

# Peru - Macaws & Machu Picchu (non trek)

Naturetrek Tour Report

29 September - 14 October 2017

## Day 1

**Friday 29th September**

Three clients arrived in Lima from the UK, and were transferred to our hotel in Miraflores.

## Day 2

**Saturday 30th September**

After breakfast we took a ride to the port of Callao where we took a boat to visit the Palomino and Cavinzas islands. Here we had the opportunity to see many species that occur at the cold waters of the Humboldt Current: Inca Terns, Belcher's (Band-tailed) and Kelp Gulls, Peruvian Pelicans, Grey Gulls, and of course, the charismatic Humboldt Penguins plus hundreds of South American Sea Lions.

Back on the main land, we drove to the Villa Wetlands, where we enjoyed great views of other species typical of marshy habitats, such as Many-coloured Rush Tyrant, Wren-like Rushbird, Great and Pied-billed Grebes, and Peruvian Thick-knees, just to mention a few. We then headed back to our hotel.

## Day 3

**Sunday 1st October**

After an early wake-up call, we went to the airport to take our flight to Puerto Maldonado, where we met with the other group members. Once there, we were transferred to our agent's office where we waited for few moments before heading to the Tambopata river port to catch our boat. While waiting, we went out to look for some birds and we weren't disappointed: Great Kiskadee, Boat-billed Flycatcher and Social Flycatcher were among some of the birds we spotted out there but also a Black-backed Water Tyrant, an austral migrant!

We left the office for the Tambopata river port where we boarded our boat and took the always-pleasant trip to our first lodge where we arrived in around an hour. At this point of the day, it was very hot and activity in general was slow, apart from Black, Turkey and Greater Yellow-headed Vultures soaring overhead.

Once at the lodge and after having our rooms assigned, we took a moment to unpack before heading to the forest again. This time, our first excursion took us to a 120-foot canopy tower from where we had an amazing view of the landscape, not to mention being at eye level with some canopy dwellers, such as King Vultures, Red-throated Caracara and a Laughing Falcon with a snake as lunch! We had great views of Scarlet and Red-and-green Macaws flying by, not to mention the Paradise, Green-and-gold and Masked Tanagers together at the same tree!

After dinner we went to bed, lulled by the songs of frogs, cicadas and screech owls.

## Day 4

**Monday 2nd October**

We had another early morning, in order to visit the Tres Chimbadas oxbow lake where we had several target species, including the rare Giant River Otters but also Hoatzins and Horned Screamers, to mention a few.

Needless to say, we scored all of them and more, including a well-camouflaged Agami Heron that Karen spotted among the vegetation! One of the nicest moments were when the otters were eating their fish atop of the logs and we could see the full bodies!

Before we got too hot in the sun, we headed back to the shore and started our hike back to the boat. On our way, we scored great views of a dark morph Hook-billed Kite. Once in our boat we enjoyed a pleasant boat ride into the wilderness of the Tambopata Reserve and National Park. The boat ride offered us the opportunity to see birds such as Roadside Hawk, Plumbeous Kite, Bat Falcon, Snowy Egret, Cocoi Heron, Capped Heron, Collared Plover and Spotted Sandpiper, and also Blue-and-yellow, Scarlet and Red-and-green Macaws flying by. Despite the heat, we also saw a group of Capybaras with some Giant Cowbirds taking care of the ticks (as oxpeckers do in Africa).

On our way to the Tambopata Reserve Centre (TRC), we had a small detour to visit a Harpy Eagle's nest at one of the lodges that belong to our outfitter. We had around an hour to get in and out, which we did. We didn't see the adults, but we saw the chick. As a bonus, during our hike we came across a group of 14 Pale-winged Trumpeters!

Once at TRC, we were greeted by the manager who assigned our rooms, and we met for the bird log later in the dining room. After a nice meal, we went to bed and fell sleep with the sounds of the rainforest.

## Day 5

## Tuesday 3rd October

We started out day before dawn in order to visit the clay-lick. We took a short boat ride and hike at the pebble beach in order to get in position. Once there, we started to see birds coming from all over, and perching in the different levels of the vegetation. Scarlet, Blue-and-yellow, Red-and-green, Chestnut-fronted and even the elusive and rare Blue-headed Macaw were there! Other species at the clay-lick were Mealy, Yellow-crowned, Orange-cheeked, Blue-headed and White-bellied Parrots; White-eyed Parakeets were the other species of Psittacides present at the clay-lick this morning.... 11 species out of 16 that occur there wasn't bad at all!!!

Back at the lodge, we had a nice breakfast and then we headed to one of the trails where we had excellent views of Band-tailed and Round-tailed Manakins at their leks, and Black-faced Antbird. During our hike we came across several different species of Primates: Peruvian Black Spider Monkey, Red Howler, Brown Capuchin and Squirrel Monkeys in the same walk! There are not many places where you can find such diversity.

Once back at the lodge, we had time to relax after lunch, and took another hike later, after the forest cooled down. We weren't disappointed. Not long after we left the lodge, we encountered several species, including Grey Antbird, Lawrence's Thrush, Bluish-fronted Jacamar, Striolated Puffbird, White-winged Shrike-Tanager, Green-and-gold Tanager, among others. It is amazing how time flies when you are entertained watching birds! Before it got too dark, we headed back to the lodge to have enough time before dinner for our bird log.

After another great meal, we went to bed and slept lulled by the sounds of the night creatures.

## Day 6

Wednesday 4th October

We had another great visit to the clay-lick! In addition to what we saw the day before, this time we also added great views of Red-bellied Macaws and Dusky-headed Parakeets! Back at the lodge and after breakfast, we headed to the bamboo trail above the clay-lick where we went to look for bamboo birds. It was very hot, and the birds weren't too active; however, we had some good views of other species such as Broad-billed Motmot and Rufous-capped Nunlet. We also enjoyed great views from the viewpoints, and rested at one of the benches where we were delighted by a family of White-throated Jacamars and their aerial foraging strategies!

Back at the lodge and after lunch, we had a nice nap to avoid the hottest part of the day. Later, we visited a small pond and the trail around it. Here the first bird we added was a Rufous-headed Woodpecker that responded very well to the tape. We also added Sunbittern and White-browed and White-lined Antbird during our hike. We headed back to the lodge, to pack our bags and enjoy another wonderful meal and a well-deserved night of sleep.

## Day 7

Thursday 5th October

Today, sadly, we had to leave TRC and head downriver to Puerto Maldonado in order to get our flight to Cusco and continue on our wonderful trip. On our way down, we stopped at the Chuncho clay-lick, where we had another wonderful natural show from macaws, parrots and other allies.

We said goodbye to our good guide Juan Carlos, flew to Cusco and went to eat lunch. Afterwards, we did a city tour and went back to the hotel to rest for the next day.

## Day 8

Friday 6th October

We went to visit the Huacarpay Lake where we saw Yellow-billed Teal, Yellow-billed Pintail, Puna Teal and Cinnamon Teal. Also, in the distance, we had scoped views of two White-tufted Grebes. After an exploration of the scrub around the lake, we headed off to visit some ruins; first, we enjoyed a nice picnic lunch with a great view of the river.

Once we finished our meal, we headed to the complex ruins of Pisac where Cesar gave us an explanation about this village complex and, finally, we ended our day by a visit to the ruins of Sacsayhuaman. Back in our hotel we got ready for our next trip to the Manu area.

## Day 9

Saturday 7th October

We woke up very excited about our trip to Manu and, in no time, we found ourselves driving through the mountains. We had a couple of stops, which gave us great views of Bearded Mountaineer, Chestnut-breasted Mountain Finch and Creamy-crested Spinetail: three Peruvian endemics, plus many other birds!

We reached the town of Paucartambo where we had nice break, before heading to the Acjanacco Pass, the gate of Manu National Park. Here we had another stop, then started to descend to our destination, Cock-of-the-rock Lodge.

We arrived in daylight and had enough time to get settled and enjoy our first views of some hummingbirds, including Wire-crested Thorntail, Many-spotted Hummingbird and Booted Racket-tail.

## Day 10

## Sunday 8th October

Today we drove up higher, in order to look for some species that favour higher elevations: Andean Guan, Black-streaked Puffbird, Golden-headed Quetzal, Masked Trogon and Blue-banded Toucanet, among others. Earlier, we even had our first views of some male Andean Cock-of-the-rocks!

On our way back, we stopped at the Andean Cock-of-the-rock lek where some males treated us to their displays. What a great way to end another wonderful day!

## Day 11

## Monday 9th October

After breakfast, we boarded our coach and drove downhill in order to look for birds at lower elevations. One of our first species was a quick encounter with an Amazonian Umbrellabird that flew in front of our coach before disappearing in the forest again. Later, at the area known as Quita Calzon, another Umbrellabird was spotted! We tried different spots and we were able to get good views of birds such as Chestnut-backed Antshrike, Yellow-breasted Warbling Antbird, Foothill Antwren and Striped-chested Antwren, among others.

We continued descending all the way to the town of Pilcopata where we looked from the bridge, and scored an amazing Fasciated Tiger Heron. From here we drove back to the lodge. We took a short break and then drove uphill, to look for Lyre-tailed Nightjars. Pepe found a female with the juvenile sitting on a rock. We waited for few more minutes and the male made his appearance showing off his amazing silhouette....WOW! What a nice way to end a day!!!

## Day 12

## Tuesday 10th October

After a few days in this beautiful part of Peru, we had to go back in order to visit another wonderful part of the country. We retraced our tracks but this time we managed to go through the road-work area and visit the ruins of Ninamarca, where we learned about the chullpas as burial sites. The name Ninamarca means “mark of the fire” because people claimed they saw fire coming out of the place. Probably this was what is known as “ignis fatuus” which is a chemical reaction in which methane or phosphorus that came out from decomposition of organic matter as dead bodies, gets ignited and produce small flames that are visible at the distance.

We arrived in Cusco, got to our hotel, worked on our checklist and went out for dinner. We returned to sleep, in preparation for an early departure to the ruins of Machu Picchu.... how exciting!

## Day 13

## Wednesday 11th October

Early in the morning our guide Cesar was ready and waiting for us. We took a short bus ride to Poroy station where we boarded our train for the town of Aguas Calientes where we checked in to our nice hotel. After that we proceeded to the bus station and drove uphill to the gate of the ruins. First, we enjoyed a very nice lunch and after that we toured the ruins.

Cesar gave us a great explanation about the various theories explaining different aspects of the citadel and the people that inhabited it. Once in a while, we paused to check some birds that were flying around. One bird particularly took our attention: we heard a pair of Inca Wrens that showed splendidly after we play the call, and everybody was able to get great views of these birds. We ended our visit and headed back to the bus station, where we had to wait longer than usual before we were able to board. Once at our hotel, we enjoyed a nice dinner and a great night of sleep.

## Day 14

Thursday 12th October

Today, the original plan was to do a birding walk to the Ruinas bridge. Unfortunately, the buses were driving too fast past us, and it did not feel a comfortable situation, so we headed back to the hotel and birded around the hotel gardens. Peter saw a male Andean Cock-of-the-rock in a tree in front of his room .... needless to say, we all were a little bit jealous of that but, amazingly, we spotted the bird again! Everybody got great views of this amazing bird again!

We continued walking along the trail and got the chance to see a large hummingbird known as Gould's Inca very well, several times and at different angles; we were even able to see it through the scope! Another spectacular bird was a Highland Motmot -actually, there was a pair sitting along the path! Back at the hotel we packed, checked out and headed to lunch, before going back to the station to board our train to go back to Cusco.

## Day 15

Friday 13th October

We headed to the airport to get our flight back to Lima; it was delayed, but we managed to make it safely into Lima. Due the time constraints, we had to say good bye to Peter, Paul and Angie at the airport while the rest of us went to eat a late lunch and head back to the airport to take our flights back to the USA.

## Day 16

Saturday 14th October

The group members arrived back in the UK and the USA as another Naturetrek adventure came to an end.

It was a great trip for me and I hope you also enjoyed. I was very happy to share with you a piece of my country and I hope to see you again some time somewhere else. Thank you very much!
