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Day 1

Thursday 29th May

London Stansted to Vasteras and then on to Svatadalen (the Black River Valley)

A late morning flight brought us to sunny southern Sweden where we met up with our local guide, Daniel. Having quickly loaded up our two minibuses, we were soon off to a late lunch stop at the scenic Angso Castle, lake and grounds. Munching on our sandwiches, we watched both the familiar - Great Crested Grebe, Tufted Duck and Black-headed Gull and the less familiar - Common Crane and Goldeneye. A short walk in the woods added Marsh Tit to our fledgling list.

Moving on to our hotel (Satra Brunn), it was straight to dinner and then out again, passing wild boar and red deer en route to a favoured Great Grey Owl spot near Skultuna. On arrival, we waited patiently and were entertained by Woodcock, Green Sandpiper, Whinchat and up-close Pied Flycatcher and Long-tailed Tit (the smart, white headed northern race). Still we waited and waited and finally, just when we were beginning to think all was lost, a large grey shape was spotted on a distant tree. We watched the Great Grey Owl for some time as it hunted (at one point with a roe deer as a backdrop) and as we returned to the minibuses we got some really excellent close views of it perched on a post. As dusk was falling (11pm!), it was time to move on. Not far away Daniel quickly whistled in a Pygmy Owl which sat obligingly on a dead branch giving clear views even though the light was fading fast.

So it was now bedtime, but with a quick stop on our return journey to listen to (and peer through the gloom at) a Thrush Nightingale.

Day 2

Friday 30th May

Satra Brunn to Orsa

We left early for a woodpecker morning at Farna Ekopark. On the way we were lucky to spot a young Elk and some Common Cranes in fields we passed, as well as Black Tern and Oystercatcher as we passed Lake Flacksjon (to which we would return at the end of our holiday).

Meeting our 'woodpecker guide' in the woods, we strolled to an area of wind thrown trees and quickly called in a Three-toed Woodpecker. This excellent bird decided to sun itself on a nearby branch - well it was a lovely sunny day – while we watched and cooed. The Grey-headed Woodpecker proved trickier as it responded to the call we played but did not approach for a long time. Eventually it did, but views were fleeting before it was off again.

We moved on a short distance and went in search of Black Woodpecker. This species too proved somewhat elusive. Again, it would respond to the recorded call....but could we spot it?....Well no, not really, but the butterflies were great, including Camberwell Beauty and Northern Chequered Skipper. We had essentially given up and were on our way back for lunch when a last stop and call had a Black Woodpecker flying smartly over our heads several times.

After lunch it was time to meet three dedicated local birders who had made it their task to encourage owls in the area by putting up nest boxes, monitoring their use and ringing the chicks. Today, we were accompanying them to a couple of Ural Owl boxes and sure enough at the first we saw both the two chicks and the mother, though the latter was part obscured and at some distance. At the second box, the mother was far less shy and perched obviously and protectively close by....indeed at one point she decided enough was enough and dive-bombed one of the ringers who escaped by only a few inches.

So it was time to move on. We had a coffee stop by a pool, serenaded by an Icterine Warbler followed by a long drive with a stop by a reedy lake (near Leksand) to take in Widgeon, Teal, Pochard, Mute and Whooper Swans and Reed and Sedge Warblers. Supper was a picnic in a scenic spot overlooking Lake Siljan and the night was spent at the Fryksas Hotel near Orsa.

Day 3

Saturday 31st May

Orsa to Funasdalen

A short(ish) drive brought us to the Fulufjallet National Park, famous for having the tallest waterfall in the country (93m). At the visitor centre we quickly picked up a target bird when three Siberian Jays happily tucked into our banana cake.

The walk up to the waterfall took us past some beautiful male Bramblings in full breeding plumage and singing their little hearts out at the tops of the stunted trees. Near the base of the falls and its surrounding cliffs, Daniel rapidly spotted a rather unexpected treat in the shape of a female Gyrfalcon at the nest with three chicks. We watched for some time, the male joining the female and both making flights around the area and affording some cracking views.

We celebrated with a fine picnic lunch and were then off again.

A long drive was punctuated by lakeside stops to take in Velvet Scoters, Greenshank, Red-breasted Merganser and Arctic Tern. A Black Grouse was glimpsed by some as we drove and everyone saw the Badger that crossed the road just ahead of us and snuffled for a short while in the verge.

For some, a final treat for the day was a Capercaillie from the hotel balcony, as we took an after dinner coffee.

Day 4

Sunday 1st June

Around Funasdalen

An early start and off to the Flatruet plateau. En route some had excellent views of Mountain Hare and somewhat distant views of Goosander and Red and Black-throated Diver. On the plateau itself, we strolled in the sunshine across the open wild landscape and soon came across three very smart Long-tailed Skuas which regularly displayed as we also watched an equally smart male Lapland Bunting in full breeding regalia and ditto, a Bluethroat, Dunlin, Wood Sandpiper and Golden Plover. A Golden Eagle was also glimpsed in the distance.

Attempting to drive a short distance, our progress was interrupted by a Rock Ptarmigan which led to Dotterel being spotted as we watched (the latter gave us an entertaining display flight). Hardly stopping for lunch, we wandered through a wetter part of the plateau where a gang of Red-necked Phalarope were happy for us to approach and get some stunning up-close views of them and, into the bargain, the nearby Long-tailed Duck and displaying Ruff. A mystery displaying wader with a curious trilling song turned out to be another unexpected treat when it landed close-by and revealed itself to be a Broad-billed Sandpiper.

Then it was back to the hotel for an early dinner before heading off again to a local lake which gave us lovely views of Dipper (black-bellied continental race) on a bridge over a feeder river and Lesser-spotted Woodpecker, drumming itself senseless against the metal top of a nearby flag post. Around another side of the lake we came across a Common Crane, by its nest with two chicks, and Red-breasted Merganser as well as a more distant Black-throated Diver. Finally we took in perching Arctic and Black Terns.

Day 5

Monday 2nd June

Around Funasdalen

We were out early and were rewarded with a fine female Capercaillie on the road just outside our hotel, followed by another one a little further on and, for some, a female Black Grouse too.

A stop at a local cliff had us watching circling Rough-legged Buzzard as well as House Martins collecting mud for their nests and a grey headed Yellow Wagtail. Further down the road, a lakeside stop afforded some excellent views of Little Gull as well as Red-throated Diver on the nest and a stonking Spotted Redshank.

Progressing into a forest, we had high hopes of seeing Siberian Tit, but it was not to be. All the small birds spotted turned out to be Willow Tits....we did get some lovely views of the local landscape though! Winding our way back towards the Flatruet plateau we stopped off to watch an Osprey at the nest. At one point here the male approached and was mobbed by a Merlin. Back on the plateau, we had views of our first wild(ish) reindeer along with Short-eared Owl, Willow Grouse and Hen Harrier.

A fine dinner of reindeer and vegetable wraps was expertly cooked by Daniel on an open fire out in the wilds. We had been hoping to go to a well known local Great Snipe lek, but the road was flooded so it was inaccessible. Instead, we tried to find an alternative lek but failed to do so. However, we were content with the wilderness, a very pale Red Fox (which had us thinking for a while that it was an Arctic Fox...) and a lovely roadside Elk back near the hotel.

Day 6

Tuesday 3rd June

Funasdalen to Idregarden (via Nipfjallet)

Off southwards, a roadside stop still failed to reveal Siberian Tit but many had great views of Lesser-spotted Woodpecker. By lunchtime we had arrived at our mountain stop of Nipfjallet. Here we wandered for a few hours taking in more Reindeer and Ring Ouzel (for some), but the star spot was a pair of Dotterel at the nest.

Arriving at our hotel in the early afternoon, it was time for a well-earned short rest and dinner (with a drop of cloudberry wine) before setting off up the mountain in search of Snow Bunting. However, the Bunting proved elusive, as did European Nightjar that we tried to call into a forest clearing on our way back. The good news was that we set a Wryneck calling instead and managed to track it down to its nest hole.

Day 7

Wednesday 4th June

Idregarden to Satra Brunn (in Svatadalen)

Pre-breakfast walks added Common Rosefinch to the trip list for some and Red Squirrel for others. Post breakfast, we took a short drive to the nearby lake and had excellent views of Black-throated Diver.

Continuing southwards, our first coffee stop at Glysjons gave us our first Slavonian Grebes, here on the nest along with Whooper Swans, also on the nest, and a fly past by a fine pair of Osprey.

A picnic lunch was enjoyed at Alder Angarna which is also a well known spot for a myriad of butterflies but it was probably a touch too hot for them(!), though some did see Pearl-bordered (or Small Pearl-bordered) Fritillary, Brimstone and Chequered Skipper. Crested Tits feeding chicks were also a welcome spot. Further south we stopped off at a copper ore quarry at Falun in search of Eagle Owl which was found quite quickly, sat on a ledge and watching us with its scary yellow/orange eyes.

Day 8

Thursday 5th June

Svatadalen (the Black River Valley) to London Stansted

A lot to pack in on the last day, so off, pre-breakfast, down to the shores of Lake Flacksjon with two target birds hoped for, White-tailed Eagle and Common Rosefinch (for those that had missed it the day before). The former eluded us, but the latter, after a bit of coaxing by a recorded song, gave us brief but good views. Breakfast was followed by a second attempt at the White-tailed Eagle. A very relaxed approach was taken - watching the area where we know there was a nest, reclined on the grassy shores of the lake in the bright sunshine. Our 'hard work' was rewarded as one sailed into view, mobbed by Jackdaws and Gulls, and then perched in full view in a dead tree. Soon after, we had a treat in the shape of a Goshawk circling over the forest.

Moving on, we stopped briefly to look for Thrush Nightingale, which responded well by song to our recorded call but gave only fleeting views of itself in a dense bush.

After lunch we set off to another wetland area (Askoviken) and a chance to see Marsh Warbler and a vagrant White-winged Tern. The former reacted well to the call we played, singing back in 'stolen' bits of other bird song (including swallow, buzzard and blackbird), but was typically hidden whilst it did so - a few got fleeting glimpses and everyone probably saw it fly.

We walked to the lake, which had plenty of bird life and hunted for the vagrant tern in and amongst the more usual Black Tern. However, in the end, we found it feeding with Black-headed Gulls. Soon after, a pair of Honey Buzzard circled close by. All too soon it was off to our final bird stop. In a very suburban location we called a Corncrake call (using a CD and comb on a credit card!) and were immediately responded to, but try as we might we just could not actually spot it.

Saying our goodbyes to Daniel at the tiny Vasteras airport, another punctual flight brought us back to Stansted and off our separate ways with fond shared memories of a great holiday.
