Day 1

Wednesday 13th June

This evening you all hit Lima and slumbered in Miraflores, a short hop and skip from the Pacific.

Day 2

Thursday 14th June

This morning we drifted to the Pantanos de Villa reserve on the outskirts of Lima. At our first stop, among the great rush-beds peopled with Wren-like Rushbirds and Many-coloured Rush-Tyrants, we watched Great Grebes, Cinnamon Teal, (Andean) Ruddy Ducks and a splendid selection of Herons: Little Blue, Striated, Yellow- and Black-crowned Night-Herons, three Egrets and a thoroughly obliging Least Bittern.

At the other extreme of the reserve, by the sea, a weird uber-flock of birds was frequenting the beach and a brackish bay: hundreds of Black Skimmers, Peruvian Pelicans, American Oystercatchers and Grey-headed Gulls were punctuated by pinkish Franklin's Gulls in breeding plumage, a very lost Roseate Spoonbill (pinker still) and, on the power-lines above us, Vermillion Flycatchers (way beyond pink).

Out to sea were hundreds of Peruvian Boobies and Guanay Cormorants. Keeping our minds on seabirds, next we drove to the little fishing town of Pucusana where a friendly fisherman, Javier, took us around the cliffs in his happy blue boat. Thousands of Inca Terns, Peruvian Boobies and equally Peruvian Pelicans were on the rock-face. Southern Sea-Lions dozed on ledges and outcrops, Humboldt Penguins huddled in a cleft in the cliff and a single Blue-footed Booby stretched its long wings over the bay.

At Puerto Viejo streaky Grassland Yellow-Finches fidgeted in the rushes and Peruvian Meadowlarks filled the plain with their buzzy songs. Nearby Peruvian Thick-knees sulked en masse in an abandoned field by the road.

Day 3

Friday 15th June

Early this morning the birdiest amongst us left our beautiful beach hotel in the dark and followed a Chilean Flamingo through the coastal mist, thereby inadvertently walking away from the large flock of flamingos in the opposite direction. You win some...

The rest of the day was spent around Ica, in search of the special birds of Peru's coastal desert and oases. It took us a while to get going, though there were lots of Saffron Yellow-finches and *Amazilia* Hummingbirds, and we were pleased to see one of the local feral populations of Pacific Parrotlets. At Huacachina, however, by the edge of the lake, was a dazzling male Peruvian Sheartail and we were appropriately delighted.

In the afternoon we explored the spectacular Paracas reserve, its landforms and its birds, including tiny, delightful Peruvian Terns.

Day 4

Saturday 16th June

What a morning this was! Bright and early we were on the quay, catching our boat for the Ballestas Islands. Past the unexplained Candelabra geoglyph, etched into a coastal desert headland, and on to the remarkable, bird-laden islands. On our way out we scanned the sea for Diving-Petrels but found Sooty Shearwaters and beautiful Ringed Storm-Petrels.

The islands are mind-turning in their majesty. Every ledge, every crack, every nook is taken. Humboldt Penguins and Inca Terns line the lowest reaches, above them on the slopes are uncountable thousands of Peruvian Boobies, and on the islands' flat tops are unimaginable hordes of Guanay Cormorants. Here and there, for theatrical effect, are Red-legged Cormorants and Surf Cinclodes, while beneath the water line, visible when the swell falls, are millions of mussels and their predators: shocking orange starfish and dusky sunstars. Limpets are common too, and giant chitons, against a background of a billion barnacles.

Oh and did I mention the Southern Sea-Lions?

Far too soon we turned for shore but were thrilled to see a tiny black and white seabird whizz past – our Peruvian Diving-Petrel.

Before lunch we visited the bay of Lagunillas where a Royal Tern fished, a Wandering Tattler flew across the flat blue sea, a Snowy Plover stood sentinel on a platform of rock and a Surfbird picked through the wave-thrashed seaweed with a posse of Ruddy Turnstones.

In the afternoon we returned to Lima, in readiness for our journey to Amazonia the following day.

Day 5

Sunday 17th June

After a couple of mountain-mist-engendered false starts we flew this morning to Puerto Maldonado to catch our boat for Tambopata. Here we were met by our excellent guide Fernando who led us to a Great Potoo roosting in the airport car park. Here too were Ruddy Ground-Doves and Great Kiskadees. We drove a short distance out of town, to fill the time until another group arrived, and were rewarded with several scrub and wetland birds we didn't otherwise see: Limpkin, Chestnut-bellied Seedeater, Yellow-browed Sparrow and Sapphire-spangled Emerald. Also here and around a big pond nearby were Social Flycatchers, Grey Saltators, Yellow-tufted Woodpeckers and an Amazon Kingfisher.

Along the river we sped, eating lunch from banana leaf plates, looking up, down, left and right at the splendid selection of common Amazon critters to be seen. Flocks of Chestnut-fronted Macaws were overhead, Collared Plovers were on a sandbank, Capped Herons crouched under overhanging trees, a Tayra bounced along the bank, high above were Greater Yellow-headed and King Vultures, and White-collared Swifts strafed the river.

At Posada Amazonas birds were everywhere. As soon as we'd checked into our rooms we were watching White-browed Purpletufts in Cecropia trees by the dining room. As dusk fell they were joined by Spix's Guans and Speckled Chachalacas. How wonderful to be in Amazonia!

Day 6

Monday 18th June

Early this morning we took to the water on a raft, to visit a serene oxbow lake. Hoatzins wheezed from the trees, Lesser Kiskadees perched on emergent twigs and in a floating mat of vegetation we were delighted to see a tiny Grey-breasted Crake. Meanwhile clumsy Pale-vented Pigeons clung to lake-side trees, Blue-headed Parrots flapped (desperately, remember?) overhead and Giant Otters – Giant Otters! – played in the distant shallows.

In the afternoon we journeyed further upriver, into the forest, to Tambopata Research Centre. The further we went the more exciting the wildlife-watching became; White-winged and White-banded Swallows skimmed the water's surface, Pied Lawplings patrolled the beaches, Cocoli Herons and splendid Horned Screamers (S. Creamer, get it?) stood on rocky outcrops, and overhead we started to see large macaws: Scarlets and Blue-and-Yellows. The mammals were good too: on a branch overhanging the river a Southern Tamandua made an appearance, Capybaras were on the beaches and licking clay from a steep bank was an absurdly tame family of Red Howler Monkeys.

Day 7

Tuesday 19th June

Before dawn we were in the forest (Amazonian Pygmy-Owl singing here), on the river, on a river island, and settled into pole-position seats for watching the spectacle of the colpa. In the end the spectacle was a little less spectacular than it might have been as the parrots, having gathered in huge, noisy numbers were scared off by a danger which we never saw. Nonetheless there were plenty of parrots to see: at the big end lots of Blue-and-Yellow and a few Scarlet Macaws, at the little end White-bellied Parrots (wonderful!) and Blue-headed Parrots, and in the middle countless Mealies, Yellow-crowned, screeching Red-bellied Macaws and scraping Chestnut-fronted. At first light a Pauraque floated by, soon afterwards a Roadside Hawk dropped in for a visit (not the cause of the parrots' disquiet), and a Black-throated Antbird. However, to be wholly honest, we were disappointed not to see the parrots come down to the lick.

Post-parrots we walked into forest along the river where we saw Brown Titi monkeys and heard their delightfully dippy songs. Here too were Rufous-crested Coquette, Golden-tailed Sapphire, White-throated Jacamar, Peruvian Spider Monkey and Broad-billed Motmot. During lunch the local White-lipped Peccaries strolled through the lodge. In the afternoon we visited the seasonally flooded forest on the same river island as the parrot watchpoint and were rewarded with encounters with White-lined and Black-throated Antbirds, Great Antshrike, a rare Rufous-fronted Anthrush and a pair of exquisite Scarlet-hooded Barbets.

Day 8

Wednesday 20th June

Having felt frustrated yesterday that the parrots didn't come down to the lick, we were determined to see them do so this morning. So once again before dawn we were crouching on a river island, the forest awaking around us, waiting for the parrots to come. Come they did, though for a long, long while it seemed as though they would once more never come down to the lick. But at last a Red-bellied Macaw gave it a try, then more, then a Blue-headed Parrot or two. What followed was a modest lick, but a lick all the same and we were delighted to see so many exquisite birds, including the dazzling Orange-cheeked Parrots which hadn't come yesterday. On our return from the parrots we were lucky to encounter a singing Ringed Antpipit and, as we watched it, a single Saddleback Tamarin.

After this morning's parrot-fest we headed into very muddy terra firme forest where Fernando shared with us some splendid birds including Banded Antbird (what a beauty!), Purple-throated Fruitcrow and Cinereous Mourner.

Later we moved downriver to Refugio Amazonas where, even as we checked in, a Needle-billed Hermit buzzed around Heliconia flowers by the dining room. In the afternoon we explored the forest here and ended up in the splendid canopy tower: Paradise, Opal-crowned, Green-and-Gold and Masked Tanagers, Green and Purple Honeycreepers, White-fronted Nunbird and the spectacular Golden-collared Toucanet. Walking back in the dusk we met a pair of Curl-crested Aracaris, a fine end to a very birdy day.

Day 9

Thursday 21st June

This morning's aim was to reach Cusco - so, muddy and sweaty but delighted to have seen so much spectacular wildlife, we said good-bye to our brilliant friend Fernando and left Amazonia.

We were met in Cusco by a new friend, Juan, who would turn out to be equally delightful and talented. In the afternoon we toured the Inca city with him, admiring the Korikancha and the Plaza de Armas, where a festival was taking place for the winter solstice and the city's feast day. Just Chiguanco Thrush and a Bar-winged Cinclodes (bizarrely in the Plaza de Armas) were added to our list this afternoon.

Day 10

Friday 22nd June

How different the climate of Cusco feels after Amazonia – crisp, dry and pleasantly warm – and how different the birds here too.. This morning we travelled to the famous lakes at Huacarpay. Puna and Speckled Teal rubbed shoulders (scapulas?) with Yellow-billed Pintail, White-tufted Grebes and several Plumbeous Rails. A Cinereous Harrier drifted by and distantly our first Mountain Caracara was seen as we watched a mixed flock of Band-tailed Seedeaters, Mourning Sierra-Finches and Ash-breasted Sierra-Finches.

Further along the road Juan's favourite patch of yellow Nicotiana flowers revealed, after much searching, a splendid, endemic Bearded Moutaineer while in the rocky hills were Rusty-fronted Canasteros and Andean Flickers.

In the afternoon, after a wonderful picnic lunch in the company of Greenish Yellow-finches, Black-throated Flowerpiercers, Black-backed Grosbeaks and Golden-billed Saltators, we visited two of the most celebrated Inca sites: Pisac and Sacsayhuaman. At the first, a magnificent set of terraces built into a steep Andean slope, we saw a Yellow-billed Tit-Tyrant and at the second, the puma's teeth of the historic city of Cusco, we watched the preparations for the upcoming winter solstice.

Day 11

Saturday 23rd June

Our party split this morning - Andrew, Tess and John heading off with José Antonio Padilla for their adventures along the Manu Road (and what adventures they would turn out to be), while Sue and Mike came with Juan and me to the start of the Inca Trail.

We stopped on the way at a lake in the mist where Silvery and White-tufted Grebes fished and both sizes of Yellowlegs picked through the shallows. En route we then visited the Hotel Pakaritampu in Ollantaytambo (how's that for an Inca mouthful of a sentence) where Juan regularly sees hummingbirds. He was quite right as here we saw another Bearded Mountaineer and a White-bellied Hummer, plus Rusty Flowerpiercers and a flock of Hooded Siskins.

In the midday sunshine we set off on a little walk. Torrent Ducks splashed and dived in the river beneath us, Black Phoebes sallied from the rocks, White-capped Dippers crouched at the water's edge and overhead were sharp-winged Andean Swifts. This evening we camped at Km 82.

Day 12

Sunday 24th June

We wandered to Inca terraces along the river this morning before breakfast, seeing the same American Kestrel and Phoebes we'd seen the evening before. With breakfast inside us (one of many delicious, flawlessly-prepared meals we shared on the Inca Trail) and our passports and tickets checked by the park office we set off for our first climb.

We also started seeing new birds. A White-winged Cinclodes was at the river's edge and lovely Rust-and-Yellow Tanagers were in the bushes along the trail. As we rose in altitude, through flower-rich villages, we encountered Giant Hummingbirds, a Collared Inca, our first Andean Condor (always a heart-stopping moment) and exquisite wiñaywayna orchids.

In the afternoon the beautiful endemic Chestnut-breasted Mountain-Finch was seen before the heavens opened and we retreated in timely fashion to our tents.

Day 13

Monday 25th June

Today's theme was uphill but what an uphill it was! We climbed through attractive villages, through beautiful open mountain-sides and finally up steep rocky slopes, all along the magnificently-engineered Inca Trail and all in the company of beautiful Andean birds. Who could ask for more?

As we set off in the early morning there were Mountain Caracaras playing about the high ridges and Rufous-collared Sparrows hopping along the paths. Another passport checkpoint was alive with Tyrian Metaltails and soon we were in the thick of the birds. Creamy-crested Spinetails dangled over the path, a Sword-billed Hummingbird visited a thorn-apple tree in a flowery garden, Rufous-breasted Chat-Tyrants sat atop the bushes and Andean Parakeets whirred over the hillsides.

Higher up, we met many fine humming birds: both Shining and White-tufted Sunbeams, Great Sapphirewing, Violet-throated Starfrontlet and the delightful little Purple-backed Thornbill. Passerines here included White-throated Tyrannulet, Chestnut-bellied Mountain-Tanager (superb!), Crowned Chat-Tyrant, Cusco Brush-Finch and a Vilcabamba Tapaculo which hopped across the path at our feet.

With drizzle gathering around us we took on the biggest climb of the trail, up to the highest pass: Warmi Wañusca. As we crossed the pass the heavens opened and, despite brief and very wet appearances by a Scaled Metaltail and a Greenish Puffleg, we put our heads down and ploughed through the downpour to our camp and the steaming cups of tea which awaited us there.

Day 14

Tuesday 26th June

Around our beautiful, misty camp as we woke up were Citrine Warblers, Smoky Bush-Tyrants, Moustached Flowerpiercers and a Dusky-capped Flycatcher. What a splendid start to the day! Soon it got more splendid yet. We had two passes to cross today, less lofty than yesterday's but still a challenge at high altitude.

Nonetheless we had plenty of beautiful birds to cheer us on our way. Here were Sapphire-vented Pufflegs, Pearled Treerunners and a family of extremely friendly Sedge Wrens. On a grassy slope was our only Andean White-tailed Deer and in elfin forest we saw our first Three-striped Hemispingus and spectacular Golden-collared Tanagers of the Trail.

In the afternoon, a park ranger friend of Juan's, hearing of our special interest in nature, was kind enough to share with us some of the many species of orchid he's identified here and to show us some rarely visited Inca ruins of great beauty.

Day 15

Wednesday 27th June

We woke up in a fine mood today, ready to head downhill to Machu Picchu. The forests of the last day of trekking are beautiful and the ruins are superb.

Having left our camp and the mountaintop ruins of Puyupatamarca we entered the moss-clad forest and were immediately surrounded by birds: Unstreaked Tit-Tyrant, Pearled Treerunner, Three-striped Hemispingus, Yellow-billed Cacique, Golden-collared Tanager, Amethyst-throated Sunangel and Plushcap. A little lower, as the temperature rose, the composition of the flocks changed. Here were White-banded Tyrannulets, Streak-necked Flycatchers, Azara's Spinetails, Blue-backed Conebills, Blue-capped Tanagers, Streaked Tuftedcheeks and astonishing Yellow-scarfed Tanagers.

Further down still, as the forest became subtropical, we saw a Long-tailed Sylph (over lunch at the Wiñaywayna ruins), a Speckled Hummingbird, Sclater's Tyrannulets, Cinnamon Flycatchers and a magnificent singing male Golden-headed Quetzal.

Around lunchtime, reaching Intipunku, we saw for the first time the splendid ruins of Machu Picchu. Shortly thereafter, reunited with our friends who were buzzing with tales of the wonderful birds they'd seen in Manu, we visited this peerless World Heritage Site expertly guided by Juan who still buzzed with energy after his five day trek.

Not only were we wowed by the ruins of Machu Picchu; we were wowed too by the wildlife to be seen here. There were Northern Viscachas sunbathing on the rocks and high in the sky above were White-tipped Swifts. A Condor floated over, a Green-and-White Hummingbird sang and – to add a splash of excitement – an Orange-breasted Falcon crashed by low over our heads.

Day 16

Thursday 28th June

This morning we birded in the grounds of our fine hotel in Aguas Calientes and were delighted by the quality of birds to be found here. Dawn saw us at the feeders, surrounded by Dusky-Green Oropendolas. As the light built, so did the flocks of Tanagers: Silver-backed, Blue-necked, Saffron-crowned, Golden-naped, Hepatic, Blue-Grey and Silver-beaked. Speckle-faced Parrots dropped in to the Inga trees to feed and nearby feeders buzzed with Chestnut-breasted Coronets.

Word came from Juan that he had found a male Andean Cock-of-the-Rock on one of the trails; we followed and, after a brief search, we saw this most spectacular bird well. The die-hard birders then spent the rest of our humid-forest time exploring the lodge's beautiful trails. Here we saw a Streaked Xenops, a Golden-Olive Woodpecker, Capped Conebills, Common Tody-Flycatchers, Beryl-spangled Tanagers, an Ocellated Piculet, a Variable Antshrike and a Russet-crowned Warbler.

And in the afternoon we travelled back to Cusco, on the train past rivers busy with Torrent Ducks, and in our mini-bus through dry Andean fields where Mountain Caracaras flew and Andean Lapwings trotted.

Day 17

Friday 29th June

This morning saw us bid farewell to our friends Andrew and Juan and fly to Lima. Here we visited the Archaeological Museum and many of the old buildings in the city's historic centre. In the evening we left for Lima airport where the tour came to its close.

Day 18

Saturday 30th June

Arrive back in Europe
