

Peru – Macaws and Machu Picchu

Naturetrek Tour Report

18 October - 4 November 2010

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Day 1

Monday 18th October

We arrived in Lima on schedule and transferred to our comfortable hotel in the fashionable suburb of Miraflores. We went for a little walk to the sea by Larcomar where we got to see Bottled-nosed Dolphin and some gulls.

Day 2

Tuesday 19th October

After a substantial breakfast we drove to the Pantanos de Villa marshland reserve on the southern limits of the sprawling Lima. As we arrived we could see a wide range of birds like a Great, Pied-billed and Giant Grebes, Little Blue and Striated Herons, Cinnamon Teal, Yellow-headed Blackbird, Black-necked Stilt, Groove-billed Ani, Blue-and-white Swallow, Cinereous Harrier, and Long-tailed Mockingbird – a pretty good start!

Then we drove south along the coast to the small fishing village of Pucusana. Here we took a short boat ride around the harbour and enjoyed excellent views of hundreds of Kelp Gull, Inca Terns and Peruvian Pelicans, two Blackish Oystercatchers, Red-legged Cormorant and a couple of Surf Cinclodes as well as several impressive South American Sea Lions. A delicious fresh fish lunch in a harbour-side restaurant was enjoyed.

During the afternoon we continued south along the desert coast on the Pan-American Highway, passing through several little towns and much of the landscape had a remarkable range of crops that are grown in the oasis valleys created by the river systems. A brief stop along the high way to catch up with some species that like the marshes added White-cheeked Pintail, Andean Duck, and a few Chilean Flamingos which add extra colour to the landscape, whilst we searched for the, elusive this time, Peruvian Thick-knees. We continued to Paracas where we arrived in time for sunset and settled in for a two-night stay.

Day 3

Wednesday 20th October

A short walk along the shore before breakfast proved to be very productive with birds including Black Skimmers skimming, a few dainty Peruvian Terns fishing along the strand line, and Snow Plover, and Sanderling, plus a great view of Chilean Flamingos feeding – a great start to the day! With breakfast completed we set off to the Paracas National Reserve and not long after we left the hotel we were surprised to find Peruvian Thick Knee and also Coast Miner, and Vermilion Flycatchers. At our first stop at the local museum view point for Chilean Flamingos feeding, we saw over 400! We also saw several Black Skimmers, colonies of Gray-headed Gulls, Gray Gull, and American Oystercatcher running from of us.

Later, by a cathedral, we stopped to admire the skill of Peruvian Boobies diving into water after a school of fishes and saw several Peruvian Terns returning to their roosting places plus various sea birds preening on the rock formations carved out by the sea. The weather was perfect – a sunny day with a good temperature, so we visited the Lagunillas, and saw Least Sandpiper, Pectoral Sandpiper, Semipalmated Plover, and Royal and Elegant Terns, whilst Turkey and Black Vultures were having a feast on the bodies of some Sea Lions. Later in the morning we started heading to Ica and stopping at the small airport and saw Burrowing Owls, Short-tailed Field Tyrant and Collared Warbling-finch and Purple-collared Woodstar among other birds.

Lunch was enjoyed at the Oasis Huacachina in the middle of sand dunes. After a delicious lunch we explored looking for birds like Peruvian Sheartail. We then transferred to the nearby Las Dunas Hotel where the lush grounds promised birds while some of us went to the Ica Museum. Those at the hotel were not to be disappointed finding Purple-collared Woodstar, Pied-crested Tit Tyrant and Peruvian Sheartail – a good find indeed! Later we enjoyed the view of the sunset, thus ending the day.

Day 4

Thursday 21st October

After an early breakfast we drove the short distance to the sea port the Chaco, in Paracas town, and boarded the speedboat for our trip out to the Ballestas Islands. In no time we were roaring out across the bay and after a brief pause to admire the enigmatic Candelabra figure etched on a hillside above the shore, we continued fast out to sea towards the distant Ballestas, just visible in the garua murk. A couple Sooty Shearwaters flying across interrupted the journey before we arrived at the islands and were met by one of the world's great avian spectacles. As we cruised slowly around the cliffs and arches we were amazed at the sheer number of birds. Guanay Cormorants and Peruvian Boobies were present in their tens of thousands and in amongst them were smaller numbers of Peruvian Pelicans, Neotropic Cormorants and Inca Terns. Here and there we found thousand or islands cover by colourful Red-legged Cormorants ready to nest and groups of Humboldt Penguins, some surprisingly high up on the cliff faces. Southern Sea Lions were loafing around on the rocks adding life to the islands.

Back at Paracas we transferred to our vehicle again and headed to a nearby restaurant for an early lunch prepared with freshest of the fish by local expert hands. After that we caught up with the highway along the coast to Lima to our final destination in Miraflores to get ready for the rainforest section of the tour.

Day 5

Friday 22nd October

After breakfast we drove to the airport and soon we were flying from the coast over the Andes - the plane climbed through the mist, up and over the snow-capped Andes and down into the green endlessness of the rainforest beyond. We arrived at Puerto Maldonado in the late morning and the birding began as our guide took us to see a Great Potoo on a brazil nut tree – it was a great surprise and a great bird! We also saw Saffron Finch before we left for the airport. From the airport we went to the little port of Infierno. A good looking Laughing Falcon was roosting on the roadside tree. We also saw a Roadside Hawk.

At Infierno we packed up things and transferred to a boat and set off up the Tambopata River to the Posada Amazonas about an hour and a half upstream. It was relaxing to be out on the river as the river vegetation changed radically as we got far from civilization.

We spotted a couple of Horned Screamers, Red and Green Macaws, and common riverside birds that included Greater Yellow-headed Vulture, Russet-backed and Amazonian and Crested Oropendolas, Yellow-rumped Cacique, and White-winged and White-banded Swallows among others! We arrived at the posada in the middle of the afternoon and after the lodge manager instructions we settled into our comfortable rooms and then decided to explore one of the forest trails which was very productive - we encountered Brown Capuchin Monkey, Common Squirrel Monkey as well as Ivory-billed Aracari, Broad-billed Motmot, Red-stained Woodpecker, Pale-winged Trumpeter, and White-tailed Trogon.

Day 6

Saturday 23rd October

In the morning after breakfast we set off very early to the tower where the birding was great, we got excellent views of Red and Green, Blue and Yellow and Scarlet - all of the large Macaws, as well as Slate-coloured Hawk, White-throated Toucan, Curl-crested Aracari, Gilded Barbet, and Olive Oropendola perched and nesting on a nearby canopy tree. Back at the lodge were Pavonine Quetzal, and a mix feeding flock of under-storey birds, as well as the Bluish-slate Antshrike!

We got ready to head up the River Tambopata, and on the journey were several individuals of Chestnut-fronted Macaws and Red-bellied Macaws, while White-winged and White-banded Swallows hawked low over the water. On the river rapids appeared a good numbers of waders - we saw Cooi and Capped Herons, Anhinga, and some more up the river like King Vultures, Orinoco Goose, Great Black Hawk, Plumbeous Kite, Black Caracara, Pied Lapwing, Yellow-billed Tern, Ringed and Amazon Kingfishers, and Violaceous Jay. Capybaras made appearances on the river bank and as we were getting closer to the Tambopata Research Centre (TRC) the numbers of macaws and parrots were increasing. By the late afternoon, we had made our arrival at the comfortable rooms and settled in for our two-night stay.

Day 7

Sunday 24th October

We had a pre-dawn start to the Macaw Clay Lick called Collpa by locals. For this nature attraction we had to be in place way before day break and when you arrive there are already hundred of parrots and macaws screaming and perching on the trees! In the next two hours we watched these charismatic and highly social birds preening, chatting, fixing up feathers, coming for the daily ritual to ingest small portions of clay on the clay bank. We had superb views of Blue-and-yellow, and Scarlet Macaws. In addition there were over 100 smaller Chestnut-fronted and Red-bellied Macaws, Blue-headed Parrots flying in flocks, and good numbers of Yellow-crowned and Mealy Amazons. As well as this we had the elusive and sometimes conspicuous Orange-cheeked and White-bellied Parrots, and good size flocks of Dusky-headed and White-eyed Parakeets as late arrivals. Some other bird sightings on the clay lick included Blue-throated Piping Guan, Speckled Chachalaca, Purplish and Violaceous Jays, Little Ground-tyrant, Green Kingfisher and Razor-billed Curassow (massive birds). Then it was time to come back for a delicious breakfast.

After breakfast we went to the forest trails and we encountered a most interesting opportunistic relationship between birds and army ants so the ant's followers; Black-spotted Bare-eye, and White-throated Antbirds, were present. Additionally we saw Swainson's, Hauxwell's Lawrence's Thrushes, Ringed Antpiper, Band-tailed, Dwarf Tyrant-manakin, Agami Heron, and Lemon-throated Barbet amongst other great birds. Mammals included Red Howlers. It was a pretty good morning!

In the afternoon we explored a trail that goes through an area of bamboo forest where we saw White-necked Thrush, Red-necked Woodpecker, Banded Antbird, Bamboo Antshrike and amazing views of a Crested Owl perching on a branch using the scope. We also encounter a family of Night Monkeys finding a refuge in the bamboo. We finished the loop trail at sunset time.

Day 8

Monday 25th October

We had another pre-dawn departure from the lodge for our second time at the Macaw Clay Lick or Collpa and saw Scarlet Macaw, Blue and Yellow Macaw, and Red-and-green Macaw perching on the trees. Macaws, Parrots and Parakeets did a great show in big numbers while part of the group did well finding the Scarlet-hooded Barbet, Rufous-capped Nunlet, Pale-legged Hornero, Bluish-fronted Jacamar, Swallow-winged Puffbirds, Short-crested Flycatcher and Rusty-fronted Tody-flycatcher. We also found a troop of Black Spider Monkeys.

After breakfast back at the lodge we organised our things for way back down to Refugio by boat. The set of birds seen on the return journey included Capped Heron, Great Egret, Roadside Hawk, Bat Falcon, Yellow-billed Tern, Green Kingfisher, Ringed Kingfisher and Pied Lapwing. We passed a river section and a Clay lick Collpa called Chunchu - there were up to 50 Red-and-green Macaws, Scarlet Macaw, and Blue and Yellow gathering already and eating clay. Some river birds such as Sand-coloured Nighthawks were resting on the trees, as Swallow-tailed Kites were soaring up one side of the river. Finally just before we arrived at the Refugio Amazonas in time to visit the oxbow lake Condenado, on the trail we encountered a group of Saddle-backed Tamarins and Brown Cappuchin Monkeys. Once at the lake we saw the prehistoric looking Hoatzin, as well as Black-capped Donacobious, and Striated Heron. On the way back were Bluish-fronted Jacamar, Olive-backed Foliage Gleaner, Black-tailed Trogon, Black-fronted Nunbirds, and Purple-throated Fruitcrows. It was a good way to end the day!

Day 9

Tuesday 26th October

After breakfast we left the Refugio and boarded our boat for the last time. This is a relatively short ride in sunshine and we spotted a couple of King Vultures soaring up, Roadside Hawks, Blue and Yellow, Chestnut-fronted Macaws, Collared Plover, and Giant Cowbirds. In the little river dock Infierno we could see Boat-billed, and Social Flycatchers. We boarded the bus from which we saw Smooth-billed Ani, and Turkey Vultures as we headed to the city of Pto Maldonado and back to civilization.

Arriving in Cusco we could feel the lack of oxygen and how much drier this air was! At the airport we were transferred to the hotel and then it was time to go for a delicious traditional lunch in a restaurant in the centre of town. In the late afternoon we did a tour of some of the major sights of this remarkable and beautiful city of Cusco and then we finished the day with dinner in Pucara Restaurant near the Plaza de Armas.

Day 10

Wednesday 27th October

After breakfast we set off to the picturesque Huacarpay Lake, an hour or so to the south of Cusco Valley. This is a protected wetland, with marshy grassland surrounded by scrub and mountainsides. Huacarpay is one the nearest lagoons and just a wonderful place to explore in a morning. We saw White-tufted Grebe, Speckled, Puna and Cinnamon Teals, Yellow-billed Pintail, Andean Coot and Greater Yellowlegs.

Plumbeous Rails and Wren-like Rushbirds, and Many-coloured Rush-tyrants were coming in and out from the reeds, with Puna Ibis feeding in the shallow part of the lake. Other birds included Black-billed Bush-tyrant, White-browed Chat-Tyrant, Rufous-naped Ground Tyrant, Chiguanco Thrush, Ashy-breasted Sierra Finch, Yellow-winged Blackbird and Rusty-fronted Canastero. We drove around the lake visiting the yellow Nicotiana flowers and we encountered a pair of Mountaineer Hummingbird, Giant Hummingbird and Green-tailed Trainbearer.

From Huacarpay we headed down to the Sacred Valley for a picnic lunch near the ruins of Pisac - along the river were at least a dozen Andean Gulls, and Brown-bellied Swallows. We had a tour of the ruins to appreciate the magnitude of this Inca construction - we marvelled both at the quality of the Inca stonework and the dramatic setting in the terraces over the mountain side. Birding along the way was good, with Black-tailed Trainbearer, Black-throated Flowerpiercer, and Peruvian Sierra Finch. At the end of the afternoon we returned to Cusco, stopping in Tambomachay in a little lagoon for Andean Goose, and finished the day at the massive ruined fortress of Sacsaywaman.

Day 11

Thursday 28th October

This was another early start - we left Cusco shortly after dawn and began the drive across the east slope of the Andes to the Manu cloudforest valley. Our first stop was in a patch of Polylepis forests for Tit-like Dacnis, Chestnut-breasted Mountain Finch, Golden-billed Saltator, Yellow-billed Tit-tyrant and Tyrian Metaltail coming out from their nest burrows – we had enjoyable views of these wonderful birds. We continued to the highest part of Pisac 4,200 metres until we were on high puna grassland, deserted and dry with occasional shepherds and herds of llamas and sheep. Here we saw Streak-throated Canastero, Andean Lapwing, Mountain Caracara, Thick-billed Siskin, Bright-rumped Siskin, Ash-breasted Sierra-finch and Rufous-webbed Ground-tyrant.

Late in the morning we passed the medium sized town of Paucartambo in an inter-Andean valley and climbed for a picnic lunch near to agricultural plots, surrounding by patches of primary forest like alder trees which were good for Violet-throated Starfrontlet, Tufted Tit-Tyrant, and Rufous-breasted Chat-Tyrant. We continued to the Acjanaco Pass at 3,560 metres. This is the gateway to Manu's elfin forest and cloud forest, we felt the high humidity as a form of a mist and clouds were coming from down the valley, with nature creating a spectacular view. We finished the afternoon by driving along roads through this most pristine forested mountain with new birds including Shining Sunbeam, Sierran Elaenia, Great Thrush and Masked and Moustached Flowerpiercer, Barred Fruiteater and Broad winged Hawk and Andean Guans. Finally we arrived at Cock of the Rock Lodge.

Day 12

Friday 29th October

We had a predawn start with a first visit to the Cock of the Rock Lek as the birds were gathering for their daily display for female attraction. We had spectacular views of Cock-of-the-Rocks (the Peruvian national bird) and once the ritual was over we birded down the road in this tropical cloud forest. Then we continued after breakfast with a good diversity of Hummingbirds including Booted Racket-tail, Wire-crested Thorntail and Violet-fronted Brilliant visiting the feeders in the lodges garden. We drove along the road up and down the valley and found a new set of birds in beautiful scenery including Versicolored Barbet, Bluish-fronted Jacamar, Golden-olive Woodpecker, Green Jay, White-throated Hawk, and female Lyre-tailed Nightjar roosting on the roof.

These were some of the highlights but other extraordinary birds included Highland Motmots, and an exciting range of passerines included Yungas Manakin, Golden-crowned and Lemon-browed Flycatchers, Black-eared Hemispingus, Orange-eared Tanager Three-striped Warbler, Dusky-green Oropendola and Buff throated Saltator, as well as Olivaceous Siskin - what a day of birding!. Very late in the afternoon at the usual spot for Lyre-tailed Nightjar a beautiful male showed up, plus a Rufescent Screech Owl. We covered an elevation from 1400 to 2000 metres above sea level. Our mammal finds were Brown Cappuchin Monkey, Brown Agouties and Bolivian Squirrel.

Day 13

Saturday 30th October

This morning a Sparkling Violet-ear, Spectacled Hummingbird, the small Wire-crested Thorntail, and Many-spotted Hummingbird were visiting the flowering verbena bushes in the garden. We dropped in elevation towards the town of Pilcopata in this Kosñipata valley. Our idea was to make a number of stops in the hope of reaching different sceneries as we descended and as the flora and fauna changed. At one stop we found Striped-chested Antwren, Chestnut-backed Antshrike, a colony of Crested Oropendola, Thush-like Wren (great view of one pair), and going down we stopped for one pair of Swallow Tanager, Plumbeous Kite, and a male Long-tailed Tyrant perched at the top of a tree - what elegant birds they are! The Swallow-tailed Kites seemed to mark the starting point of the rainforest. At the first village Chontachaca many of coca fields and jungle crops are good birding places of secondary growth forest and bamboo and here we spotted Magpie Tanager, Paradise, Green and gold Tanager, Blue Danis, and Yellow-tufted Woodpecker and while we were lunching we saw the Dot-winged Antwren, Plain Winged Antshrike and Black-throated Antbird in the bamboo, flying over one pair of Blue-headed Macaws which is not very common. In the flattest part of the valley were Black Caracaras, Turkey Vultures Woodpecker, Roadside Hawk, Black-billed Thrush, Chestnut-bellied Seed-Finch and Blue and black Grassquit We had on the way back a rain storm in the mid-afternoon so this was time to rest and pack up the things for the next journey to Cusco - we had free the rest of the day to enjoy the rain!

Day 14

Sunday 31st October

Leaving the lodge after breakfast we began ascending the winding mountain road back to Cusco. We managed to do a series of stops at different altitudes and with some luck we found Andean Guan, Golden-headed Quetzal, Blue-banded Toucanet, Masked Trogon, and Highland Motmot in the tropical cloud forest full of bromeliads, orchids already with flowers, and tree ferns. At the tree line we enjoyed the colours of Scarlet-bellied and Hooded Mountain Tanagers and Blue-capped Tanager. We had a packed lunch at the grassland high point at Acjanaco Pass with Andean Swallows congregating for hunting at the same time. Great Thrush, Rufous-capped Thornbill, Shining Sunbeam, Blue-backed Conebill, Brown-backed Chat-Tyrant and a pair of Moustached Flowerpiercers were all seen in the Polylepis trees.

In the afternoon we left the clouds and mist behind and it changed into a beautiful sunny day. We continued our trip with a few more stops for Black-chested Buzzard Eagle, Puna Ground-tyrant, Bar-winged and White-winged Cinclodes, Peruvian Sierra Finch and others birds in the highlands. We were back before dark in Cusco in preparation for our journey to Machu Picchu. For dinner we went to a local restaurant Marcelo Batata.

Day 15

Monday 1st November

We set off from Cusco before dawn by bus to Poroy and there we transferred to the early morning train to Aguas Calientes and Machu Picchu. The first part of this journey is across the plateau of Anta with cattle farming and the gorgeous landscape of snowy peaked mountains such as Salkantay and interspersed with small villages where the American Kestrel seemed to dominate as a natural predator of flocks of Band-tailed Pigeons and after a while we entered into the canyon towards the Sacred Valley. Soon we were surrounded by mountains peaks where the valley gets to be narrow as we followed the course of the mighty Urubamba River. We found 40 Torrent Ducks along the river and flying over was Andean Condor too. We had trained our eyes and eventually the charismatic White-capped Dipper was seen sitting over big boulders mid-stream. In the last part of the Urubamba we found some more interesting birds such as Black Phoebes and Torrent Tyrannulets.

Once off the train in the station of Aguas Calientes we transferred to the hotel and birded around the garden as the temperature drop down. We saw Collared Inca, Chestnut-breasted Coronet, Blue-capped and Saffron-crowned Tanagers. Then we went by bus up to the entrance to Machu Picchu. After a buffet lunch we went down steps to look for a few birds in the forest - Inca Wren, Rust-and-yellow Tanager, Citrine Warbler, Streak-necked Flycatcher, Slate-throated and Spectacled Redstart – until the time had come to visit the archaeological site of Machu Picchu. After we walked into Machu Picchu at a time where there were few people, I led the group through the highlights of this most inspiring of places. The flight of a dozen Blue and white Swallows made a break through the clouds. Finally, as the day was falling we were ready to catch the bus back down into Aguas Calientes to our luxurious hotel.

Day 16

Tuesday 2nd October

A full morning at Aguas Calientes gave us all plenty of time to relax and sleep in and then enjoy the grounds. We decided to begin the day exploring the trails and feeders in the garden hotel and prior to breakfast we encountered dozens of Chestnut-breasted Coronets and Sparkling and Green Violetears, several Collared Incas and Green-and-white Hummingbirds and smaller numbers of Booted Racquet-tails and Long-tailed Sylphs. Tanagers were conspicuous too and included Blue-necked, Saffron-crowned, Blue-and-yellow, Silver-backed, and Golden-naped Tanager. A walk along the river bank and trails permitted us to see Torrent Ducks, Smoke-coloured Pewee, Cinnamon Flycatcher, and Tropical Parula, and during the course of the morning we included Highland Motmot, Gray-fronted Dove, and Streaked Xenops. A superb little Oscillated Piculet was in the garden, with Barred Becard, Grey-breasted Wood-Wren, Thick-billed Euphonia, Blue Dacnis, Capped Conebill, and Spectacle-faced Parrot flying over and perching on a treetop, as well as a flock of Mitred Parrakeets.

We had a time to visit various shops and local markets, and after a delicious lunch we caught the mid-afternoon train back to Cusco. The journey along the Urubamba Valley was appreciated again - how much the flora changes - it was spectacular. We finally arrived back in Cusco some time after dark but with just enough time to pop out for a last dinner in a local pizzeria with its firewood oven!

Day 17

Wednesday 3rd October

An early morning flight took us back over the Andes and down to Lima.

We were efficiently met by our local guide for the day and whisked off for an authoritative and interesting tour of the colonial part of the city like the Cathedral and San Francisco Church where the catacombs are. After lunch at a city centre hotel some of us decided to rest and others visited the National Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology before heading to the airport. The check-in was on time and our evening flights went according to schedule.

Day 18

Thursday 4th October

Touching down in Madrid in the early afternoon we transferred to our various UK flights and arrived home safely a few hours later.
