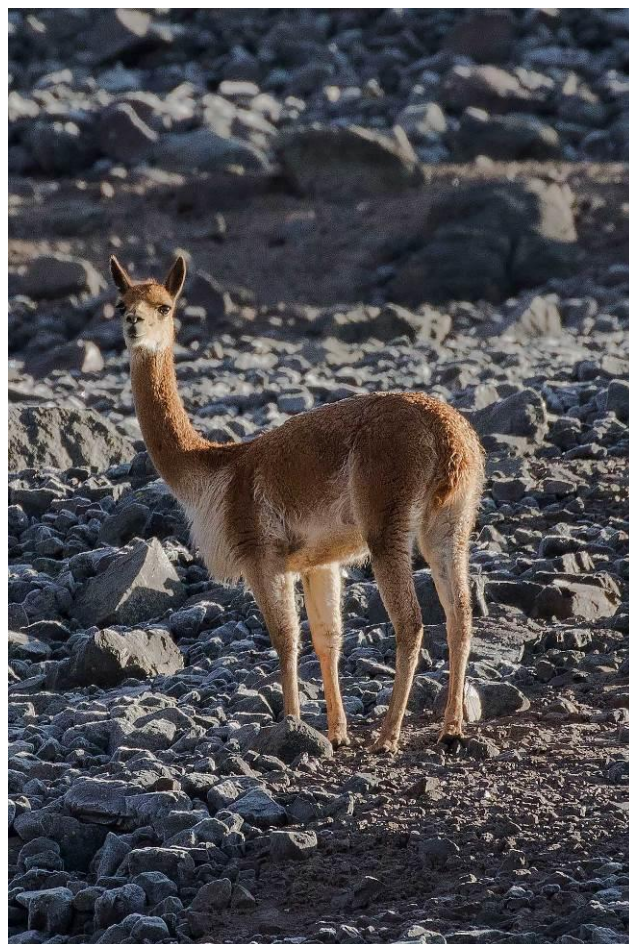
