Day 0

Wednesday 30th July

Travelling from the UK

Day 1

Thursday 31st July

Villa wetlands, Pucusana & Huacachina lagoon

[We agreed to start our report from the first day of our excursion when we went to Paracas, with an earlier stop at the Villa wetlands and the fishermen village of Pucusana. It was an excellent trip. We saw 15 endemics, plus some other birds with restricted range.]

In the morning we met Jack, our excellent guide for the next few days and Juan, the driver of the coach. We were ready to start our adventure along the coast. Our first stop was at the Villa wetlands. Here we saw Andean Duck, Cinnamon Teal, Great Grebe, several egrets, Puna Ibis, Wren-like Rushbird and the always spectacular Many-coloured Rushbird.

We continued our trip to the small village of Pucusana, where we enjoyed a boat ride before lunch. We saw the three species of cormorants, Peruvian Pelicans, the most beautiful of all the terns, the Inca Tern, and also a Surf Cinclodes, the most marine of the passerines. We continued our trip farther south to the Huacachina Lagoon, where we arrived at our hotel. After dinner we compiled the day's bird log.

Day 2

Friday 1st August

Huacachina Lagoon, Nazca Lines flight

We rose very early to look for birds. It was a little disappointing since there was not a lot of activity, however there was a great surprise waiting for us when we flushed a Black-faced Ibis, a rare species. This ibis is the subspecies that occurs on the coast, not the Andean version.

While waiting for the flight over the Nazca lines, we went to look for birds in the reserve of Paracas. Here we had good views of the bay and saw some of the effects of the tsunami that came after the earthquake. The area had changed since my last visit and there were fewer birds than before, but we managed to see some early boreal migrants such as Black-bellied, Snowy, and Semipalmated Plovers, Spotted Sandpiper, Ruddy Turnstone, several gull species such as Gray, Band-tailed, Kelp and Gray-hooded Gulls.

At the airport we also saw the Short-tailed Field-Tyrant, the 'rare' Vermilion Flycatcher and a family of Burrowing Owls. We left the fliers there and went for lunch. Later we went to the Dunas Hotel where we saw the endemic Black-necked Woodpecker and a very responsive Peruvian Pygmy-Owl. Our hotel welcomed us with a good dinner, which was followed by writing up our bird log.

Day 3

Saturday 2nd August

Ballestas Islands, Laguna del Muerto, Lagunillas area then back to Lima

After an early start we drove to El Chaco port, where we boarded the boat to the Ballestas (Crossbow) Islands. En route we stopped to observe the Candelabro, (the Chandelier) a mysterious figure that resembles the Nazca lines. We arrived in an area teeming with wildlife. It was an amazing sight – Humboldt Penguins, Southern Sea Lions, several species of seabirds, even dolphins. Returning inland we went to look for flamingos in the Laguna del Muerto reserve, but we were surprised to find only one.

Back in the Chaco area we enjoyed our lunch and headed back to the Lima area. We made a short stop at the Puerto Viejo marshland just to find a new bird, the White-cheeked Pintail. We checked in to our hotel in Lima, had dinner and, as always, worked on our bird log. We were all looking forward to our adventure in the rainforest the following day.

Day 4

Sunday 3rd August

Lima to Puerto Maldonado, Refugio Amazonas Lodge (ARA)

Early in the morning we left Lima for the city of Puerto Maldonado where our guide Ruben was waiting for us. We drove to the river port where we boarded our motorised canoe and Jon very soon spotted a Sunbittern. We saw Capped Heron, Greater Yellow-headed Vulture, Plumbeous Kite, as well as Blue-and-Yellow, Scarlet, and Red-and-Green Macaws, which are always colourful and spectacular.

We arrived at the ARA and, after settling into our rooms, met to have a refreshing beer, do the bird log and eat dinner before going to bed.

Day 5

Monday 4th August

Boat trip to Tambopata Research Center (TRC)

Early in the morning we visited the canopy tower. Here we were at eye level with some canopy dwellers such as macaws, parrots and parakeets which were flying nearby, and saw Black and White-faced Nunbirds, Gilded Barbet, Ivory-billed, Chestnut-eared and Curl-crested Aracaris, White-throated and Channel-billed Toucans among other birds. Back at the lodge we enjoyed a good breakfast and prepared for our boat ride to TRC.

It was pleasantly cool on the boat and we spotted Tayra on the river bank and Capybaras grazing near the waterline. Our boatman managed to get close enough to have good views of a Ladder-tailed Nightjar and Common Pauraque.

We went to the lodge where we were staying and as usual we met to complete our bird log before dinner and went to bed excited by the prospect of our visit to the clay lick the next morning.

Day 6

Tuesday 5th August

TRC full day

Our day started at 4.15am, which gave us time for a quick snack and some tea or coffee, and enabled us to be at the clay lick site on time. It was dark when we left in the boat and then, after a short walk, we sat and waited for the birds to arrive.

Our patience was rewarded with 14 species out of 16 that we could have seen here. Tambopata is one of the most diverse clay licks I have ever seen. We saw Blue-and-Yellow, Scarlet, Red-and-Green, Chestnut-fronted, and Red-bellied Macaws in the early morning. We also had great sightings of Orange-cheeked, White-bellied and Blue-headed Parrots as well as parakeets.

Back at the lodge we enjoyed a good breakfast and then divided into two groups: those with a particular interest in seeing more birds and those who went with Ruben on a different trail in search of other species. We saw some typical species of the understorey such as Bluish-slate Antshrike, Ornate and White-flanked Antwrens, White-browed, Warbling and Plumbeous Antbirds, which nicely complemented our experience the previous afternoon when we had great views of the Black-faced Antthrush walking around us in response to the playback!

We returned to the lodge for lunch and a short rest before joining the trail above the clay lick where we had great views of fly-by birds and the interesting landscape. We had excellent sightings of the White-throated Jacamar, which is particularly associated with this site; a delightful way to spend the afternoon. By this time we were close to the lodge and although it was getting dark we had a very clear view of a Giant Monkey Treefrog, a canopy dweller that comes to the ground after rain to mate.

...Another wonderful day with plenty of exciting species to add to our log.

Day 7

Wednesday 6th August

TRC, clay lick visit & boat ride back to ARA

A second splendid morning at the clay lick was enhanced by the visit of two pairs of Blue-headed Macaws; a species we had not seen yesterday as they were absent, hence we managed to see all the macaws we could expect to in this area.

Today we also saw a Rufous-fronted Antthrush, which is another speciality of the area. After a short visit to the fish pond we went back for breakfast and prepared for our boat trip back to ARA. Our river trip soon brought us to our new lodge and, after putting our gear into our rooms, we went to Condénado Oxbow Lake.

This was a peaceful way to spend the afternoon and brought us great views of Hoatzins, Black-capped Donacobius and a group of well-camouflaged Long-nosed Bats. We returned to the lodge for dinner and went to bed in preparation to our trip to the Andes.

Day 8

Thursday 7th August

Boat ride from ARA to Puerto Maldonado. Flight to Cusco

After an early breakfast we headed downriver from ARA. Our reluctance to leave the rainforest was tempered by the exciting prospect of the next stage of our adventure. We thanked Ruben for all his hard work and then caught our flight to Cusco, where conditions were a bit drier. The altitude was higher here, so we had to take it easy with regards to activity, while we got used to the increased elevation. After lunch we went on a city tour with Arturo, our guide for this section of the trip, before returning to the hotel for a rest.

Later, at dinner, Louise and Jon were adventurous enough to order guinea pig. Yum!

Day 9

Friday 8th August

Cusco full day; Huacarpay Lake, Pisac & Sacsayhuamán ruins

After breakfast we went to Huacarpay Lake, situated 30 minutes from Cusco. Some of the birds here were species we had seen around the Villa wetlands on our first day at the coast, however, we also observed other species such as Andean Teal, Andean Gull, Andean Lapwing, Speckled Teal, Yellow-winged Blackbirds and Ian spotted a strange, hairy mammal that he described as a giant Guinea Pig. He was correct – it was a *Cavia*, the ancestor of the domestic guinea pig. Well done Ian for spotting that, it's an elusive species.

The yellow flowers of *Nicotiana* attracted Bearded Mountaineers – we had excellent views of this bird and were even able to see the 'beard' from some directions.

We stopped at the Urpiwasi restaurant before continuing our trip to the complex of ruins of Pisac. Arturo gave us an excellent guided tour as he explained the significant features of this archaeological site. We returned to the coach and had a great picnic lunch on our way to Cusco. We ended our excursion with a stop at the Sacsayhuamán ruins on our way back to the hotel.

Day 10

Saturday 9th August

The Inca trail

Early in the morning Louise, Jon and Paul went to Manu with Jose Antonio Padilla as they were not coming with us to the Inca trail.

Arturo came to pick the rest of us up and we drove all the way to Ollantaytambo where we stopped for few moments before continuing to Km 88, where we started our trek to the campsite at Qoriwayrachina. This was a good way to start our hike as it was not too strenuous, but gave us enough exercise to loosen up and get ready for the following days.

Day 11

Sunday 10th August

Let's start the climb!

We were all awake when the chief porter went from tent to tent offering hot water and hot tea: a wonderful way to start the day! After a good breakfast we started our climb, crossed the bridge that officially starts the Inca trail and then passed the ruins of Llactapata, on a series of terraces that form part of the trail we followed on the way to our campsite at Wayllabamba, where we arrived for lunch.

After lunch, we went to look for Chestnut-breasted Mountain-finch, another endemic bird. With Ian and Nigel we spent quite a few hours scanning for this species, but none were spotted. We did see a Taczanowski's Tinamou – also an endemic and a lifer for Pepe. We had finally given up our search and decided to go back to the campsite when Ian suddenly said: 'Hey, look there – on the ground!' Our quest was rewarded as we saw a pair of Chestnut-breasted Mountain-finches that had probably been there all the time! The Andean Condor that Ian spotted when we were walking back was a welcome extra bonus.

We returned very happily to our campsite to complete our bird log, to enjoy dinner and to rest in preparation for our next day, when we would be climbing the infamous 'Dead Woman Pass'.

Day 12

Monday 11th August

'Dead Woman Pass' climb

It was another early start for us and we came out of our tents to see many Chestnut-breasted Mountain-finches around us! We also had great views of Creamy-crested Spinetails around our campsite. We started the climb slowly, walked through some Polylepis forest all the way to the Puna grasslands and saw the endemic White-tufted Sunbeam, another hummingbird and more Condors.

We stopped and enjoyed an invigorating lunch and some rest before we tackled the highest pass; once there, we took some pictures and had a further rest before heading down to our campsite in the Pacaymayo area where our tents were pitched and we had a good dinner waiting for us.

Day 13

Tuesday 12th August

Second & Third passes

Today we left after the crowds and had the trail almost to ourselves, which is always pleasant. After we had visited the ruins of Runcuracay we stopped to imitate the call of a Sedge Wren which responded very well to the playback. On our climb we saw very clearly a pair of Brown-backed Chat-Tyrants near the trail. Soon after that sighting we were at the other side of the pass on the eastern slope of the Andes – a different and richer environment.

Ian and I waited while some members of the group went to visit the ruins of Sayacmarca; when they returned we resumed our hike to our lunch stop and in the afternoon we walked to our last campsite, located in the Third pass, where we updated our bird list, had dinner and spent our last night in a tent.

Day 14

Wednesday 13th August

Machu Picchu

After breakfast we said goodbye to our amazing porters and started descending towards the cloud forest. We stopped at the ruins of Puyupatamarca and continued down all the way to the Wiñaywayna ruins, which we explored after lunch; this is my favourite ruins complex along the Inca trail. The name means 'forever young' and celebrates the predominant kind of orchid that grows there. Here an Inca Wren responded immediately when I played a recording of its call.

We continued our walk to the Intipunku, or Sun Gate, where we enjoyed taking photographs of the wonderful view. We then headed down to meet Louise, Paul and Jon, and then Arturo gave us a guided tour of the citadel of Machu Picchu.

That night we enjoyed the luxury of our excellent hotel with its comfortable beds and hot showers. As usual we met to complete our day's bird log before dinner at the Inkaterra cafe.

Day 15

Thursday 14th August

El Pueblo Hotel, Aguas Calientes & train back to Cusco

I got up early to accompany Jon and Nigel for a walk to the Mandor valley area before breakfast. Later, we walked and birded along the train tracks and saw a pair of Silver-backed Tanager. Near the old train station a White-eared Solitaire responded very well to the recorded-call playback and we were able to enjoy good views of it.

Back at the hotel we rejoined the rest of the group and did some birding in the wonderful gardens of the Pueblo Hotel. The hummingbird feeders were amazing and included the Long-tailed Silph, Chestnut-breasted Coronet, Collared Inca, Booted Racquet-tail, White-bellied Woodstar and Sparkling Violetear.

After a pleasant lunch at the hotel restaurant we headed to the Poroy train station to catch our train back to Cusco. In the station our transfer was waiting to take us to Cusco, where we checked in to our hotel, wrote up our bird log, and had dinner.

Day 16

Friday 15th August

Cusco back to Lima and city tour

From Cusco we flew back to Lima where we said goodbye to Jon and Paul, who were off to bird the Lomas de Lachay before catching their flights back home later that day.

At the airport our excellent guide, Jenny, was waiting to take us to visit Lima's main square, the cathedral and the catacombs.

We went on to our hotel in Miraflores for lunch and a rest before visiting the Archaeology and History Museum on our way to the airport, where we finally said goodbye with mutual best wishes.
